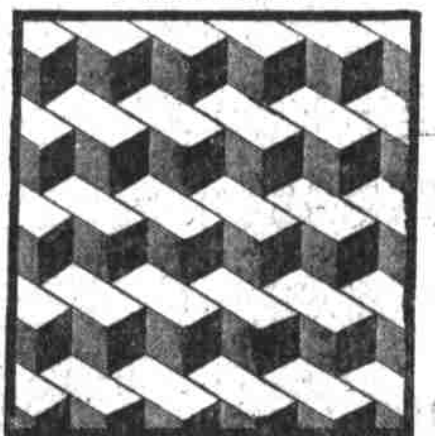

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LA GRANDE LAND OFFICE SQUABBLE

Register Bartlett Says He Won't Resign.

Thinks Delegation Will Retain Him If Charges Against Knowles Are Sustained.

The appointment of J. W. Knowles as successor to E. W. Bartlett, register of the La Grande land office, recommended by the Oregon delegation some time ago, for some reason, gratifying to the present incumbent, held up, hard and fast somewhere between Secretary of the Interior Hitchcock and President Roosevelt.

Mr. Bartlett, accompanied by his wife, arrived from La Grande yesterday and registered at the Imperial Hotel.

"I have nothing particularly to say at this time," observed Mr. Bartlett, "as to my position in the registration matter. My term expired last January, after which time the Oregon delegation named my successor. They never asked me to resign, neither have any charges been filed against me that I know of. I am not going to resign, but I will think of the delegation to meet some political exigency."

To Preserve Peace.

"But I am rather inclined to think the change was suggested in order to preserve peace in the La Grande office. The receiver and myself never got on well together; he was grossly incompetent, too advanced in years to be serviceable and there was so much slipshod work resulting from his administration that he and I never agreed. It was said that we never spoke to each other, but that state of affairs was more imaginary than real. However, when charges were preferred against the receiver, perhaps the delegation thought it would be better to purge the entire office and have a new deal."

Appointment Held Up.

"A. B. Thompson was duly appointed receiver of the La Grande land office, but for some reason J. W. Knowles' recommendation has never yet run the gauntlet. The appointment of Knowles was objected to by O. H. King and others of La Grande, on the grounds of incompetency. Mr. King is a staunch church member and made sensational charges against Knowles. The latter by the way is city attorney of La Grande, and it was alleged in the charges that Knowles permitted gambling and vice to run in the town, on the legal sanction of monthly fines. A special agent of the United States was at once sent out to investigate the charges. The special completed his labors recently, and I am told, carried important evidence back to Washington. Since the special agent's return nothing further has been heard of the case. I presume the department is awaiting the agent's report."

May Win by Default.

Register Bartlett has reason to believe that the appointment of Knowles will never be made; that the delegation will then be unable to agree on anyone else, and that he will be retained in office another term. "If an unsatisfactory majority of the most prominent politicians of that section of the State," said Mr. Bartlett, "Senator Fulton has already stated that he would name no one else if Knowles was not acceptable, and the other members of the Oregon delegation, I have reason to believe, will stand by me in the end."

Mr. Moody's Fine Work.

Register Bartlett intimated that ex-Representative Moody had a prominent part in the drama and succeeded in holding up Knowles' appointment. Political reasons are supposed to be at the bottom of Mr. Moody's activity in this direction.

Another queer mixup in the La Grande

office is the appointment of A. B. Thompson as receiver, when he was scheduled originally for register. It was stated this or nothing with the appointment. Mr. Bartlett intimated that there might be a skeleton in this closet also, if the powers that be would only allow the public to peep into it.

Early History.

About a year ago charges of intemperance against Register Bartlett were common talk, and he appeared in the papers. Mr. Bartlett, alarmed to considerable extent by the disquieting rumors, went to Washington, D. C., post haste. There he was assured by Secretary Hitchcock, however, that everything was satisfactory and for the register to go back to his work. The Secretary was not pleased with Bartlett in leaving his post of duty to consult with the authorities at Washington, and impressed the fact strongly on the register's mind.

Agony Will Soon Be Over.

Register Bartlett sums the situation up this way: "I will know soon whether or not the charges against Knowles have been sustained. If they are sustained, the delegation will not likely agree on anyone else, and I will remain in office. In the meantime no charges that I know of have been made against me. I have not been asked to resign. I don't want to resign. Anyway, I would not quit now and leave the office take care of itself pending the selection of another man, therefore I will stay right where I am."

BOGUS EARL AND HIS BRIDE HURT

SAN FRANCISCO, May 13.—Many are the tides and trials in the lives of both Ernest M. Chadwick, or H. W. Cooper, and his latest wife, but both declare that they have become disgusted by the newspaper stories published since and before their marriage in the County Jail on Sunday, April 5. The man in this affair declares solemnly that he is no British "Sir," that his true name is Ernest Moore Chadwick, and that all published accounts concerning his birthplace and breeding have been erroneous. His bride of a few days, the widow of the late Rev. T. J. Van Valden, has roseate views of future happiness in the pursuit of missionary work among the criminal classes after her husband has extricated himself from the legal meshes which now confine him to the county's bastille.

