SEATTLE, June 1.—Seattle managed to find George Engle whenever a hit was needed yesterday. Simple was an enigma to the Browns, except in the sixth inning, when Van Buren hit safely and Nadeau followed suit. Then Jay Andrews hit for two bases, scoring both men, and Andy Anderson smashed out a safe hit, scoring the "Doc." Schmeer got into on Schwartz's error, but neither Nadeau nor Schmeer could negotiate, and that ended the run getting, so far as Portland was concerned.

Seattle started things in the second when Zinsar walked, stole second, scoring on Parke Wilson's two-bagger. Parke took third while Simple was being retired at first. Zeigler hit to Ralphy, who threw wild to Vigneux, and Wilson scored.

Seattle annexed another in the third on Schwartz's safe hit, that went taking third when Hees threw badly to catch him stealing. Second, Carl Smith smashed out a line drive which was gathered in by Claude Schmeer, who made a sensational one-handed catch. Wilson's lead made it 4-0 in the next inning, when Jansing hit the ball out of the lot for the circuit.

Schwartz brought in the fifth run when his drive to left got away from Schmeer, and netted him three bases, and Carl Smith again scored him with a long fly.

Andrews' work at third and Andy Anderson's batting were features, and Nadeau and Schmeer were the stars of the day in the outfield.

GANS CONSIDERED
A GREAT BOXER

Champion's Clever Exhibition With Fitzgerald Was Greatly Appreciated By the Talent Last Friday Night.

Fitzgerald's Manager Refused to Proceed Unless the Purse Was Split, and Al Herford Accordingly Agreed.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1.—Joe Gans is certainly the rightful holder of the world's lightweight championship title. The clever manner in which he polished off Willie Fitzgerald, the game Brooklyn lightweight, showed it. He fought a cool, clever battle from the start, and the result was never in doubt. It was only a question of how long it would be before Fitzgerald would hit the carpet.

When the master of ceremonies, Billy Jordan, introduced the pugilists the big Pavilion was well filled. The betting was greatly in favor of the champion, odds being 10 to 4. After a few challenges were read, one being from J. Britt at 133 pounds ringside, the men were given the usual talk by the referee and the big mill was on.

Chand went slowly to the center of the ring and immediately took the aggressive part of the milling. He followed Willie around and kept following his way to an opening. He landed lightly, which brought a rush from the Brooklyn lad. The latter swung heavily with his right, but the champion blocked the blow. This forced Gans to take the defensive. He then waited for his opponent to come to him. It was seen that Fitz was against it as early as this, for he rushed repeatedly, with little success. Gans did not seem to let out in this round.

The second proved a bit faster. Fitz adopted a Jeffries crouch from this round on, but it did not seem to help him any. He landed a good right and left on the champion early in this round, but was the recipient of many short hooks for his trouble. There was some fast fighting in this round, and Fitz showed up a little better.

The third and fourth rounds were fast, but in favor of the champion. The latter took the aggressiveness from this round on and made a great fight. He followed the Brooklynite all over the ring and landed good and hard time, and again, but always found his game opponent coming for more. In only one round did the loser seem to have a chance. This was in the ninth. He mixed matters with the champion and seemed to make the better showing in all of them.

The end came early in the tenth round. Fitz came up with a smile and planted right and left on the champions body, which seemed to anger him. The latter went after his man, and during a fierce mix sent him to the floor with a right to the head for the second time. He arose, only to go down for the count from a left to the ear.

Thus ended a contest that was appreciated by all who witnessed it. It was not a rough-house affair, but a contest between two men who displayed great courage and cleverness. Fitzgerald's gameness brought forth cheers from the spectators several times. He made a good fight but was outclassed.

Of Gans it may be said that he is a world class fighter. He is a man who is a sportsman who unconsciously draws the color line of prejudice he would certainly be the idol of the men who love the game. He showed last night that he is possessed of all that is needed by a champion—extreme cleverness, good punching ability and ring generalship.

Split the Money.
While the men were adjusting their fighting to the managers of both were having it out in great style over the division of the purse. Manager Weedon insisted on having an even split, and backed up his request by saying that if Herford did not accede to his demands that there would be no fight. After much talk Herford agreed to the split. The latter stated this morning that he had been after Weedon repeatedly in regard to the purse, but that he had always been put off and could do nothing. He was willing to let his fighter go on at a 60 and 40 basis. It has also leaked out that the men did not fight at 135 pounds at 3 o'clock, as was advertised, but that they had agreed to meet at catchweights, which greatly favored the colored man.

