The Browns defeated Lohman's brigade yesterday afternoon in an interesting but not exciting contest. The presence of Raidy and Hess steadied the entire team and as a result the entire work of the locals was cleaner and better finished than the dreadful apparition on Saturday. There is no mistake in saying that the boys are playing good ball and that the best evidence of this fine work is the record for the past three weeks. 'Tis true that weaknesses are visible in most games, but they can be remedied. Sacramento comes tomorrow with a good team. When they were here on their first trip they took three games from us, tied one and lost one. This time, without raising or encouraging false hopes in the Browns, we feel that they should take five games from Sacramento. The Browns can certainly do it if they play baseball every minute. Should we have a lead of two runs at any time, that is no reason why we should take it easy, but on the contrary then they must play all the harder, because when Portland is several runs ahead of Sacramento, or any other team, then rest assured that the Fishermen will expend every ounce of energy to overcome the advantage. If we give them the sixth will be ours. The Browns are now among the swell four hundred, and it remains with themselves to say whether or not they intend remaining in that company. Let us hope so.

Detail of Game.

First—O'Hara started things for the crickets with a two-sacker and scored on Baxter's drive. The Moose took second on the throw and went to third, when Hess allowed the throw to go through him. Murdock hit to Raidy, who threw to Messery and the big first baseman, who threw the ball to Andrews, who caught the Moose off third, completing a neat double play. Moskman flew to Van. Hurlburt beat one out but was caught in an attempt to steal. Van Buren bunted back it out to Nadeau, who picked up a little infield fly which landed safely. Andy Anderson sent one past Josh Reilly with the speed of a fountain in his auto, and Van scored. Kruger allowed the ball to go between his underpinning and the glove. The Ambers, who were hit by a liner out to right which Murdock gathered in and Messery was out at first.

Second—One, two, three was the order of things in this session.

Third—Oakland repeated their performance of the previous inning, but the Browns annexed two more on Hurlburt's drive, which netted him three cushions, assisted by Moose Baxter's hoof. Van Buren's bunt put him out of the running and Phil Nadeau stole second in the sixth and stole second. Andy Anderson's long fly scored Spec and Nadeau took third and scored on Andrews' hit. Messery also plunked one in safe territory, but Raidy could not get the ball past Lee. Fourth—Moskman smashed out a two-sacker after two were out, but Kruger flew to Hurlburt.

Fifth—Retired in regulation style. Portland—Hits by Gorton, Reilly, Braash, and Baxter brought the first two over the rubber in Oakland's half. Portland was blanked again, although Andy Anderson was made a target of by Lee.

Sixth—Moskman drove at Butler's shins, which came near hitting the business, but he got hit at first. Kruger flew to Andrews. Gorton took second on Messery's error, but Josh Reilly flew to Andrews. Messery walked but was forced at second by Raidy. Tommy Hess' sacrifice put the ball in play, where he died by Butler's hit to Lee.

Seventh—Two flies and an assist from Raidy allowed Jack Messery to put Cross, Lee and Braash out of the inning.

Eighth—Hurlburt started things by a triple to the center field fence. Van died at first. Nadeau was hit for the second time. Andy Anderson smashed a beauty to right field and Spec scored. Murdock threw to third to hold Nadeau, but there was no one there. Phil Nadeau ran all the way around, as Gorton was backing up third. Andrews flew to Kruger. Messery scored another pass, but Raidy forced Anderson at third.

Ninth—Baxter hit to Messery and was out at first. Murdock hit one to center which eluded Van and "Mooney" took three sacks. Moskman fouled out to Hess and Kruger hit to Butler.

Tenth—Portland took the one, two, three route in their half.

Ninth—Gorton started the last chance with a single but was forced at second by Reilly. Croll worked Ike Butler for the only pass he issued, and then Pete Lohman decided to bat in Lee's place, as Cooper had changed his shoes and Oscar Graham was counting money in the box office. Pete's best efforts resulted in a foul to Messery. Braash flew to Van Buren and the Oakland boys hot-footed for the cars, bidding Portland farewell until October 6. The official score follows:

TO UMPIRE LEVY

During the past two weeks you have officiated as umpire at Twenty-fourth and Vaughn-street grounds, and while your decisions were not in accordance with justice at all times, yet, on the whole you have done fairly well. It is true that advance reports branded you as an incompetent official, but these were evidently instigated by persons not versed in the science of the game, or responsible for their sayings. Of course, these reports have a tendency to arouse the fans whenever a close award is made, regardless of the correctness of the same. For these reasons you have been honestly criticized. Your work last week was an improvement over the preceding. Tomorrow Sacramento begins a series with the Browns. The manager of Sacramento is Michael Fisher, a student of the game, judge of players, and a politician in baseball if necessary to win games. On account of your relationship with Fisher, though absolutely proper and eminently correct, the fans will watch your work with searching eye, and a disposition to criticize more readily than at any other time. Now, for your own happiness of heart, the good of the game, and in justice to both teams, be as strict as law itself, and thoroughly impartial. Do not be disturbed by Fisher's threat of condemnation, the bleachers' sentence, nor the bluffing of anybody. Be umpire the whole time, and if the slightest objection is raised by your work, providing it is not made in accordance with becoming dignity, fine the offender at once and remove him from the game. By doing this you will command the respect of the players and receive the commendation of the spectators. If this be done, then you will enjoy a week's work as much as if you were atlat high in the billow surf at Waialeale City.
