

DAYLIGHT ON THE SCENES IN HEPPNER

Awful Strain on Those Engaged in Rescue Work and Others Who Are Called Upon to Act in Various Vocations.

Many Have Labored for Two Days Without a Moment's Sleep—Pathetic Incidents Now that the First of the Horror Is Over.

At 10 o'clock last night another telegram was received from the Head Consul at Denver, Colo. June 17.—J. M. Woodworth, Secretary Heppner, W. O. W. Relief Committee, Portland, Or.—Head camp has appropriated \$1,000, favor C. V. Cooper, head banker, Ladd & Tilton Bank, Portland, Or., and subject to your order. Have also issued appeal to every camp in entire order. You should have \$5,000 in your hands within ten days. Signed, F. A. Falkenberg, Head Consul.

This means that contributions will flow in from not only the Oregon camps and circles of the Woodmen of the World, and Women of Woodcraft and Ladies' Auxiliary, but from local lodges of the entire state. The committee desires to particularly impress on all camps and circles of the order that their appropriations should all be made in favor of C. V. Cooper, head banker of the Woodmen of the World, and remitted to him in care of Ladd & Tilton's Bank, Portland, Or.

Local Donations.
There are eighteen local lodges of the Woodmen of the World and Women of Woodcraft in the City of Portland. Three of these met last night and made appropriations as follows: Oregon Circle, \$20; Nomsa Circle, \$5; Portland Camp, \$50.

The committee feel elated over the magnificent donation of \$1,000 by the Grand Lodge at Denver, and today dispatched a special committee to Heppner to make distribution of the funds and supplies as they continue to be received from the various camps and circles of the order.

Left for Heppner Today.
This morning advices were received that the Grand Circle, Women of Woodcraft, had also donated \$1,000. With \$2,000 to begin with, a committee of Woodmen, which left for Heppner this morning, will have means to do immediate good, and with six or eight thousand dollars which will continue to flow in from the camps and circles of the Pacific Coast, the Woodmen of the World will perform no small part in the relief of the Heppner sufferers. Their work will not be confined to members of the Woodcraft, but will be generously extended where most needed. It is estimated by the committee that the Woodmen of the World and Women of Woodcraft will also have nearly \$100,000 to pay in insurance death losses, but the order has an ample emergency fund to meet all such contingencies.

ASTORIA GIVES HEPPNER HELP

ASTORIA, Or., June 18.—Mayor Suprenant of this city is in receipt of a telegram from Frank Gilliam, mayor of Heppner, asking aid for the sufferers of the stricken town. The telegram follows:

"HEPPNER, Or., June 17.—Mayor Suprenant, Astoria. In your appalling. No help needed but money and aid badly. FRANK GILLIAM, Mayor."
Mayor Suprenant will appoint a committee to raise funds, and persons wishing to assist may leave money with the committee or at the different banks of the city.

SAVED BY JAPANESE

HEPPNER, June 18.—But for the heroism of Pomekeda, the Japanese cook at the Palace Hotel, the total of deaths by drowning would have been increased by at least two more.

Pomekeda was standing by a window in the kitchen of the hotel when he saw two women, one of them being Mrs. Brock, floating on top of some debris. Instead of rushing upstairs in an endeavor to save his own life, the cook remained at his post of duty and, with the aid of ropes, finally succeeded in hauling the two women into the hotel building.

PENDLETON MAYOR CARRIES RELIEF

PENDLETON, June 18.—Mayor Halley left for Heppner this morning with \$1,750, a relief fund subscribed as follows:
City Council, \$500; I. O. O. F., \$400; Masons, \$300; Redmen, \$100; German Aid Society, \$250; painters, \$20.
Freewater sends \$100 and Milton \$250 to Heppner.

Five miles of railroad rails have been ordered from Pendleton to the Heppner branch.

T. W. AYERS, SR., ESCAPED

Portland papers have reported that T. W. Ayers, Sr., a prominent resident of Heppner, was one of the victims of the disaster at that place. The Journal wired for special information, doubting the truth of the report of his death, and receives from its correspondent the good news that Mr. Ayers is alive and well, greatly assisting in the work of relief and restoration.

ATHENA COMES TO AID OF HEPPNER

PENDLETON, Or., June 18.—The town of Athena has turned over the funds raised for a celebration on the fourth to the destitute at the stricken cities of Heppner and Lexington and has sent her Mayor to the scene with the cash. They had raised about \$500.

RELIEF FUND STANDS AT \$11,585.04 TODAY

All day the special soliciting committee appointed by the Heppner General Relief Committee were at work throughout the business districts of Portland and the relief fund was swelled by many additional liberal subscriptions. The total this afternoon was announced to be \$11,585.04, and the work was still going on. It is expected that about \$5,000 will result from the theatrical benefit to be given next Tuesday afternoon, and on Sunday a benefit baseball game is to be played. Receipts from these events will be added to the general Portland fund.

