SEATTLE, Wash., June 13.—Jay Hughes was in fine form yesterday and he shut the Portland team out, allowing the only five hits. "Spec" Hurlburt, formerly of Dugdale's team joined Vigneux yesterday and played right field. Charlie Shields started to pitch for Portland but retired in the first inning owing to a sore arm. Joe Kostal took his place and pitched a nice game. Inability to hit Hughes was the reason for Portland's defeat. George Engle played third base for the Browns, while Sammy Vigneux went to first and Hurlburt covered the right garden.

BY SPARRING PARTNER

A Friendly Exhibition Ends in
Favorite Taking the
Count.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 13.—Big Al Limerick of Buffalo, whose fighting name is "Bob Nash," Philadelphia Jack O'Brien's sparring partner, went at O'Brien savagely in their three-round exhibition in the local playhouse recently and had him almost out when time was called. He floored O'Brien three times in the last minute. The audience rushed on the stage and Nash narrowly escaped violence.
After the curtain had been rung down, O'Brien came before the footlights and apologized for what had happened. He said he had been taken unawares by Nash.
"I looked for nothing but a friendly bout," said O'Brien, "but Nash, who weighs 235 pounds, seeing an opening, took advantage of it and came near knocking me out."
It was at this point that 50 or more men in the house made a rush for the stage to "do Nash up." The police stopped them before any damage had been done.
O'Brien said afterwards that Nash is a great fighter. Last night's affair, however, breaks up the combination.
In a statement setting forth his side of the case Nash said:
"I took no unfair advantage of O'Brien. He and those actor guys kidded me a lot yesterday, and in the dressing room last night O'Brien told one of the mugs that he would make me look like a painted red Indian when we got the gloves on. I said: 'Go ahead and do your best, and I'll show you how much you can do.' He got gay the minute we put our hands, and I went at him. I had him out twice, if we had a regular referee to count the 10 seconds. I allowed no duffer to make a monkey out of me."

INTEREST GROWS
IN LOCAL CRICKET

Devotee of the Interesting and
Scientific Game Writes Con-
cerning the Popular Pas-
time's Growth in This City.

Portland Cricket Club Has Al-
ready Begun Active Training
for This Season and Will
Play Matches.

The following short history of cricket, its excellence and birth in this city was contributed to The Journal by an old devotee of the game. It will be read with interest by followers of the popular game.
Cricket is the national game of England as baseball is of America. Wherever the sons of either country are found sure enough you will find their national game played. Both are many games and there is no closer or more gentlemanly sport than cricket.
At some of the big cricket matches in England it is no uncommon sight to witness ten to twenty thousand persons keenly watching the game, sometimes the contest lasting several days. There is no more scientific game played than cricket, and to thoroughly understand the mode of attack by the bowlers and the defense by the batters makes the game extremely interesting.

Its Start in Portland.
Cricket has been played in Portland for a number of years, but the country's best cricket players have been mentioned S. L. N. Gilman, James Laidlaw, the British Consul, George H. Andrews, Jonathan Bourne and A. M. Crocker. These men played as far back as 1876.

Coming down to later years, 1895, a team from Victoria, B. C., visited Portland and met defeat at the hands of the local eleven. In 1896 a combined eleven from Oregon visited British Columbia and, although they met the best cricketers out North, did fairly well. In 1897 a strong team from Vancouver visited this city and played two games with the Portland team and were defeated in both matches.

Vancouver again tried conclusions with Portland in 1900, and the worst of a drawn game. In 1901, teams from Seattle and Tacoma were here, but they, too, met defeat. This year also Oregon sent a team north, playing Vancouver, Seattle and Tacoma. Last year a combined team from Seattle and Tacoma, also a team from Vancouver, played here, Portland defeating the combined Sound teams, but lost one to Vancouver and drew another.

The Outlook.
The outlook for this year gives promise of several good matches. Games will be played with the Sound clubs, and Portland expects to place two elevens in the field. Astoria has good players in Astburg and Wilkinson, who will no doubt assist in playing against the Northern teams. The ball grounds at Twenty-fourth and Vaughn streets are now covered with a fine grass field and Jerry Trott, the caretaker, will spare no pains to make the field as perfect as possible. Today the first practice game will be held, and next week the players will regularly turn out several evenings and get in form for the season.

The membership fee has been fixed at \$3 for the season and there is no reason why lovers of cricket should not support in a liberal manner such beautiful sport.
A smoker has been suggested and doubtless in the very near future we shall be pleased to chronicle the doings of the Portland Cricket Club along with the other many sports which The Journal is always ready and willing to encourage. CANS TO SECOND
PETER JACKSON

Lightweight Champion Wires
That He Will Be on Hand to
Look After Jackson on the
Night of the Contest.

Jackson Tells an Interesting
Story on Himself as to How
He Came to Be Called Young
Peter Jackson.

Young Peter Jackson of California who boxes Joe Walcott next Thursday night for the title of welterweight champion, has had a more varied experience than any other boxer in the world. When asked how he came to take the name of Young Peter Jackson he replied: "Well, you see, it was like this. I was working around Denver in a large jewelry house doing the window washing and sweeping and a lot of other chores, when a big rancher came in and started a rough house with the proprietor, Mr. Louis Oppenstein. I interfered in my boss's behalf and me and the cowboy got together and I knocked him out in just two minutes. Well, this fellow was so long coming to, that we dragged him to the rear part of the store and he never did wake up until one hour had went around."

