

TEACHERS ARE STUDENTS NOW

Western Division of Oregon Pedagogues Are Carrying on Work of Education in Portland Today.

Departmental Sessions Held This Morning and General Meeting Will Occur This Afternoon—Notables Here.

The third annual session of the Western Division of the Oregon Teachers' Association was continued today at the Portland High School Building. The program as previously announced being carried out without a hitch. The greater part of the day was devoted to departmental work but general meetings were held at 10:30 o'clock in the morning and 2:30 in the afternoon.

Among the 700 delegates and visitors in attendance are all of the prominent educators and scientists of the Pacific Northwest. All have entered with a will into the work out for them and much good is expected to result from the mammoth meeting now in progress.

Stephen B. L. Penrose, president of Whitman College at Walla Walla, is taking a prominent part in the various meetings and high appreciation is expressed of his efforts. The editor of the Moderator, H. D. Patterson of Lansing, Mich., is also in attendance, as is State School Superintendent Ackerman of Salem.

Frank Rigler, superintendent of the Portland public schools, delivered an address at the opening of the convention yesterday afternoon. H. D. Patterson replying. Prof. J. B. Horner of Corvallis read an interesting paper.

Oregon the Literary Mother. Prof. Rigler alluded to Oregon as the "literary mother of the Northwest," as he was his reason for this assertion that the time once when all the Northwest was Oregon.

Exercises were held at the First Presbyterian Church last night at which Mayor Williams and Prof. R. F. Robinson welcomed the visiting teachers to Portland. State Superintendent Ackerman responded. FACTS REGARDING SUPPLY OF ROCKS

Material for Columbia River Jetty Will Be Taken from Bugby Quarry.

(Journal Special Service.) ASTORIA, June 25.—It has been learned that the determination of the Northwestern Construction Company to abandon the Mayger quarry for that near Bugby is not due to any misarrangement of plans, but that the move was contemplated even before the work of getting out rock for the big jetty at the mouth of the Columbia was undertaken. The report that the company was unable to fill its contract at the present quarry, because of its remoteness and the truth of the matter has leaked out.

The Mayger quarry is the property of the contracting company, while the Bugby quarry is now under lease to the government. The Bugby property was leased to L. Parson, a wealthy timber land owner, and the lease was executed more than a year ago. On this quarry there is an unlimited quantity of excellent rock.

When bids for furnishing rock were asked the Northwestern Construction Company presented an offer of 91 cents a ton. The next lowest bid was \$1.25. Because of the fact that the local company had put in a very low bid, the government engineers were inclined to be lenient, and permission was granted the company to utilize the Mayger rock until such time as arrangements could be made to operate at Bugby. The contract calls for 1,000 tons of rock daily until 625,000 tons in all are delivered. When work was commenced at Mayger it was not expected by the engineer department that 1,000 tons daily would be furnished, and the 700 tons that are being sent down every 24 hours is much more than even the engineers anticipated.

Preparing for a Change. At present the company has a force of men at work extending its line into the Bugby quarry. Owing to the elevation there the work is necessarily slow, but in 30 days operations will be begun. At this location rock is quite plentiful and the work will proceed much more rapidly than at Mayger. The number of men employed at Mayger is 125, but some trouble has been experienced in keeping a full force. It is said that 15 men quit work every day, their places being filled by men from the cities of the Northwest.

While the Mayger rock is inferior in quality to that at Bugby, it is suitable for the preliminary work now being carried on. The supply at Bugby is practically unlimited and the government has been made that the contracting company will furnish much more than the specified 1,000 tons of rock daily.

After the 625,000 tons heretofore contracted for are furnished, an additional 1,000,000 tons will be required to carry out the work of extending the jetty. Necessarily, the company feels that it should make a favorable showing in its present contract. The extensive rivalry for the contract has resulted in more or less "knocking," and the reported failure of the company to fill its agreement is attributed to this. No further difficulty will be experienced in furnishing the rock.

