The Referendum Scheme Is Abandoned.

Prevention of Fires Will Be Made an Issue in the Next Legislative Campaign.

For two years to come the timber of Oregon will be exposed to ravages by fire. But at the end of that time friends of the forest are determined some means of protection shall be devised.

A bill creating a forest fire commission and authorizing the appointment of deputies in the various counties of Oregon passed the last Legislature.

Losses Have Been Great.
