SMUGGLING OF JAPS INTO THIS COUNTRY

Two Little Brown Men Found on Incoming Vessel Leads to a Discovery.

(Journal Special Service.) **SEATTLE, Wash., June 18.**—Mail advices from Yokohama by the Iyo Maru tell of the startling discovery of a mammoth scheme to illegally ship Japanese immigrants into the United States through Seattle.

The discovery of two country lads stowed away on the Nippon Yusen Kaisha's Kaga Maru at Yokohama as she was ready to sail to Seattle, May 5, led to the arrest of a gang of sharpers. Led by one Otojro Yasukawa, the gang had been engaged in alluring green young men from the country districts and charging them 150 yen or more for stowing them away aboard the Japanese liner.

They had opened branch offices at Hiroshima and Kobe to carry on the nefarious business. The outlaws had gone to the extreme of bribing the crews of the steamer to put the stowaways aboard.

Six men besides the two caught on the Kaga were found ready to be transported at Yokohama. Several thousand yen secured by the gang in the trade were recovered by the police.

D. DALGLEISH DEAD

Oregon Pioneer Passed Away at Los Angeles After Long Illness.

—Well Known.

At Los Angeles, Cal., where he had gone in search of better health, David Dalgleish, a pioneer of the Northwest, and a wool manufacturer of prominence, died yesterday. Deceased was 65 years of age and had for some time been suffering from a complication of diseases. His wife and one daughter, Mrs. J. Balkie, survive him. The funeral will be held in this city, the body having already been shipped from Los Angeles. David Dalgleish came to Salem, Or., in 1870. He was a native of Scotland and an expert wool weaver. He became interested in the Salem woolen mills and later went to Brownsville. In 1875 he came to Portland and engaged in the warehouse business, later retiring.

WELCOMING PETER TO SERBIAN THRONE

Russia Utters Official Communication—Te Deum Sung in Geneva.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 18.—An official communication was published this morning welcoming the accession of Peter to the Serbian throne, and expressing the conviction that he will severely punish all regicides whose acts, if not condemned, will be a menace to future tranquility in Serbia.

GENEVA, June 18.—A Te Deum celebration of Peter's accession to the Serbian throne was sung in the Orthodox Church today. The Prince and leading members of the Serbian colony and the consul and vice-consul of the Russian Embassy were present. The Prince was loudly cheered on his arrival and departure. The mission sent by the Serbian government to notify Peter of his election as King arrived today.
