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DIRECTORS MEET IN BUSY SESSION

Pacific National League Magistrates Called to Order at Tacoma by the Smooth-Talking President, Mr. Dooley Lucas.

Air Full of Rumors to the Effect that Dr. Drake's Aubergines Will Be Dropped from Roster and Salt Lake Added.

(Journal Special Service.)
TACOMA, June 29.—President Lucas and his confederates are following a rocky road and they are meeting in Tacoma today to decide whether to turn aside or keep ahead. If they choose to put a stop to the leakage and get out of their fight with the little financial loss as possible, they will have some staunch friends in the lurch. If they continue their schedule as now arranged there will be a stupendous loss of money up and down the Coast before the season closes.

The most important directors' meeting the league has ever held was called to order this afternoon in the Tacoma Hotel with everyone of the eight clubs represented. D. E. Dugdale from Seattle, Dr. Emmet Drake from Portland, President J. L. Carman from Tacoma, W. E. Persse, vice-president of the Helena club, Chief of Police Reynolds and Manager Walter Wilmont from Butte, President Garrett of the Spokane club, Business Manager Bentley of Los Angeles, Harry Hart, the owner of the San Francisco club and part owner of the Los Angeles club, and his attorney and one of the San Francisco directors, M. L. Schmitt, are all in attendance.

What will happen is a thing to gamble on. The meeting is a most remarkable from the many conflicting reports which have been circulated about the circuit concerning its action, reports which will not down in spite of the emphatic denial of Mr. Lucas and his friends. It has been stated that before tomorrow, when it is hoped to reach an adjournment, San Francisco and Los Angeles would be dropped from the league and either Portland or Helena dropped to give place to Salt Lake City. Although Mr. Lucas refuses to admit that there is even a possibility of such action he is reluctant to stamp such a move as the deepest treachery to the men who put up the money in California to back a forlorn hope. And if it becomes a question of dropping either Portland or Helena, although the receipts will show in favor of retaining Portland rather than Helena, it is not unreasonable to believe that Lucas' well known dislike of Portland will cause him to give that city a knock when the time comes.

League Controls Stock.
According to the constitution of the league it requires three-fourths of the votes of the directors to elect or transfer a club. Seven-eighths of the stock of the Portland club is owned by the league, which shows about how much chance Dr. Drake has of influencing the action of the meeting. The probable line-up of the clubs, as canvassed on the eve of the battle, is Butte, Helena, Seattle, Spokane and Tacoma on one side and Los Angeles and San Francisco on the other, with Portland being a little game of ping pong. However, Mr. Garrett of Spokane states that he will not vote to drop Portland or any other club without her consent. Dr. Drake, representing one-eighth interest in the club, is here with instructions to protest against being shut out. That his protest amounts to remains to be seen.

Helena is also opposed to being dropped. But as she is the smallest city in the United States in a class A league and the club is several thousand dollars to the bad, her wishes may not be regarded. In fact, a little matter of moral obligation will not stand in the way of some of the Pacific National League promoters. There are a few honest business men in the combination and they are well aware that there is a feeling of uneasiness which may result in a stampede, unless controlled. If it comes there will be a general run to cover. "The devil take the hindmost," is the motto of some of the representatives in Tacoma today.

Henry Hart Talks.
Henry Hart, the man who was permitted to invest his money in the hopeless task of fighting the Coast League in its own territory, arrived in the city yesterday afternoon and had several long talks with President Lucas before the meeting. In regard to his course of action today he said: "I have no doubt that the California clubs will be dropped and I see no reason why they should. It wouldn't be playing fair and if anybody has a howl coming I should think we have. Mr. Lucas assures me that there is no such move contemplated."

The session will be a stormy one and Mr. Lucas will find himself the center of a very wrathful company. The Montana representatives are out for blood, as they believe Lucas named a seating for the meeting at Helena without their consent. The last 20 minutes he spent in shadow fighting and jumping the rope. After being rubbed down Eddie weighed 127½ pounds. The betting on the fight still favors Hanlon at 10 to 8. The Yanger people are holding out for longer odds.

WILL CELEBRATE INDEPENDENCE DAY

Members of Portland Rowing Club Plan for an Aquatic Celebration.

Even if Independence Day is not honored with a land celebration, there will be "things doing on the water" and the Portland Rowing Club is preparing an aquatic program that will tend to draw a large crowd to the water on July 4. Races of all descriptions will be pulled off—four-oared, single and canoe. Details are being prepared and just what is to take place will be known in a few days.

The Morrison-street bridge, where the boathouse is situated, will be the finish for the events. The four-oared races will be over a mile course, south from the bridge with a turn. The single will be a mile and a half straightaway, and the canoe 500 yards straightaway.

A "Venetian Night" is one of the pretty events in contemplation by club members some time next month. Pleasure boats will be decorated with Chinese lanterns and from the clubhouse fireworks will be displayed.

