

CITIZENS SAY A HOSPITAL IS ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY

OFFICIALS GIVE THEIR OPINIONS

Chiefs of Police and Fire Department Recognize Importance of Having Place to Care for Injured.

Expense Would Be Very Light, but Some Contend City Must Have It Under Any Circumstances.

The article in The Journal yesterday showing the absolute necessity of an emergency hospital being established in Portland has met with the approbation of every official and citizen who was questioned on the subject.

Another illustration of the necessity of the establishment of an emergency hospital occurred yesterday when an old man fell from the approach of one of the city bridges and had his leg broken.

The following are a few of the opinions of officials and citizens gathered by The Journal today:

Chief Hunt's Views. "I think the establishment of an emergency hospital is a wise suggestion, and that means should be provided for immediate care and attention for many who are taken suddenly sick, or injured by accident.

Chief Campbell's Views. Chief Campbell of the Fire Department heartily endorses the project of establishing an emergency hospital in Portland, or at least having rooms and medical attendants for the rendering of immediate aid to the injured.

Chief of Police's Views. The chief of police, J. E. Werlein, has also expressed his hearty approval of the plan of establishing an emergency hospital in Portland.

Wants Her Trunk. Mrs. H. M. Remo has filed suit in Justice William Remo's court against one John J. Galt, who is alleged to have taken her trunk from her residence on Alder street, and to have hidden it in the trunk of a street car.

approached upon the emergency hospital question. "However," he continued, "I will say that the securing of a separate hospital, merely for emergency cases, is out of the question for the present. If we can secure the necessary room and appliances at moderate cost, where they are located, always in a convenient and well-proved. But it does not seem likely that the City of Portland could go to any great expense to incorporate such a feature at this time.

Treasurer Werlein's Idea. "The question of cost is a mere bagatelle," said City Treasurer J. E. Werlein this morning, discussing the proposition of an emergency hospital. "I don't believe the feature should ever enter into the consideration, because in the first place it is not at all likely that any enormous or even excessive sum of money would be required. Such an institution is needed and should be supplied. There ought to be a place where emergency cases can be attended to and where work requiring immediate attention could be performed with dispatch.

County Clerk Fields. F. S. Fields, County Clerk, while I am not personally acquainted with the workings of receiving hospitals, I believe such an institution is needed here.

Other Opinions. Penumbra Kelly, I believe a city of Portland's size and commercial importance should have a receiving hospital.

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NEW RULING ON CITY LICENSES

Officials Intend to Stop Practice of Many People in Allowing Their Licenses to Become Delinquent.

Special Officers Have Orders to See that Backward Citizens Are More Prompt in Paying Their Dues.

It was announced at the office of the City Auditor today that persons who fail to pay their license fees before tomorrow night will at once be proceeded against. The license officers have their cues to take immediate action, commencing Saturday morning, and all delinquents will be prosecuted.

The citizens under the law have 10 days from the first of the quarter month until the 10th in which to pay. During that time about one-third have in the past managed to forget. This month it may be even a greater percentage, for today there has been about \$24,000 delinquent for and the total amount due reaches somewhere around \$50,000.