Matti Jarvi Sentenced. ASTORIA, June 25.—Matti Jarvi, the young Finn who murdered his father in cold blood because the old man came home in an intoxicated condition, was sentenced yesterday afternoon to serve a term of seven and one-half years in the penitentiary by Circuit Judge McBride. The case against Jarvi had been set for trial today, but the defendant was arraigned yesterday.

Senator Fulton appeared for Jarvi and stated to the court that he was willing that Jarvi should be hanged if he entered a plea of guilty. He explained that there were extenuating circumstances connected with the killing which would naturally lessen the sentiment against the son. The father, he related, had often come home drunk, had abused the members of the family and had several times assaulted the defendant. On the fateful night the elder Jarvi had gone home in an irresponsible condition, and the son, wishing to frighten him away, had proceeded to the front door armed with a revolver. The old man seized the weapon and in a struggle which followed it had been discharged.

CLEARED AT ASTORIA. (Journal Special Service.) ASTORIA, Or., June 25.—There sailed yesterday evening from this port the cargo Santa Paula in tow of the tug Rescue, for San Francisco. The Swedish ship, Captain Carlsson, sailed today for Alcoa Bay with wheat and flour.

MARINE NOTES. The British ship Agnes Oswald has run aground of the Agnes quarantine officials and is being placed through a very thorough and rigid examination. She reached there from Honolulu some days ago in ballast. The tug River is at the mouth of the Rogue River and is all at sea for the Orient. On her arrival at Astoria she was seized by the Astoria quarantine office and placed in quarantine. Each piece of her rock ballast is being separately dipped in a special prepared acid, which is supposed to kill any germ that may exist. She will be held in quarantine for the regulation time of 10 days awaiting any other conditions that may develop. On her release she will proceed to Portland and commence loading her general merchandise. Passengers report that the muddy river water is noticeable for over 25 miles out to sea.

The prospects of ever removing the schooner Berwick from the beach at the mouth of the Rogue River are all most hopeless. Since going ashore the channel has changed to the northward, and she is now high and dry and a long distance from deep water.

The cargo of Asiatic liner Indrapura is due from the Orient today with a fair cargo of Oriental goods. As customary with liners of this company, she has a full cargo awaiting her here.

Rev. Earl Wilber, pastor of the New Castle, Pa., Christian Church, occupied the pitcher's box at a game of baseball played by local clubs last week. Mr. Wilber is an earnest advocate of clean athletic sports and does all in his power to encourage them.

BURGLARS CALL TWICE IN SALEM

Ransack a House Which They Had Visited the Day Before—Were Frightened Away in Both Instances.

Marion County Court July List Drawn—Session Begins July 13—Other Interesting News Items from the Capital.

(Journal Special Service.) SALEM, June 25.—Burglars entered the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Sutherland in this city between the hours of 2 and 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and after searching the house thoroughly and turning the bureau drawers and other receptacles inside out, carried off a few pieces of jewelry, such as scarfpins, brooches, etc. The family was away during the hours named, and on their return found the entire house "turned upside down." A gold watch, kept in an upstairs room, was found lying in a corner of a room on the lower floor, where it evidently had been thrown by the thieves, who had apparently been frightened away by some one coming to the house.

It developed last evening that during the afternoon several ladies had called at the house, but receiving no response to rings of the doorbell, left. It is believed that the burglars, hearing the doorbell, left hurriedly, throwing the watch away for fear of being caught with it in their possession.

Mrs. Sutherland recalls that on the preceding day a number of articles were found scattered about an upstairs room, on her return home after a few hours' absence, but on inquiry among members of the family as to who had done this, she was jokingly informed that she doubtless had done this herself. A lady, calling at the house during the afternoon, informed the family that she saw the doorbell and heard some one moving about the house, but receiving no response she left. It is believed that the same parties visited the house on the preceding day, and being frightened away, returned yesterday to complete their work of despoiling the house. The officers are working on the case, and may land the guilty parties in jail. It is possible, however, that the burglars are tramps, in which case they are doubtless far away before this time.

GRESHAM BUILDING UP. T. E. Howitt's Grocery Store Nearly Finished—Daniel W. Metzger Sells His Home.

