

FARMER LYNCHED BY ANGRY MOB

Charged with Having Killed Aged Woman on Sunday and Thrown Her Body to Be Eaten by the Hogs.

Daughter of His Victim Returned from Church and Found Corpse Partially Devoured by Hungry Swine.

(Journal Special Service.) WELCH, I. T., June 30.—A courier brings news that infuriated citizens have surrounded a young farmer who is suspected of murdering Mrs. Johnson, an aged woman, on Sunday night, and lynching with her the mob's avowed intention. The courier believes the purpose was carried out about noon. The woman was killed with a club, the motive being robbery, and the body was thrown into a hog pen, where it was discovered by her daughter when she returned from church. The hogs had partially devoured it.

NO CHANGES ORDERED ON SHORT LINE YET

The Scheme to Transfer Trackage South of Salt Lake Not Announced.

SALT LAKE, June 30.—At noon today no word was received from the conference in New York relative to the transfer of the Oregon Short Line trackage south of Salt Lake to the Salt Lake route as projected by W. A. Clark. No circulars have been issued as yet from the headquarters of the Oregon Short Line or San Pedro road relative to the transfer. General Manager Wells of the latter road said: "We expect the transfer to be made tonight unless the lawyers do a little more juggling. Unless word is received, however, from New York, nothing will be done." Attorneys for both roads returned this morning from Chicago, Nev., where yesterday they secured the dismissal of the suits over the right of way which have been in the courts for the past two years.

SHAMROCK DAMAGED DURING TRIAL RACE

An Iron Bar Which Held Sheet Snapped This Morning.

(Journal Special Service.) HIGHLANDS, June 30.—Shamrock's race began at 11 o'clock over a 30-mile course. At 1:25 both were seen returning. The Shamrock suffering the breaking of an iron bar which held the sheet. The yacht Erin is close beside the challenger. Sir Thomas Lipton this morning expressed surprise at the showing made by the Reliance. He is not so confident now, but says that the challenger is the best boat Great Britain can produce, and if it does not lift the cup there will be nothing to do but try with a schooner, which is allowable under a deed of gift.

COMPLAINT FILED

Residents of Albina have filed a complaint against the saloon conducted by A. C. Lodell on Union avenue and Morris street, which they allege is conducted in a disorderly manner. This complaint is in the hands of the License Committee, but in order to give Lodell a chance to answer the charges, action was deferred until Wednesday afternoon at 1 o'clock. John Binzer applied for a saloon license at 428 Felling street, but the committee did not think it wise to allow a liquor house at that point, and rejected his application.

ASK FOR DAMAGES

R. Gately has filed a claim against the city with the Council Judiciary Committee asking damages in the sum of \$115.50 for injuries sustained in falling through the Fifteenth-street bridge. The bridge, he says, was defective. An investigation as to the facts is being made by the City attorney.

TWO HUNDRED ARE ENTOMBED IN MINE

Explosion Near Cheyenne Crushes Workmen to Death or Holds Them Prisoners in the Bowels of the Earth--Rescue Work Goes On.

(Journal Special Service.) CHEYENNE, Wyo., June 30.—Two hundred men are imprisoned alive or crushed and mangled in death at the bottom of the Hanna coal mine, where a frightful explosion occurred at 11 o'clock today. The cause of the frightful accident is not known, a gigantic eruption occurring just before regular time to change shifts. Earth and stones were vomited upward from the depths of the mine, and the cries of the injured were heard. Men are working frantically to release those who are entombed, but it is not known to what extreme the death list may extend.

HIS OFFICIAL TERM EXPIRES TONIGHT

Game Warden Quimby Succeeded Tomorrow by J. W. Baker of Cottage Grove.

