GENERAL ESTRADA REPORTED KILLED

(Journal Special Service.) SAN FRANCISCO, May 21.—Eugene J. Graustein, an American of Salt Lake City, who arrived by steamer from Corinto, says: "General J. Estrada, the leader of the forces of President Zelaya in Nicaragua, was killed in a battle with the insurgents near San Jose on April 28. His troops were routed with great loss and the revolutionists succeeded in capturing a large quantity of arms and ammunition. The insurgents are expecting help from Colombia and a force of 3,000 men are now on the march from Honduras to join their ranks."

MANY VOICES JOIN IN SINGING PRAISE

(Journal Special Service.) LOS ANGELES, May 21.—The general Presbyterian assembly opened at 11 a. m. in Immanuel Presbyterian Church. Thousands of voices joined in singing "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow." Dr. Douglas, pastor of the church, read a passage of Scripture and Dr. Stanley J. Whyte of New Jersey offered prayer. The church was crowded, there not even being standing room. Dr. Henry Van Dyke, moderator, preached the annual sermon.

PLUMBERS IN SESSION

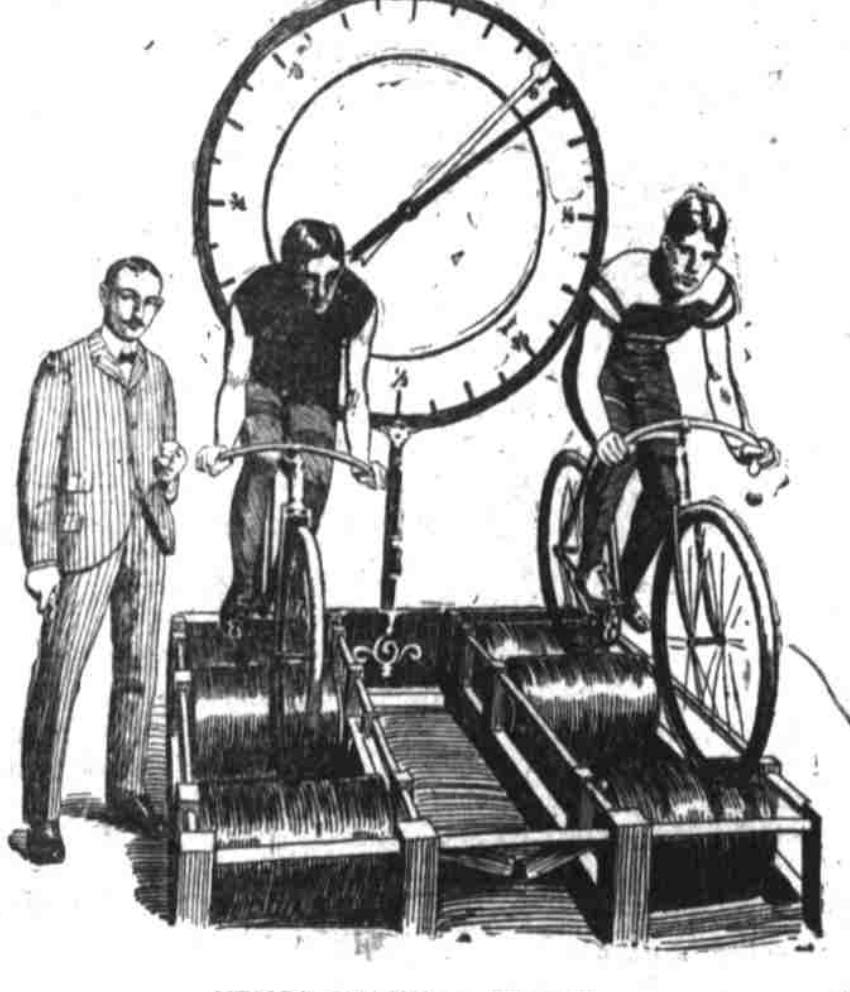