(Journal Special Service.) GRESHAM, Or., June 25.—During the last few weeks, or since the hotel fire which also destroyed the store belonging to T. R. Howitt and also his meatmarket, he has been working on the new structure, just east of the new implement store belonging to W. H. Hamilton.

His stock of groceries and meatmarket are temporarily carried in a small building on the corner of the street. The new building is to be modern in every way and its situation is very good, as it has a north front, and will also be furnished with a basement. The building will be completed in a short time and once more the village will have its former number of first-class grocery stores.

Sells Fine Property. One of the most slightly residences of this place was sold this week to parties from Pleasant Hill. It was the dwelling of Daniel W. Metzger and his wife, and was sold to George W. Leslie who sold a fine farm just east of Pleasant Hill. They have been looking for a location for some time and were finally convinced that this was the most desirable place to be in. Metzger and his wife are as a consequence they invested in property which is on the advance.

ASKS FOR INJUNCTION. X. J. Failing Declares City of Portland Had No Right to Build Cement Walk.

X. J. Failing has filed suit against the City of Portland and the municipal treasurer, J. E. Werlein, to restrain the defendants from selling her property to foreclose a lien. The city constructed a cement sidewalk along the west side of lots 7 and 8 of block 52, of the original City of Portland and levied an assessment of \$476.87 upon Mrs. Failing.

This plaintiff refused to pay and on February 26 a lien was docketed against the property. An ordinance passed by the Council August 6, 1902, provided that in districts where cement walks were required, if a fill averaging over two feet in each 50 feet was necessary for the building of a walk, wooden walks could be placed. The plaintiff alleged that where she erected the cement walk abutting her premises a fill of from three to six feet was required. She asks for an order restraining the enforcement of the lien and desires that the cost of the action be taxed to the defendant.

FERRY TERMINAL PROBLEM. Mayor and Committee Looking Up the Location For North and South Ends.

The special committee from the Executive Board, accompanied by Mayor Williams, are investigating the problem of locating terminals for the proposed Albina Ferry this afternoon. They met at Russell street at 2 o'clock and proceeded to the point where it has been suggested that the north terminals be constructed. For their convenience a plat of the immediate district on each side of the river was furnished by City Engineer Elliott.

So far there has been no suggestions as to the probable location of the south end of the system. The committee will endeavor to settle the question from the information secured today.

WILL CELEBRATE FOURTH. (Journal Special Service.) THE DALLES, June 25.—At a meeting of the contributors to the Fourth of July fund held last night it was soon decided to hold a celebration at home formerly intended this city having donated \$2,000 to Heppner. It was the general opinion that the city had done enough, but if it was needed they would give more, but reports received from the city are to the effect that all the relief wanted is on hand.

School Directors Meet. SALEM, June 25.—The Board of Directors for the Salem schools met last night, when E. M. Croisan, the newly-elected director, was sworn into office and took his seat. Joseph Bannington, permanent clerk of the board, reported that the year was a successful one. It was decided that four rooms in the Park School, thus far unused, be placed in condition for use and the crowded condition of the Salem schools will thus be relieved at a small expense. Commissioners for the year were appointed by the chairman of the board.

Pardon Refused. SALEM, June 25.—George E. Chamberlain has refused a pardon asked for by Emmett Kimberling, serving a penitentiary term for the year for the larceny of a horse. Kimberling was sentenced in February from Grant County. The trial judge and the district attorney declined to endorse the petition for a pardon, as the prisoner was not a first offender and had been given under the law for the crime of which he was convicted. Kimberling was twice tried, the first jury disagreeing. During the time he awaited his second trial he broke jail twice but was recaptured.

FIRE AT CORVALLIS. More Than Fifteen Hundred Dollars' Worth of Property Goes Up in Smoke.

CORVALLIS, Or., June 25.—Corvallis was visited Tuesday morning about 4:30 o'clock by a fire in the Hemphill property at the corner of Second and Jefferson streets. The fire originated in the kitchen of Lederley's Restaurant and quickly spread to Cameron's harness shop on the south and to Ream's tailoring establishment on the north. The fire department was alerted and arrived at the scene and by 5 o'clock the fire was under control. The restaurant was practically destroyed. While the other two buildings were not burned so much, they were badly drenched with water and nearly everything in them ruined.

