
(Journal Special Service.) WASHINGTON, D. C., May 22.—Af-ter an active career in the army of more than 40 years. Lieut. Col. John V. Furey, Assistant Quartermaster General, was placed on the retired list today by operation of the age limit. Col. Furey enjoys a record of high distinction. He is a native of New York and at the outbreak of the Civil War enlisted in the Fourteenth Regiment of the militia of that state. In

July, 1861, he was assigned to extra duty in the Quartermaster's Depart-ment and remained there for three years. In 1864 he was made captain and assistant quartermaster of United States Volunteers/ and later in the samo year was transferred to the Quartermaster General's office in Washington. In the meantime he had received a brevet as major of United States Volunteers for meritorious ser-vices during the war, and in 1867 was made captain and assistant quarter master of the Regular Army. The latter part of his career has been spent in Philadelphia, where he handled the army supplies destined for the troops in Cuba and Porto Rico.