Chadwick, as he now persists in being called, when seen at the Broadway jail yesterday said he did not come from Australia, as has been published, but was born of English parents in London. He grew up, he declared, in the English public schools and later was sent to a medical college after a preparatory course in a "boarding school." After his graduation he drifted out into the world, and since that time has seen most of the western hemisphere. Chadwick told of his conversion to God's services in the jail in this city 14 months ago, and then spoke of his latest matrimonial venture. "I met my dear wife while she was doing missionary work in this jail," he said. "Her noble self-sacrifices attracted me to her and by the grace of God I learned to love her. I feel that I shall never serve a day in any state's prison. God will see justice done to me and I will be free. When I am released my wife and I will continue in the service of God, saving souls, and if God calls me to the ministry I shall obey His will and become a minister of the Church of God."

"My former husband, who died about a year ago," said Mrs. Chadwick, "was Rev. T. J. Van Valden, an ordained minister of the Church of God. We were engaged in the service together, and it often became my duty to preach in the absence of my husband. I have been in missionary work in this city about a year, working without compensation or without hope of any. I met Mr. Chadwick while engaged in missionary work at the Broadway jail, and after he was saved, he rendered me service by saving other unfortunate souls there. He is endowed with splendid abilities, and now that he has consecrated himself, he will be a valued member of the Church of God."

Attorney Frank J. Murphy, who has fought Chadwick on Cooper's legal battles for the past two years, is confident that his client will escape the penitentiary.

LORRAINE FIEND IS STILL ACTIVE

He May Be After Additional Victims.

Woman Fired Five Shots at Intruder Who Woke Her in the Night.

LORRAINE, Ohio, May 13.—Friends of Father Walser, who was recently exonerated from the charge of murdering Augusta Reichman, believe the man who is the real murderer made another attempt to kill a woman last night, when Mrs. James Bowen awoke to find a man leaning over her bed.

When she asked him what he wanted the intruder threatened to kill her. The woman screamed and the man fled. Mrs. Bowen fired five shots at him, but missed. Walser's friends claim that the man with a mania for murdering women is at large in the city.

LAW MUST YIELD TO THIS ROMANCE

SAN FRANCISCO, May 13.—Uncle Sam's laws no longer hinder the culmination of a romance that began in Shanghai and halted at the Pacific Mail dock in this city, when, on March 27, pretty, Miss Ha Yung Kwei was forbidden to land. She came hopefully, joyfully to study American ways that she might become the accomplished bride of John Dronberfer, an engineer, who stands watch in peace and war at the engine throttle in the United States monitor Monadnock.

Little Miss Ha Yung Kwei is just 20, and she journeyed all alone to a strange land to go to school. She came on the Korea, an unobscured celestial maid on the liner that brought the new Chinese Minister, Chen and his gorgeously arrayed suite. Of all the passengers she—the affianced bride of an American naval officer—was refused permission to go to her friends in the big strange city.

The law denied her her tears and her romance. That she had been reared, educated and wooed in a Christian English family availed nothing. The statutes said she must be detained until the Secretary of the Treasury decided her fate.

That decision reached her yesterday. Miss Ha Yung Kwei is now at liberty. She was released by Deputy Surveyor Chauncey St. John on an order from headquarters.

Now she is at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Brownbridge of 525 Folsom street, who are old friends of her fiancé. And the plans of her sweetheart will now go on. She is to go to a mission school here for preliminary study and in a few months will complete her education in an Eastern seminary.

After that will come the wedding and the petite maid of Shanghai will be the bride of her hero.

FOR HARMONY IN LABOR MATTERS

Civic Federation Tries to Solve Problems.

NEW YORK, May 13.—In line with the work started last winter the executive committee of the National Civic Federation began a special meeting in this city today to further discuss ways and means for bringing about harmony between labor and capital. This is the committee of which Senator Hanna is chairman, and among the members are Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, former President Grover Cleveland, Cornelius N. Bliss, Archbishop Ireland, President Eliot of Harvard, Bishop Potter and other men of note.

The special purpose of the present meeting, it is understood, is to agree upon some satisfactory plan by which strikes may be averted. It is said that suggestions will be made by the members to appoint arbitration boards in the various districts. These arbitration boards will be composed of representatives of all interested parties. Any trou-

ble that arises between employer and employee will be referred to the board for settlement. If the board fails to reach an agreement satisfactory to both sides, then the matter will be placed in the hands of a higher arbitration board. The Civic Federation, it is understood, will suggest that it act as the higher board. It is further suggested that while the dispute is in the hands of either of the boards no strike can be declared.

CHOATE'S SON TO WED.

LONDON, May 13.—Mrs. Choate, wife of the Ambassador, and Miss Choate sailed today for the United States to attend the wedding of Joseph Hodgson Choate, Jr., and Miss Cora Oliver the latter part of this month. The Ambassador is much disappointed because his official duties here will prevent his attending the wedding.

ALBANY, May 13.—The wedding of Joseph Choate, Jr., and Miss Cora Oliver will take place in this city and will be a notable event. The bride-elect is the daughter of General Robert Shaw Oliver, one of Albany's richest and most influential men, widely traveled and a famous wit. Miss Oliver's grandfather was General Rathbone and her aunt, Miss Alice Rathbone, who was a great beauty, was married to William Phelps Eno of New York.