J. M. Cameron succeeded in getting most of his stock out of the burning building, but the up-stairs, which is a rooming house, was a total loss from the water.

The estimated total loss is: J. M. Cameron, \$50; Lederley's Restaurant, \$1,000; Mrs. Hemphill property, \$600; G. M. Ream, \$25; total, \$1,675.

Mrs. Lederley was the only one who carried any insurance, about \$90 in all.

Great credit is due the Corvallis volunteer fire department for the manner in which they handled the fire, also to the "Ladies Coffee Club," who were, and are always on hand to serve the boys with hot coffee and lunch after the fire was over.

Rural Telephones. There is a strong move on foot in Corvallis and Benton county for a rural telephone system, with free switching to all its subscribers. The present company will not extend its lines into the country, and the farmers of Benton very much desire to be in touch with the world at all times.

The plans are about completed for the formation of a company, each subscriber to be an shareholder. By this plan a complete system can be maintained and operated at a cost of about half what the present company demands.

JEALOUSY CAUSES ARREST. Clark County Business Man of Repute Summoned to Answer Charge of Brawl.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 25.—Dr. W. J. Taylor of Washougal was arrested yesterday afternoon on a warrant issued by the prosecuting attorney charged with practicing medicine without a license. The Sheriff served the warrant and brought Mr. Taylor to the city. He was later released on his recognizance.

It is not known at whose instigation the complaint was made but friends of the doctor charge that it is the result of professional jealousy. Mr. Taylor conducts a drug store at Washougal and while he has no license to practice medicine in the state has been a practitioner of standing in Portland and California. He alleges that he has not practiced medicine since he left Portland, where he had a state certificate.

Sergeant Watkins Fined and Let Go. VANCOUVER, Wash., June 25.—Sergeant Watkins, who fired on Private Merdith a few nights ago in a saloon brawl and narrowly escaped killing him, was tried by Justice Stewart yesterday afternoon, when Judge Taylor sentenced him to 30 days and costs. Sentiment is somewhat divided over the result of the trial; many holding that the attack was a cold-blooded attempt to kill and that Watkins should have been held to answer to the Superior Court for attempted murder. The officers explain that both the men were satisfied to call a halt and to leave with their regiment, the county was satisfied to collect \$50 instead of paying that sum in prosecution and according to the Sergeant was released. Watkins, Merdith and the soldier witnesses left last evening for the Presidio to join the Seventeenth.

Hayes, Company H, 17th Infantry, sentenced by Vancouver court-martial to six months' hard labor and \$50 fine for drunkenness on duty. JEALOUSY CAUSES ARREST. Clark County Business Man of Repute Summoned to Answer Charge of Brawl.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 25.—Dr. W. J. Taylor of Washougal was arrested yesterday afternoon on a warrant issued by the prosecuting attorney charged with practicing medicine without a license. The Sheriff served the warrant and brought Mr. Taylor to the city. He was later released on his recognizance.

It is not known at whose instigation the complaint was made but friends of the doctor charge that it is the result of professional jealousy. Mr. Taylor conducts a drug store at Washougal and while he has no license to practice medicine in the state has been a practitioner of standing in Portland and California. He alleges that he has not practiced medicine since he left Portland, where he had a state certificate.

Sergeant Watkins Fined and Let Go. VANCOUVER, Wash., June 25.—Sergeant Watkins, who fired on Private Merdith a few nights ago in a saloon brawl and narrowly escaped killing him, was tried by Justice Stewart yesterday afternoon, when Judge Taylor sentenced him to 30 days and costs. Sentiment is somewhat divided over the result of the trial; many holding that the attack was a cold-blooded attempt to kill and that Watkins should have been held to answer to the Superior Court for attempted murder. The officers explain that both the men were satisfied to call a halt and to leave with their regiment, the county was satisfied to collect \$50 instead of paying that sum in prosecution and according to the Sergeant was released. Watkins, Merdith and the soldier witnesses left last evening for the Presidio to join the Seventeenth.
