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SATELLITES WIN FIRST GAME

Schmeer's Errors Were Very Costly.

Large Crowd Witnessed the Browns Go Down to Defeat After a Plucky Fight.

The "Satellites" defeated the Browns yesterday afternoon at Twenty-fourth and Vaughn streets, by the score of 9 to 8. The loss of the game can be charged to shortstop Schmeer, who made two costly errors, the result of which actually cost the Browns five runs. A batting rally in the ninth inning came nearly bringing the desired result, but when Zinsnar and Engle went out, leaving two men on bases, the last chance had gone, and another game was lost.

The game itself, barring Schmeer's errors, which may be pardonable on account of the illness of the clever shortstop, was a splendid exhibition of baseball, as it should be played, and the great crowd, although disappointed, was pleased at the performance of the Browns.

For a week day, it was a record breaking crowd. The ladies were there in all their beauty and elegance, the banker, merchant, the motorman, the teamster, the baker and the entire representation of fandom were present in heart, spirit and glory. Each man as he came to the bat was warmly applauded and every good play was rewarded. Old Smith in right garden was so stiff that he could not run and this fact prevented him from doing his best. Nadeau and Anderson batted in clever style, each having three to their credit. The grassy field was treacherous on account of the two days rain, and several times the fielders rolled earthward.

The Browns according to yesterday's game, will do. All that is required is a little more team work.

The Detailed Score.
Charlie Zeigler, formerly of Portland, was the first Satellite to face Charlie Shields, and promptly flew out to Smith. Hannivan and Campbell drew passes. Schwartz hit to Anderson, who fumbled, filling the bases. Hemphill hit to left, scoring two. Hannivan went down on the first ball and Schwartz attempted to score, but Nadeau, who returned to the plate in time to catch Schwartz.

Harlow hit to Campbell and was out at first. Van flew to left. Phil Nadeau cracked the first ball to center for a clean single, but Anderson, ended the inning by a fly to Janing.

In the second Wilson struck out. Janing walked; Hickey flew to Smith. Zeigler hit to Anderson and was an easy out at first. There was something doing for Portland. Zeigler and Smith singled. Shaffer sacrificed and Schmeer rose to the occasion with a beautiful drive to right, scoring both men, but was put out at second a moment later. Anderson, who had been out, returned to the plate in time to catch Schwartz.

With two out in the third Schwartz hit for two bases, but was left as the next man was an easy out at first. Portland got two hits in the third, but two were down and the next man forced Anderson at second, ending that chance.

Nothing doing on either side in the fourth, but the fifth saw the fire works. Schmeer dropped Hannivan's drive. Campbell sacrificed him to second. Schwartz hit to Schmeer who fumbled the ball long enough to allow Hannivan to score. Hemphill hit to Schmeer, who threw to Anderson, forcing out Schwartz. Andy relayed the ball to first, trying for a double, but his throw was poor. Hemphill taking second. Kennedy got his base on four bad ones, and Wilson faced out a two-sacker, scoring two. Janing took his second pass and Hickey connected for another two sacker, scoring two more, making a total of five for the inning. Zeigler flew out to Van Buren, ending the run-getting for that session. The Browns took a brace and made a determined effort to tie the score in their half. Harlow went out at first. Van Buren and Nadeau were passed. Anderson hit to left, filling the bases. It was up to Andy Anderson, who was waiting for the goods, connecting with one of "Pretty" Jack Hickey's choice shots, scoring Van and Nadeau. Anderson and Anderson executed a double steal and scored on Schwartz's bad throw of Shaffer's hit after Smith was out. Shaffer stole second, Schmeer walked, and with two on bases, George Engle, the pride of Portland, was sent up to bat for Shields, and ended the chance to tie the score by fanning out.

Mr. Engle then went on the slab and proceeded to show the Portland people that he was still their star twirler. One James Hannivan was the first Siwash to face him, and George didn't like his looks, so he placed the first ball into Mr. Hannivan's slats. The gentleman of Irish extraction was advanced to second by Campbell's sacrifice and scored on Schwartz's two-sacker. Hemphill hit to Zinsnar, who threw Schwartz out at the plate on an attempt to score.

No more tallies were registered until the ninth, when Hemphill, the first man up for Seattle, clouted one of Engle's benders for two bases, but would have been an easy out had Nadeau not fell in trying to get under it. Kennedy followed with another hit, scoring "Hemp." Wilson flew to Nadeau, Janing struck out and John Hickey played the first of Engle's shots for his second double of the game, but Zeigler retired the side by a chance to Engle. The Browns started some fire works in their half of the ninth. Nadeau flew to left; Anderson walked; Anderson cracked out a double scoring Anderson. Smith hit, scoring Andy. Smith was forced at second.