The annual regatta of the North Pacific Association, to which the Portland Club is attached, will be held at Vancouver, B. C., July 24 and 25. Portland, Nelson, Victoria and Vancouver will be represented. It is said that the local club may be obliged to enter a junior team for both the junior and senior events. Heretofore the club has had plenty of material for crews. The principal trouble now is said to be from the fact that the rowers have had to shift for themselves, and do their own coaching for the most part. R. C. Hart will accompany the team on its Northern trip.

Canoing on the Clackamas.
Canoing is in great favor and almost every day, when the weather will permit, the Willamette is dotted with craft. Saturday night a large number of canoists left the clubhouse and paddled to the Clackamas. They camped overnight and went several miles up the stream. The trip up is said to be a very difficult one, but one is recompensed by the delightful ride down stream over the rapids. Later on it is intended to haul the canoes as far up as the hatchery and then to drift down the river.

Sunday afternoon a stiff breeze made the day an ideal one for sailboats, and the river was lined with catboats. A great many rowboats were also on the river.

HANLON CONFIDENT OF WINNING BIG EVENT

The Clever San Francisco Favorite Thinks He Can Whip Yanger.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—Eddie Hanlon, who is so confident of beating Yanger on next Tuesday night, explained yesterday why he thinks he will win. "I know Yanger has beaten me that I fought draws with. He knocked out Young Corbett in 10 rounds, but you know Corbett was the fighter then he is now. Besides, I am much faster than when I fought Corbett and feel a hundred per cent better than I ever felt before in any of my previous battles."

"When I was training for Young Corbett I felt kind of worried, but now that feeling never troubles me. I am training harder than before and honestly believe I will win from Yanger. If Mr. Yanger wins from me, all I can say is he is a better man. Condition will not be the excuse if I lose, as I am in grand shape."

HEAD COACHES DISCUSS RULES

Dr. Williams of Pennsylvania Says that the Change in Playing Will Not Affect Principal Mass Plays.

George Brooke, Instructor of Athletics at Swarthmore, Thinks that the Amendments Will Prove Highly Beneficial.

The changes which the intercollegiate football rules committee has determined upon for the regulation of the game this fall have attracted much attention from the coaches and players at the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Carl Williams, the Quakers' famous coach, has always been a firm supporter of mass plays and has vigorously defended the game on more than one occasion from attacks made against it.

Dr. Williams, when asked for his opinion on the new rules, said that he did not think the changes made were such as to bring about the reforms which the opponents of mass play desired. In reference to the rule which provides that seven men shall be in the line of scrimmage when the play is between the two 25-yard lines, Dr. Williams pointed out what has been generally overlooked, that mass plays would still be possible, because only four men are required to execute the most effective mass plays which are used today.

On the second rule, allowing the quarterback to run with the ball, Dr. Williams gave his strong approval. However, he pointed out a defect in that the provision that the runner must go at least five yards outside of the man who snaps the ball.

"This is liable to be a bone of contention, because the rapidity of mass plays will make accurate measurement of the question and there will be no satisfactory method to decide the question if protest is made. This difficulty could have been obviated and the game helped by a provision that the quarterback run outside of tackle without rule, giving how many yards out he shall run."

"In reference to mass plays the new rules requiring seven men to be behind the line of scrimmage when the play is between the two 25-yard lines will naturally tend to eliminate mass plays, though it will not do away with them, because these are the strongest plays in modern football, and every team will rely upon them when it comes to a pinch beyond the 25-yard line."

In addition to this rule, which permits the line to play behind the line of scrimmage, now it makes no difference what four men are played back of the line. The heaviest and best line plungers on the team can be played there, and they can still use mass plays, although, of course, this rule will naturally tend to eliminate mass plays, which permit more than four men back of the line, and therefore make possible more fake plays."

By Coach Brooke.
Coach George H. Brooke is quoted as follows upon the rules:
"The new football rules are wisely chosen. They are not so radical as to affect any of the attractive features of our game, but are radical enough to eliminate some of the brute force element which has in the last few years developed too much sameness in the play."

The fact that seven men are required to be in the line knocks out the ponderous mass formations that acted with the suddenness and force of trip hammers. Open-end play is encouraged not only by allowing the quarterback to run with the ball, but by his being forced to circle out five yards from center.

"Holding is the one unfair feature in our football. The heavier penalty for holding is a strong step in the right direction. The rival experts are already working out the new formations which will be necessary under the new rules and the keen competition of new plays, which will vary the old ideas and add a tremendous interest."

"Penn should benefit under the new rules because of their lighter teams and because Coach Carl Williams is an expert on the quarterback running with the ball. The Quakers won from Cornell last year chiefly through Quarterback Dale's startling end runs."

The baseball game played yesterday for the Heppner benefit fund was a grand success. The Wholesalers team defeated the Retailers at National Park by a score of 5 to 0. Inability to hit Pitcher Siebels explains the zero in the run column of the Retailers. The game was fast and snappy and the 700 or 800 spectators were very well pleased with the exhibition. Siebels' pitching was the feature of the game. He struck out 11 of his opponents. Jay Andrews umpired the game and gave every satisfaction.
