CANNED CORN IS GOING SKIWARD

Prospective Shortage of Crop Sends Tinned Article Toward the Clouds—Further Advance Looked For.

Watermelons Being Sold by Weight—Tobacco Will Go Up August 15—Weather Conditions Excellent.

The prospective shortage of the corn crop has caused an advance in the canned article this morning local wholesalers are quoting an augmented figure of 6 to 10 cents per dozen.

The floods wrought great havoc in the middle West corn belt and in Eastern Nebraska and Kansas the crop shortage is expected to be extensive.

Watermelons are becoming very plentiful and are of a much better grade than those on the market a week ago.

Tobacco commission men are quoting by the pound instead of by the dozen. Melons are from \$1.10 per 100, loose, to \$1.25 crated.

Peaches are unchanged. Clings are becoming very plentiful and a few California Crawford are seen on the market.

Eggs and butter are unchanged. Eggs are about the same, with receipts a demand equal to a dealer remarking that the poultry market was a little better than for the same time a year ago.

The Cornell Tobacco Company has published an advance in all manufactured tobacco of from 1 to 2 cents, to take effect August 15.

Commission men and wholesale dealers are very active with the coming of the weather and the highest time of the year has commenced in earnest.

According to the regular crop report the weather during the past week has been excellent for haying and for maturing grain.

Full reports from the hop sections indicate a fairly good crop, which taking into consideration the increased acreage, will fall but slightly below that of last year.

Minor crops, such as corn, potatoes, onions, sugar beets and gardens, are doing nicely. Fruit also continues promising, and a large crop of pears and apricots is now almost a certainty.

ROBERT DOLLAR IN THE HARBOR

Reached Here This Morning from San Francisco with More Than 900 Tons of Cement and General Cargo.

Will Take Out Lumber for San Pedro—John Palmer Sails for Her Destination—Other Vessels Loading.

The steamer Robert Dollar, Captain Johnson, reached Portland this morning at 6 o'clock from San Francisco with 360 tons of asphalt, 300 tons of cement and about 250 tons of general merchandise.

Shortly after her arrival the work of discharging cargo was begun at Columbia dock No. 1, and by late this evening it is expected that the task will be completed.

The Dollar Navigation Company is operating nine steamers in all, seven of which are engaged exclusively in the coastwise trade.

John Palmer Sails. Early this morning the American barkentine John Palmer left down the river with 1,400,000 feet of lumber which was loaded at the Inman-Poulsen mill.
