

MAGNIFICENT NEW GENTLEMEN'S RESORT

The Maze Cafe, Just Completed, a High Class Establishment, Equipped on the Most Elaborate Scale, Marks a New Era for Portland—Opened Tuesday.

In the heart of the city's life and within a stone's throw of where the electric arteries converge, there has arisen a palace of pleasure, which will be opened to the public on Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock. Opposite the Baker Theatre, just south of Yamhill street, stands a new building, the completion of which marks an epoch in the growth of Portland. For this building encloses quite the most elaborate establishment of its kind in the entire Northwest, if not on the Pacific Coast. It signifies an advance step toward the making of Oregon's chief city into a great metropolis. This place has been aptly named.

"THE MAZE CAFE," A GENTLEMEN'S RESORT.

At a cost of at least \$25,000 the Maze Cafe has been erected into an ideal palace for recreation and refreshment for gentlemen. With a total disregard for expense and with an eye single to the comfort and convenience and pleasure of the guests, the place has been built and equipped on a most magnificent scale. Throughout the cafe every detail has been carefully studied to produce an artistic and pleasing effect. Certainly Portland could not wish for a more elaborate or more up-to-date resort than the Maze Cafe. A visitor from New York, invited to this establishment, might easily imagine himself in one of the best places of the kind in Gotham. An impression of the elegance that characterizes the entire establishment is gained as one approaches the entrance. An immense concave shell of glass, cut in fancy shapes and in harmonized hues, marks the portal. Interspersed at regular and close intervals are electric bulbs that at night glow and shed their lustre on the glass facets where it is magnified and blest into a thousand colors. But this brilliancy is merely an introduction to the sumptuous interior. The visitor is at once aware why this has been called a gentlemen's resort. A spacious interior, extending far back and with the beautifully-frescoed ceiling high above the polished floor, contains many things to interest and attract a man with a minute or an hour to while away either alone or with a friend.

For one thing, there are a number of billiard tables, all of the latest, most improved design, standing on the main floor. A bar of generous size, and certainly the most magnificent bit of furniture of the kind on the Coast,

stands over to one side of the large room. This bar is simply—but words cannot convey an adequate idea of its beauty. Suffice it to say that it is of solid mahogany, tremendously massive and richly carved. The back bar is of the same costly material and is, if anything, even more ornate than the other. The graining and finish of each are more like that of the most expensive piano than of a bar.

This elaborate scheme is carried out throughout the interior. A large number of great brass chandeliers hang from the handsomely-painted ceiling, each equipped with several electric lights intended to add their radiance to the arcs that are also employed to illuminate the place.

In the rear of the main hall is a handsome little stage from which one of the best orchestras in the city will disperse music every evening. The arrangement has been carefully planned to make the acoustic properties perfect. To one side of the main room and paralleling it there is a slightly less public apartment. Here there are easy chairs and pretty tables with an electric bell button over each. No curtains separate these tables and there are no "private boxes" in the house. The Maze Cafe is intended as a resort for gentlemen only. The fair sex are debarred from participating in the joys of the place, absolutely.

Incidentally it may be remarked that gambling devices will not be permitted and patrons of the cafe will be thoroughly protected against any questionable characters. Strict order will be maintained at all times and this will be one of the features of the new establishment. One side of the main room has a balcony overlooking the billiard tables, where chairs are provided with accompanying tables for those who desire to take advantage of this convenience. Here one may enjoy a glass of lemonade or other liquid comfort and watch the game in progress on the floor below.

Altogether the Maze Cafe is an establishment of which Portland can be proud. Needless to say, Manager E. A. Shapiro has stocked his cellar and bar with the finest qualities of wet goods to be found on the Pacific Coast. From a nickel-bought glass of beer to a bottle of the dancing, laughing, limpid vintage of champagne, the goods that go over the bar will be the best obtainable.

SHE HAD RINGS WHEN ARRESTED

Prominent Society Woman of Cottage Grove Arrested at Junction for Alleged Misdemeanors at Portland.

Sensational Developments Are Promised—A Public Picnic Gives Great Amusement—Coin Scrambling a Feature.