After guarding the state's game for five years, Warden L. B. W. Quimby of this city will tomorrow morning be succeeded by J. W. Baker, of Cottage Grove, who was appointed to the office several weeks ago by Gov. Chamberlain. The six deputy wardens will also go out with their chief. Mr. Quimby was appointed State Game and Forestry Warden by ex-Gov. T. T. Geer. During his time in office, he has been watching the game that is protected by law in every section of the state, having made at least 100 arrests for the violation of the statute regarding the killing of birds, deer and other "sportsmen's delight." Since the first of the present year the warden has made 15 arrests, two of these were for the shooting of game birds out of season, four were parties who had placed sawdust in fish streams, all the others being for the violation of the law relating to deer-hunting. Two trips were recently made by Mr. Quimby to investigate the reported trapping of beaver in Marion and Lincoln Counties, but he was unable to obtain enough evidence to even file a complaint against the suspected parties. "When I was appointed to this office," said Mr. Quimby this morning, "the law regarding the selling of game in the open market was being violated right along. I went to work to put a stop to this practice and I am very proud of the fact that it was stopped, with the exception of the last 15 days in the month of November, when upland birds are sold in all public markets. I tried hard to get the Legislature to pass a bill prohibiting this, but did not succeed. This is a measure that I think should be passed soon, as the wanton destruction of the upland game birds during the open market days will soon rid that section of the state of its quail and pheasants."

Mr. Quimby says that during the months of August, September and October the Game Warden makes as many arrests as during the other nine months put together. The duties of wardens that go out of office tonight are: E. G. Hodson, of Roseburg, I. S. Fritz, of The Dalles, T. B. Wells, of Pendleton, I. F. Lewis, of Klaskanin, W. H. Pretzman, and F. Alisky, both of Portland.

POPE LEO BETTER AND TAKES DRIVE

Afterward Discussed Affairs of Church with Distinguished Visitor from Africa.

(Journal Special Service.) LONDON, June 30.—A dispatch from Rome says the Pope has recovered from his indisposition and this morning took an hour's drive in the Vatican gardens. He afterwards received the Coadjutor Vicar of Capetown and discussed South African affairs with him.

INJURED IN SAWMILL

S. Wilcox Meets With Painful Accident While at Work in Eastern Lumber Mill.

S. Wilcox, helper on the gang edge in the mill of the Eastern Lumber Company, met with a painful accident while at work this morning that will probably cost him the loss of his right eye. He was otherwise injured, his nose being broken and his jaw knocked out of line. The injuries received by Wilcox resulted from a one-inch board splitting while being run through the machine. Quick as a flash the splinter was slammed back into his face, rendering him unconscious for a time. He was removed to the Good Samaritan Hospital where Dr. Jeffers attended him. At a late hour this afternoon he was resting easily.

LE BARGE GANG AGAIN ARRESTED

Trio Young in Years, but Far Older in Crime, Are Once More Before the Court as Living Problems.

Were Found Partially Intoxicated Under Darkness of Burnside-Street Bridge—Frequently in Trouble.

Joe Le Barge, Albert Richardson and Clifford Horton, lads of tender years, were arrested under the Burnside-street bridge shortly after midnight by Patrolman Wendorf, and were this morning arraigned before Judge Hogue in the Municipal Court on charges of drunk and disorderly. What to do with the trio proved too vexing a problem for the court, and the case was continued until tomorrow.

Although of tender years, all of the boys have had records in police circles, and the proper course to pursue in their case has long been a problem before the court. Joe Le Barge, the senior member of what has been for many months known as the Le Barge gang, is old beyond his years. As Judge Hogue expressed it this morning, he seems destined to spend the greater portion of his future life in prison. He has been arrested numerous times, once for robbing the Laue-Davis drug store, at the corner of Third and Yamhill streets, and served a jail term. The Richardson and Horton boys have been arrested on previous occasions for being drunk. Patrolman Wendorf has been repeatedly told by residents on his East Side district that the boys have been stealing small things from stores and houses. A vigilant watch has been kept, but it has not been possible to obtain evidence sufficient to place a more serious charge than the present one against any of them.

Found Under Bridge. The boys were found under the east end of the Burnside-street bridge. Patrolman Wendorf states that there were five of them in the gang, and that when he was discovered approaching, two of them broke and ran, making good their escape. One of the boys is Frank Thompson, another notoriously bad youth. The boys making their escape were said to have been armed with revolvers. Patrolman Wendorf stated this morning that when he found the boys they were partially intoxicated. According to his statement, they had been drinking beer, and he suspected them of being under the bridge for the purpose of idling away time until an early hour, when they would break into some place. Judge Hogue stated from the bench this morning that he scarcely knew what to do with the boys. Something will be done tomorrow.

The committee have not been advised as to what work has been done on the Portage Road, and they are of the opinion that nothing has as yet been done.