In the dressing rooms after the fight Gans did not display a mark from the encounter. In fact, he looked as if he was going into the ring. "I had him from the start," said the champion. "That's why I did not rush him too hard. I knew that all I had to do was to block his punches and put the finisher over. I watched him closely and after blocking a few in the final round put it over. I am thinking about taking a rest now until about September and will then turn my attention to Mr. Britt. I am after him, because I know he is easier than Fitzgerald."

Fitzgerald merely said that he was up against a better man, but thought that he had an even break until the wallops came over.

The gate receipts amounted to \$7,632. Of this the fighters split 60 per cent, the club pocketing the remainder. Herford is reported to have won about \$4,000 on his protégé's win. Most of the money went up that his man would win before the 15th round was reached.

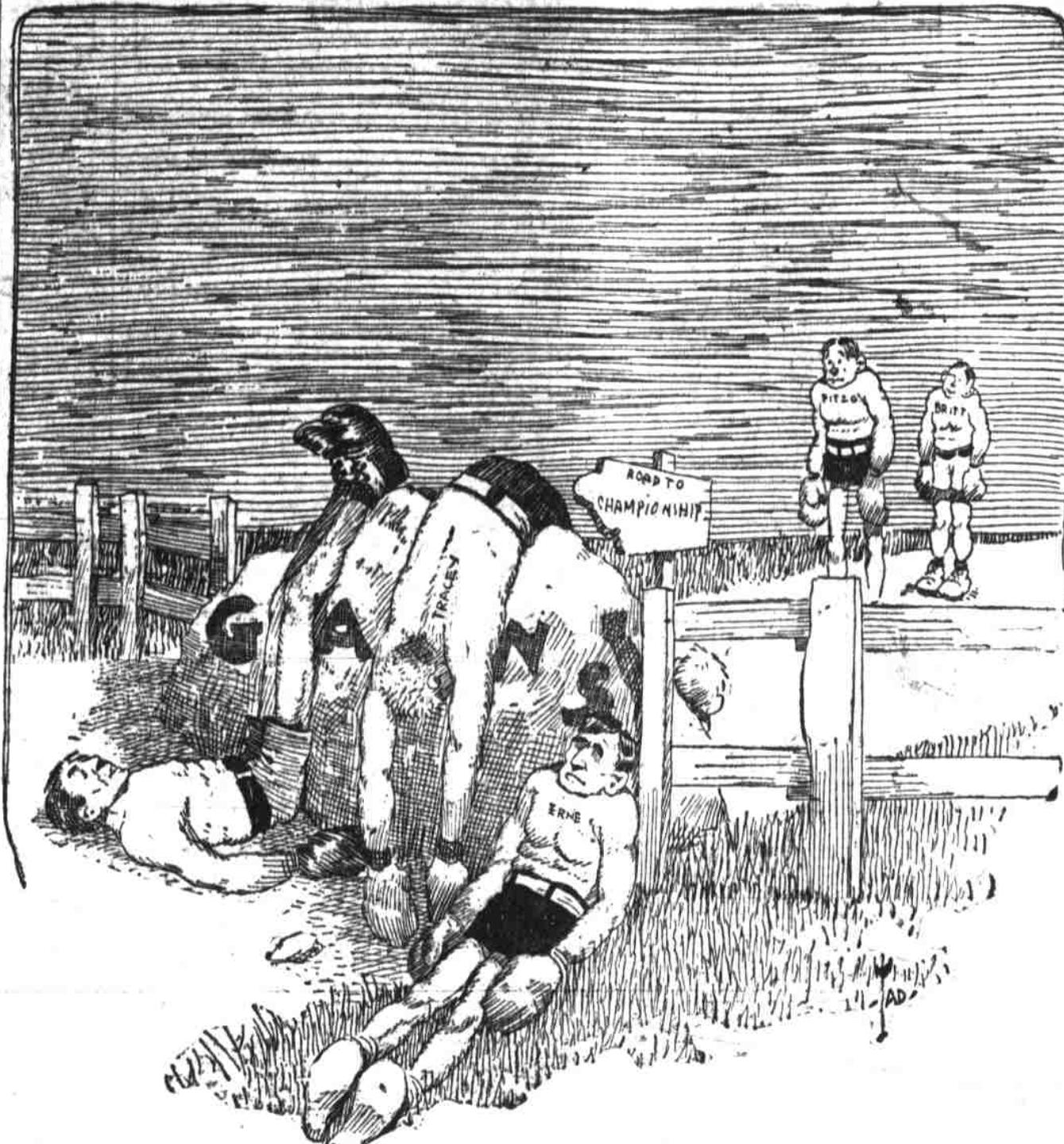