JUNCTION CITY, Ore., June 27.—W. C. Lawrence, a Southern Pacific employee of this place, swore out a warrant yesterday for the arrest of Mrs. Nellie Perman on a charge of larceny. From evidence on hand it seems that during the month of May Mrs. Perman was a boarder at the home of Miss Lela Dean on Leveley and Twenty-fourth streets in Portland, and that about the time the Permans were to leave for their home in Cottage Grove a ring or number of rings were missed by Miss Dean. Suspicion pointed to Mrs. Perman, but as no positive evidence could be produced nothing could be done.

Yesterday, however, Mr. and Mrs. Perman, who, by the way, are prominent society people of Cottage Grove, were in Junction City attending the annual picnic and Mrs. W. C. Lawrence, Miss Dean's sister, who resides here, saw the former woman on the grounds and also saw certain rings on her fingers which were recognized as the property of her sister in Portland. Mrs. Lawrence lost no time in informing her husband of the matter and subsequently a warrant was issued from Justice Clark's court. The papers were served last evening, but the date of a preliminary trial has not yet been set.

For rings taken in charge by the Deputy Sheriff, but the one particularly described by the plaintiff was not among the number delivered by the defendant, although Lawrence claims it was worn by her during the day here.

Scramble for Coins.
JUNCTION CITY, Ore., June 27.—Junction City's annual picnic, which was held yesterday under a favorable sky. A good crowd was on hand and a pleasing program was rendered. A new diversion created here was the throwing of \$20 worth of nickels and dimes over the grounds at noon for which half a hundred boys under 12 years of age scrambled.

TOTTERING LEGS WILL CARRY HIM

Gold Fever Still Burns Strongly in Veins of Aged Charles Henry and He Will Walk to California.

Man Who Tells of Yellow Millions Stored in Deserted Mine Disgusted With Board of Charities.

"If the county don't see fit to give me transportation to Crescent City I guess I'll have to walk. Bowed with the weight of years, but with the gold fever that stirred his veins when he was a youth still upon him, Charles Henry, the old man who tells of a wonderful deserted mine filled with millions, along the Colorado, walked out of the office of the County Judge and started on his long overland journey to the scene of his supposed wealth.

Henry appeared before the County Board of Charities a few days ago telling of an old drift in which sacks containing \$21,000,000 in bar gold were stored, somewhere along the Colorado River, near the Mexican border. He declared he discovered the place by accident some 10 years ago and asked that he be given transportation to Crescent City, Cal., in order that he might equip himself and go after the wealth.

That the gold was there, piled high in a thousand rotting bags, the aged miner emphatically declared, but he refused to give the exact location of the mine, because, he said:

"I have met with too many people in this world who have cheated me." The old man, whose story the county officials are puzzled about, intends, he says, to secure a boat and a reliable companion, load it with the treasure and drift down to the Gulf of California.

BELT LINE IN THE BIG BEND COUNTRY

Great Northern Said to be Interested in the Proposed New Road.

A line of railroad, to be known as the Washington & Pacific, will soon be built through one of the richest portions of the Big Bend Country in Washington. The line will run from Orondo, on the Columbia River, in a north and north-westerly direction to Buckingham, a distance of 70 miles. The road will run by way of Vaberville, Douglas, two of the principal grain markets of Douglas County.

The surveys, which have been in progress for several months, will be completed Monday and grading will begin at once. Material and rolling stock have been ordered and will be delivered as needed. Washington capital is presumably backing the enterprise, though it is believed in railroad circles that the Great Northern is interested in the road, as giving color to this belief is the fact that surveyors, connected with the engineering department of the Great Northern, have been over the proposed line and made careful estimates.

The Washington & Pacific will run through what is probably the richest section of the state. The soil and climatic conditions are especially favorable to the production of fine wheat, rye and alfalfa. The scant rainfall has affected the crops this year, but extensive irrigation systems are being planned that make the valley one of the garden spots of the West. Though in Great Northern territory, the Northern Pacific has for some time had an eye on the Big Bend Country. The latter road controls the serial output of the Yakima Valley and handles immense quantities of freight annually in that section. Plans were at one time perfected for extensions that would bring the Big Bend Country grain out to the Northern Pacific, but later abandoned.

Wenatchee, the head of navigation on the Columbia, has heretofore been the only outlet for the products of the country, but the new line, soon to be built, will allow of rail and water outlets that will greatly benefit the region.
