They Are Supposed to Be
Headed for This
City.

One of Them Takes Mon-
ey and Clothing
From House.

Police Have Been Asked
to Stop Them and
Notify Centralia.

Two girls and a boy, runaway girls,
named Nellie Hansen and Bernice
Baker, ages 14 and 15 years. Nellie's
description: Height 5 feet, 3 inches;
rosy cheeks; grey eyes; blonde hair.
Bernice: About 5 feet 8 inches; black
eyes; black hair. The girls have with
them a willow telescope of clothes.
One is wearing a white hat trimmed
in black, the other a white cap with
black velvet, red dress.

Somewhere within the boundaries of

sen and Bernice Baker, aged 14 and 15
years respectively, are supposed to be
in hiding. They ran away from Centralia,
Wash., last Friday night and the
Portland police have been looking
for them since, as they were known to
have headed for this place.

City Marshal Sheridan of Centralia
was requested by their parents to try
and find the wayward girls, and learn-
ing immediately that they had left for
Portland, he wired the above dispatch
to Chief of Police Hunt in this city.

How the girls managed to effect
their escape from their parental roofs
is out of the knowledge of one
known to themselves. However, the
fact remains that they did so, and
since have not been seen or heard of
by any of their friends. It is believed
they took the early evening passenger
train south-bound, arriving in Portland
before their absence was discovered by
their parents.