A Scared Figger.
Well, if you ever did see a scared figger I was one. There was about five customers in the store and amongst them was Randy Gallagher, the mild-mannered pugilist who was then, and is now, instructor of the Denver Athletic Club, the sweetest club in the West. To cut the long story short, he was pulling off four-round contests every Friday night for the members only and he invited me to box a few rounds. He said he would give me five dollars. I said Mr. Gallagher, I don't want no money. All I want is my name in the paper. I looks and looks all that week in the papers and don't see my name, which is Sim Tompkins."

Look Yar, Mr. Gallagher!
So I goes to Mr. Gallagher and says: Look yar, Mr. Gallagher, if my name ain't in the paper tomorrow I'm not going to box. Well, he put me off anyway and finally goes up to box and when my box, which is the last one to come, day, he calls a fellow by the name of Bob Watkins, better known as the stockyard giant in Denver, he being the bully of the town. The next name called was Young Peter Jackson. Of course I never showed for a minute. I was so scared for me and the announcer called the name four times and no one answered. At last Mr. Gallagher came after me and said: 'Sim Tompkins, come on and get stripped.' I said, Mr. Gallagher, he called out Young Peter Jackson. Well, he said, Sim I gave you dat name myself. I said no sah, Mr. Gallagher, I'm not going to fight that big fellow. He's too big and husky. At last Mr. Gallagher said if I did not go and fight he would have me arrested and charged with getting money under false pretenses, as I had borrowed two dollars in advance from the club. To tell the truth that scared me worse than the fighter did. So I got into the ring and knocked him cold in three rounds and from that day on have kept on boxing and won't stop until I wins the title of welter weight champion of the world from that black Walcott next Thursday night."

The interest in the Walcott-Jackson fight is now at its height. Ring followers declare that it will be one of the best fights ever witnessed in the West and scores will be on hand to see the mill. Joe Gans wired last night that he will be here in a few days to look after Jackson and be second to him the night of the contest.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 13.—Threatening weather and the fact that today is Derby Day, tended to cut down the attendance at The Meadows yesterday afternoon. Not that the crowd that passed the turnstiles was a small one, by any means, but 2,500 people do not make as much showing in the race enclosure as the five and six thousand that have marked each day's races since the opening day.
The track was heavy on account of the rain over night, and it looked a good day for the mud larks. The track dried rapidly, however, and at starting time was in fairly good condition.
The day proved to be a lucky one for the talent, well-played favorites getting home in front almost without exception. As a result the bookies were hard hit, and the betting public happy, which was as it should be, from the standpoint of popularity.

In the second race, as the horses came under the wire, Collis, a derby winner, lost his seat and rolled to the ground. He picked himself up no worse for the spill and in the next race piloted Espirando to victory. When he drew up in front of the judges' stand he was given an ovation that amply atoned for the mortification caused by his mishap.

Today is Derby Day, and it is predicted that the attendance will exceed by some thousands any crowd ever seen on a race track in the Northwest. The high class of the entries for the big event make it certain that the struggle will be well worth seeing.

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FISTIC CARNIVAL
BY BUTTE SPORTS

Thousands Gather to Witness
Jimmy Britt and Jack
O'Keefe Battle for Large
Purse and Decision.

Miners' Day in the Lively City
Is Being Roundly Celebrated,
the Second Event Being Be-
tween Herrera and Broad.

HELENA, Mont., June 13.—All eyes are centered on Butte, where today the greatest fistic tournament in the history of the state is being pulled off. The goes between Britt and O'Keefe and Broad and Herrera are undoubtedly the best bouts ever essayed to bring off in the state. The crowds are something enormous and seldom has anything transpired which caused so much money to be bet.

The betting this morning on Britt and O'Keefe is 10 to 7, with Britt the favorite. The friends of Herrera and Broad are waving even money on their men. Duncan McDonald will act as referee in both bouts. The managers of the Britt-O'Keefe contest honor McDonald by placing his picture on the lithographs with this caption: "The man who never made a wrong decision." The fight is advertised as being for the white lightweight championship of the world.

Seldom have four men trained more conscientiously than Britt, O'Keefe, Broad and Herrera. All have worked like Trojans and when they enter the ring later today, the results will depend solely upon ability, for so far as condition goes, all are in prime shape. All of the railroads ran special excursions to Butte, and in addition, all of the mines closed down in honor of Miners' Union Day, thus liberating close onto 10,000 of the men who delve in the bowels of the earth, and it is a safe bet that nine out of every 10 of them will see one of the two events.

Great Interest.

While more interest is taken in the Britt-O'Keefe contest because of its championship aspect, both Broad and Herrera are far from being without friends. Parson Davies, who is looking out for the interests of Kid Broad, is himself the center of attraction, this being his first appearance in Montana in a public exhibition, although he visited the state with John L. Sullivan 10 years ago.
The Parson is the same genial, wholesome fellow as remembered by many Easterners. His looks are tinged with gray, which serves only to further impress one with his dignity. That the Parson is a "blueblooded" sport is shown by the fact that he is covering all of the Bros' money offered.

Baseball.

There will be "something doing" shortly in the baseball world. This much is known, but just what it will be those in authority decline to talk. Whether it will be in the nature of a compromise or a backdown no one will divulge. On all sides, however, it is acknowledged that it is proving a losing venture for the Pacific Nationals.
In Portland, the Coast is doing the greater part of the business. Some spirited correspondence is being carried on and in addition President Lucas, who called on San Francisco to consult with Harris. All of this means that something is on tap, and from a remark dropped from one who is in a position to know, this is probable to come within a short time.