GETS DECISION OVER CHAMPION

Young Corbett Failed to Stop Fitzpatrick.

Conqueror of McGovern Was Severely Jarred Last Night by Clever Young Chicagoan.

"Young Corbett" received a set back last night at the Exposition Building when on the terminal of the four-round contest Dick Fitzpatrick of Chicago was ready and willing to continue to a finish. The present holder of the world's featherweight championship and the twice victor of Terry McGovern tipped

the beam at least 15 pounds heavier than the sturdy little Chicagoan, who netted a bonus of \$100 and a "win" over the holder of the enviable title of world's champion. Fitzpatrick has appeared for the last time in the ring, and in a preliminary round, and in future will figure as a principal in main events, negotiations now pending as to his meeting a prominent soldier boxer at Vancouver, Wash. The Pastime Club of this city has also signified its intention of securing Fitzpatrick's services to meet a stellar light in his division during the approaching month of June.

Fight by Rounds.

In the opening round the champion in the usual methodical ring costume "felt" his man, but Fitzpatrick was there all the time, and although a comparative novice, proved himself as game and as clever as a veteran, the round closing with honors even.

In the second round Fitzpatrick, though a little nervous, still kept up his aggressive tactics, and suddenly crossed the twice victor of McGovern heavily on the jaw who went down in a hurry, but quickly jumped up and renewed the contest with redoubled vigor.

In the fourth and last round Fitzpatrick cut loose and more than held his own with the champion, who seemed to be much surprised and perplexed that his vicious uppercuts and jabs failed to do any perceptible damage to the lad from the Windy City. Referee Grant's decision—raising of his hands—virtually proclaimed a victory for Fitzpatrick, was greeted by cheers from the large assemblage.

Bore No Marks.

Fitzpatrick called on The Journal's sporting editor this morning and said: "You can see I have no marks or abrasions as evidence of Champion Corbett's handwork last night. After the second and third rounds, when he landed on me his blows lacked the sting I had heard so much about, and despite the foul epithets he kept continually hurling at me to get me rattled, I felt more assured than ever that I would get my feet at the finish and ready to continue if the referee or Corbett desired a continuance. A peculiar thing in connection with the last round is the fact that the terminal fourth round, instead of lasting the conventional three minutes, went five. My representative, Sam Goodman, appealed to Referee Grant in connection with the unusual length of the last round, but Manager Pollock (Corbett's representative) assured the referee that the time had been taken correctly. In conclusion, I wish to state that I am ready and willing to meet Corbett in a 20-round contest at 123 pounds on 3 o'clock before any club in America."

The Preliminaries.

The evening's entertainment commenced with a 10-round go between Freeman of Oregon City and Mike Kenny of Albina. The latter, who handicapped the Oregon City entry many pounds and a few inches in height, failed to best his sturdy opponent, who, despite his being heavily handicapped, was strong and willing to continue when the terminal round was reached, and declared a draw.

"Kid" McFadden, the carmine-hued San Franciscan, and Champion Corbett's sparring partner, and Bert Sullivan, an elongated boxer of very little experience, were listed to go four rounds, the latter agreeing to forfeit a specified sum if Sullivan reached the terminal point. He failed, however, and the bout was stopped ere one minute had elapsed of the fourth round, Sullivan being on the sunny side of Queer street.

Jimmy Reilly of San Francisco faced "Kid" Wyatt (colored) in a 10-round contest. The former, however, clearly evidenced his superiority in the seventh round when a cessation was called and Reilly was awarded the verdict.

AT THE RINGSIDE.

Fitzpatrick is a wonder. The last round was over four minutes long. Shame! How he jolted the champion. Corbett was greatly disturbed in the second.

A GREAT FIGHTER

Dick Fitzpatrick Gave Corbett a Severe Jarring.

Dick Fitzpatrick of Chicago, who got the decision over the world's champion featherweight, "Young" Corbett, at the Exposition Building last night, in a four-round contest, deserves great credit for the mastery in which he handled himself in the fray. The fact that he was pitted against the world's champion slightly disturbed the feelings of "Dick" in the first two rounds, but as soon as he settled down to fighting he fairly jarred McGovern's conquer with lightning straight and whirlwind up-bercuts that caused the Denverite to look silly. There were many present who thought that Fitzpatrick would not be a look in with the "champion," but in the fourth round when Fitzpatrick landed short uppercuts on Corbett's jaw and otherwise knocked him around the ring, the great crowd in Exhibition Hall arose as if one man and cheered the doughty little Chicagoan to the echo. It was a splendid exhibition of grit, science and speed, and Dick Fitzpatrick earned the award.