ESTIMATES OF LOSS ARE NOW INCREASED

HEPPNER, Or., June 18.—T. W. Ayres, Sr., and family are all safe. John Ayres, a nephew of Tom Ayres, Jr., is drowned.
Chairman Conser of the relief committee raises the original estimate of property losses wired The Journal to \$300,000.
Volunteer searchers are strung down the creek nine miles working like beavers.

DROWNED COULD TO HEPPNER

Mark P. Cargill Encounters Death in a Flood While on His Way to Assist Cloudburst Sufferers.

Relief Party from Pendleton Cut in Two by a Rush of Waters in Coombs' Canyon and Forced to Return.

Other Loss of Life Is Feared, as Monday Night's Storm Left Marks of Great Destruction in the Mountains.

PENDLETON, Or., June 18.—The rumors current here and in Heppner regarding the cutting off of the relief train sent to Heppner from Pendleton and subsequent loss of life are partially confirmed. The body of Mark P. Cargill was found yesterday by a boy eight miles from the crossing of Birch Creek, in Coombs' Canyon.

Cargill was one of the party starting from here with supplies for the Heppner sufferers. When the train, which was composed of six teams, reached Birch Creek, Monday night, a terrific storm was encountered and in a few moments the creek was running bank deep with water. Two of the teams succeeded in crossing in safety, but as quickly as Cargill entered the water he was swept down stream and drowned. The remaining teams turned back to Pendleton, as it was impossible to get through to Heppner.

The same flood which cost Cargill his life swept several buildings from their foundations, and completely demolished the schoolhouse in District No. 48. A house belonging to a man named Bliskee was carried down the stream three-quarters of a mile. A number of people were in the house at the time, but they all escaped injury.

Hallstones weighing several ounces fell in great quantities and stripped all the trees in its path of foliage.
Mark P. Cargill has been a resident of Pendleton for 20 years, and was well known throughout Umatilla County. His body was brought to Pendleton today.

It is feared that other lives were lost in Monday night's storm, which carried destruction and fright into every locality heard from. The marks of several cloudbursts are noticeable throughout the mountains, and meager reports from isolated districts show the loss of stock and horses to have been great.

SAYS THE WHITE WOMAN BADE HIM

Negro Murderer on the Witness Stand Says that His White Paramour Encouraged Him to Kill Mrs. Leroy.

Said that He Would Not Have Committed the Crime Unless He Had Been Intoxicated—Got Little Money.

OAKLAND, June 18.—"I do not know why I killed Mrs. Leroy," murderer Walker said, when on the stand testifying in his own behalf today. "I am guilty and am ready to suffer, but Annie put me up to it and plied me with liquor, urging me on till I went crazy and struck the old woman with a piece of lead pipe on the side of her head as she sat in her chair asleep." He said that Annie, his white paramour, sat on a lounge winking at him to encourage him. The amount of money he got was \$36.50.

A month ago Walker and Mrs. Annie Ross, a white woman, went to Oakland and visited Mrs. Leroy, an aged colored woman. While there the man killed Mrs. Leroy and buried her body in the yard. The white woman confessed 10 days later.

TO PROTECT DEWEY AND HIS COWBOYS

Governor of Kansas Orders that They Await Murder Trial in Penitentiary.

TOPEKA, June 18.—The Governor today wired the Attorney-General at St. Francis to have the order of commitment for Chances Dewey and the two cowboys changed so as to be held awaiting trial in the state penitentiary or the reformatory at Hutchinson. He believes the prisoners are unsafe at Goodland and has ordered troops to stay on duty until further orders.

AGED PONTIFF IS REPORTED SICK

Again Is Deep Concern Being Felt for the Pope—Germany Asks for Official Bulletins of His Condition.

From Madrid Comes Report that His Holiness Is Ill But Not Seriously So—News at the Vatican.

PARIS, June 18.—The Rappel of this morning says the Prussian plenipotentiary at the Vatican has been instructed to send daily bulletins of the pope's condition, which is again very precarious.

ROME, June 18.—At the Vatican there is a feeling of great concern, but it is bulletined that His Holiness is suffering no very serious attack.

TO INVESTIGATE ASSAULT

DELAWARE, O., June 18.—The unprovoked assault upon Prince Yee, a young Korean nobleman attending the Wesleyan University, by Joe Skout, a farmer, has been taken up by the Korean officials in Washington. This morning Charles Medham, counsel for the Korean legation arrived here and made a thorough investigation. He visited the city officials and county prosecutor. He declines to state what steps will be taken but says the affair shall not be lightly passed.
