

REPORT OF THE CITY OFFICIALS

Portland's Financial Condition Shows a Period of Sound Progress in the Municipal Departments.

All the Funds Have Healthy Balances and Many Are Increasing Rapidly from Different Sources.

Receipts from all sources \$1,020,543.33 Disbursements 866,665.22 Balance on hand Jan 1 27,321.73 Balance on hand July 1 16,111.53

The report of the financial report of the City of Portland for the six months from January 1, 1903, to June 30, 1903, inclusive, and which has been compiled by the officials at the heads of the various departments.

There has never been a period in the history of the city, the officials claim, when the finances were in such good condition, and the reports of the departments, both quarterly and semi-annual, for the period ending last night, are record-breakers.

Such an excellent showing is particularly noticeable by the enforcement of the city's new charter, which went into effect in January, and which provided for many additional sources of revenue, principally from new tax items.

General fund bonds of the 5 per cent issue, aggregating \$55,500, which had matured, were redeemed by an issue of 4 per cent bonds to the same amount, thus saving the municipality the extra 2 per cent.

The fireboat fund, created by special action of the Legislature, has increased until now the amount on hand for that special purpose reaches the total of \$58,502.94. This will be disbursed as provided for when the payment on the boat is ordered made.

Healthy Balances. All of the various funds show a healthy balance. There is now in the water fund the sum of \$150,677.80, and the only outstanding debts against it is the claims of June and \$72,500 on the issue of water bonds.

The report of City Treasurer Werlein for the half-year shows that his office handled a sum aggregating \$1,300,000. This is the record for that department since its creation, and few of the largest items were as follows:

Another new fund was created, which is known as the Park Concert Fund, and which was raised through the indefatigable efforts of J. D. Meyer, of the Park Commission, and C. L. Brown, of Brown's Band. There is at present a balance amounting to \$2,487.50.

The report of City Auditor Thomas C. Devlin covers both quarters, commencing the first of the year. The quarters comprising April, May and June showed an increase over the preceding three months, and, in fact, is said to be the largest quarter in the history of the office. The total receipt for licenses from the first of April until the last of June amounted to \$52,078.98, of which \$32,733.35 came from saloon licenses.

LIPTON ENJOYS THE YACHT RACES

Constitution Crossed Line Ahead of Reliance in a Very Pretty Start.

NEWPORT, R. I. July 1.—Sir Thomas Lipton, on board the Erin, came to port today to witness the trial races between the Reliance, Columbia and Constitution. Lord Lipton complimented the Reliance highly on its excellent appearance.

The starting line was crossed by the Constitution at 1:13:30, and the Reliance came next. At 1:59 the boats were only faintly visible owing to the mist. It looked as though the Reliance had fore-reached the Constitution and beaten her in the first few hitches to weather. The boats were jumping and it was a lively race between the Constitution and the Columbia.

Reliance finished a considerable distance ahead of the Columbia. Lipton and his force have been kept on the go all the time, and it is estimated that he will have the supervision of street work amounting to at least \$1,000,000 during the year. Of this, the contractors have finished up work amounting to more than \$200,000, and more than \$400,000 worth is now under way.
