## COLONEL DUNBAR WRIGGLES OUT OF IT

### Grand Jury Indictment Against Big Hotel Man Fails to Hold.

(Journal Special Service.) SEATTLE Wash., June 13.—Another grand jury indictment failed to be recorded late yesterday afternoon when Superior Judge Bell granted a motion to dismiss the indictment against H. B. Dunbar, charged with aiding and abetting the operation of crooked gambling games in the Rainier Grand hotel, one of the finest hostilities in the Northwest, of which he was manager.

The ruling of the court was that the law under which the defendant was indicted had been repealed by the passage of the new felony gambling bill, and that if convicted, Dunbar could not, legally, be sentenced.

The new law says nothing about "crooked" gambling games.

The feeling of good fellowship that exists between the faculty and cadets of Hill Military Academy and the instructors and students of all the other principal schools in Portland is clearly brought out, as the majority of them will be guests at the commencement hop.

It is said that Chief Hunt is decidedly opposed to Caswell's appointment as special officer to perform his present duties, and for this reason he made a recent order requiring the day patrolmen to pay particular attention to the streets and sidewalks. It is also said the chief greatly dislikes the idea of Caswell reporting to Mayor Williams and the Civic Improvement Federation.

According to rumor, Caswell intends to take the regular civil service examination for the position of detective within a few days. Secretary Reed, who has been asked to give up his position as acting president of the board, is expected to resign in a few days.
