

EXCESSIVE HEAT CAUSES DISMAY

Mills in the East Compelled to Shut Down Owing to Many Prostrations of Operatives--Pacific Coast Tourists Forsake Region.

PARKERSBURG, W. Va., July 3.—On account of the intense heat work in the immense steel plants here has been suspended. The many prostrations yesterday caused all the mills save one to shut down this morning.

THEY WILL TEST LAW ON CRIMPS

"Mysterious Billy" Smith and White Brothers May Defy the Commission Controlling the "Sailors' Homes."

Have Been Refused License to Open House, but Say They Cannot Be Forced Out of Business by Board.

"Mysterious Billy" Smith and the White Brothers, having made application before the Sailors' Boarding House Commissioners for a permit to open a "sailors' home" and their request being denied, today announced that they would not tamely submit to being thus forced out of business. They will, they say, shortly open a sailors' boarding house in this city, despite the decree of the Commissioners, and will endeavor to pursue the even tenor of their ways.

If they are interfered with in the exercising of what they consider to be their rights as American citizens they hint there may be trouble and openly announce they are ready to take the "boarding house law" before the courts to have its Constitutionality passed upon.

Messrs. White and Smith say the original intention of the law governing the establishment and operation of sailors' boarding houses is not being carried out by the present Commissioners and declare that indications now point to Sullivan & Grant having been given a monopoly on the business of caring for and shipping able seamen. This condition, they allege, they will not longer tolerate, claiming they have rights, know the ground upon which such rights are based and mean to maintain them.

Charge Favoritism.

It is further claimed by Smith and the Whites that favoritism is being shown by the commission and that "runners" for boarding houses are permitted to ply their calling without even being required to wear the badge provided for by law. They also allege that crimping is being carried on under the mantle of the law. All of these things they declare themselves to be in a position to prove in the event they are assailed in the position they intend to assume as independent boarding house keepers.

They are willing to take out a license and to run their proposed establishment in accordance with the law, but say if not privileged to do this they will run it anyway.

The commission is composed of E. Wright, S. M. Mears and Herbert Holman. The members hold that the fewer sailor boarding houses there are the better it will be for the ships.

GOOD RESULT OF ONE YEAR'S WORK

County Clerk's Annual Report Shows Gain of Many Thousands of Dollars.

The annual report of County Clerk Fenton, which was completed this morning, shows a net gain to the county during the administration of that official of \$21,918.67. Of this amount \$3,933.83 is due to increased receipts and \$17,984.84 to decreased disbursements, salaries included. The clerk makes no claim for credit for the reduction in salaries, which were fixed by the legislative act of 1901, consolidating the offices of clerk of the court, clerk of the county and recorder of the county, and the circuit court and recorder of the county. Under the old law these offices carried salaries of \$36,540; under present statute, \$24,100.

LABOR LEADERS WERE NOT AT ALL SURPRISED

gon," but the decision of Judge Cleland changes this completely. It leaves it necessary to select the new clause reading, "Be it enacted by the people of the State of Oregon."

BUT THE GREAT PROBLEM IS WHETHER THE COURTS WILL NOT REJECT THE NEW CLAUSE. THIS IS ADMITTED TO BE ENTIRELY WITHIN THEIR POWER.

Judge Cotton's Opinion.

"The whole legal talent of the State of Oregon foresaw the possibility of the referendum law being declared illegal long before the Legislature had gotten down to actual work," said Judge W. W. Cotton, one of the most prominent attorneys in Oregon, and joint compiler of Bellinger & Cotton's Code.

Mr. Cotton was asked the significance of the Cleland decision, putting the referendum measure out of commission. He evidenced no surprise and said:

"There was hardly an attorney but recognized the weakness of the referendum measure and the result was that every precaution possible was taken to prevent its rejection affecting the work of the Legislature. I do not believe anything more could have been done than was actually worked out by the legal profession to protect the bills. That the united ideas of Oregon attorneys were practically the same in this regard is attested by the fact that every bill has a double-enacting clause, so drawn as to be subject to the dictations of either the constitution in its original form or as amended by the referendum act. This was necessary."

"I hardly expect the courts of Oregon would take so radical a step as to reject the whole of the enacting clause of each bill, but it is certainly necessary that one section of each clause be not considered. Non-consideration means rejection, and it is obviously within the power of the courts to reject all if it rejects any part. Such course would leave the work of the recent Legislative session wholly wasted effort."

"I repeat that I hardly expect such a radical stand to be taken, but when a man has been in law a little while he comes to know that almost anything is possible."

In addition to this, Mr. Cotton said, there must be the time when the law has been utterly wasted in the effort to bring the referendum law into operation. In case this is again attempted no steps can be taken before the convening of the next Legislature, and the bill would necessarily lapse before it could become active, even if no reverses or delays were met with.

Judge Fenton's Views.

"Acting for the Lewis and Clark Exposition in drafting House Bill No. 1, authorizing and appropriating \$500,000 for the Fair, I prepared an enacting clause so as to comply with the constitution. I was not, however, aware of the necessity of a double-enacting clause, and also using the enacting clause prescribed by the amendment, so that whatever result might follow as to the amendment, the act would be constitutionally passed. By the constitution prior to the amendment, the enacting clause of every bill read: 'Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon,' while by the amendment, the enacting clause was changed to read: 'Be it enacted by the people of the State of Oregon.' I advised the use of both styles of an enacting clause, and this was done."

SOME IRISHMEN OBJECT TO KING

Great Confusion Is Created Over the Debate of Whether Address of Welcome Would Be Tendered Edward On His Visit to Emerald Isle.

DUBLIN, July 3.—Today's meeting of the city corporation witnessed a heated discussion over the question of presenting an address to King Edward on the occasion of his proposed visit to Ireland. The confusion became so deafening that the Lord Mayor adjourned the meeting indefinitely.

MURDER REPORTED BY SPOKANE POLICE

Head Crushed and Pockets Turned Out Unknown Man Is Found Under Bridge.

SPOKANE, Wash., July 3.—The body of an unknown man was found on the river bank under the Monroe-street bridge, with head crushed by blows from an iron bar found by the side of the corpse. The victim's pockets were turned out, indicating that robbery had been the motive for the crime. The body had evidently been dragged some distance, and is supposed to be a man who sold whisky to Indians.

EXPRESS RATES TO SOON BE ADVANCED

All Companies Will Make Additional Charges on Packages Under 50 Pounds.

CHICAGO, July 3.—A heavy advance in express rates is announced by all companies to take effect August 1. Packages under 50 pounds will be charged higher rates. While the companies deny a joint agreement, the unanimity of action indicates otherwise.

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"The amendment," says H. G. Greene, president of Electrical Workers' Union, "was incorporated in both party platforms for no other reason than to catch votes. It was never the intention, however, to make it a law. We knew this at the time we wanted to refer the amendment to the people. We wanted to bring the matter to a test case at once. The old parties will never catch any more votes by such tactics."

PARK BOARD HOLD MONTHLY MEETING

Take Steps Towards Improving Condition of the City's Public Greens.

The Park Board met this morning at the City Hall and transacted considerable routine business. The most important question coming up for discussion was the project of laying gravel walks around the park strip, comprising sixteen blocks. The work is really under way, but there was some question as to whether the right of making the improvement was vested in the city of the board, and also as to the privilege of laying gravel instead of cement walks. That question, however, will be settled at a conference with the authorities and Messrs. Lewis and Hawkins were delegated a committee to represent the board.
