

SAY ORDINANCE

DIED A-BORNIN'

Claim Is Made that the Council Committee Will Pigeon-Hole the Proposed Meat Inspection Measure.

Spite Against State Health Officer Dr. Woods Hutchinson Said to Be at the Bottom of the Trouble.

It looks to those who claim to have "inside" information, that the proposed ordinance providing meat inspection for this city has "died a bornin'" in the hands of the health and police committee.

The famous meat ordinance raised considerable opposition while it was before the public eye. The Board of Health drew up an ordinance originally and this was finally superseded by an ordinance introduced by Councilman Zimmerman.

Disatisfaction Expressed.

There are some of the officials who are not exactly satisfied with this program and who are not pleased at seeing such a necessary measure for the public health die with the committee.

The reason for this action on the part of the Councilmen is attributed to an antagonism which several hold against Dr. Woods Hutchinson, Secretary of the State Board of Health, who has had considerable to do with fostering the measure, and who was also accused by the chairman of the committee "of wanting a job."

signed the petition addressed to me for commutation of sentence imposed upon defendant: Dra. E. J. Howard, B. H. McClinton, L. M. Woods and William S. Cary.

FOR AND AGAINST.

"Arguments for and against the petition have been addressed to me by Oscar E. Hayter, representing the defendant, and J. N. Hart, representing the state. I have given this case the most careful consideration and have on two occasions visited the condemned man and spent a considerable time in conference with him at the prison.

STORY TOLD BY JOHNSON.

When Mr. Johnson was interviewed by The Journal this morning he told the following story: "Yes, an attempt was made to hold me up last night on my way to Irvington track. I don't know whether they were endeavoring to rob me or were after the horse and cart. It may have been that they intended to commit some other crime and were after a good horse to get out of town with. They picked out an ideal place for their work, and that they were not successful was due to the nervousness of the horse, which became unmanageable after the shot was fired in front of it, and was started a second time by the figure in the brush suddenly rushing toward her head.

DEFORMITY OF BODY.

"Taking the history of the life of the defendant into consideration, his deformity of body, the circumstances attending the killing of the deceased and the opinion of physicians who have examined him, I cannot but believe that defendant was irresponsible at the time of the commission of the crime; that he acted upon circumstances which, to his mind, justified the taking of human life, and even at this time he claims that he was justified and is apparently without remorse.

DESCRIPTION OF THE MEN.

"In the semi-darkness I could not get a good look at the men. The one who stood in the middle of the road seemed to be a medium-sized man who wore a white cowboy hat with a wide, stiff rim, with a leather band around the outside of it. From the passing glance I had of him as he was lying in the road as I passed, he had a broad or round face. His revolver had a long barrel, and from the rapid succession in which he fired the two shots at me must have been a double-action gun. The man who stood at the side of the road and made a rush to seize the head of the horse had on a slouch hat and wore either a sweater or a flannel shirt with the collar turned up. He was tall and wore a beard, which I think was false, as it appeared to be peculiar and not fit right. On driving back I noticed two men whom I took to be the same that I had met earlier in the evening, going down to the railroad track where the wagon road crosses Sullivan's Gulch. I did not take the trouble to notify the police, as from their past actions I did not think they would take the trouble to investigate the case, and even if they had that nothing would come of it."

ASSAULTED AND ROBBED.

Thugs still ply their nefarious calling in all parts of the city and the police look on idly and helplessly. The usual occurrence did not fall last night, for this morning A. Wagner, a blacksmith who works in logging camps near Portland, appeared at police headquarters battered and bruised. Besides his injuries he had \$21 less than before he made the acquaintance of the brutal highwayman who did his best to kill him.

at the corner of Cleveland and Almsworth streets, was driving to the Irvington track with a fast and nervous horse hitched to a two-wheeled cart. It was about 8 o'clock, and the shadows from the woods made the road dusky, but not so dark but what objects could be plainly distinguished at a distance of several rods. When in the most isolated place he noticed a man loom up in the middle of the road and another standing near by in the bushes.

SHOT TO STOP HORSE.

"The man standing in the road shouted: 'Hold up, you've got to stop here.' At the same time he fired his revolver in the air to stop the horse, which was going at a fast trot. The animal became frightened and reared on its haunches and at the same time shied to the right, and almost landed on the second highwayman, who was standing by the side of the road. He made a reach to seize the horse, which so startled the horse that it plunged directly forward. In the effort to get out of the way the robber in the road stepped back, stumbled and fell. He quickly recovered his feet and, with a volley of oaths sent two bullets whistling near the head of Mr. Johnson, who was fast disappearing in the darkness. One of the bullets grazed the top of his hat, but for the fact that he was stooping forward trying to get control of the horse, the bullet would have hit his mark, and another murder would have been added to the list of crimes which are causing consternation among the people of Portland.

ROCK PILE IN OPERATION

For the First Time City Prisoners Break Stone for the City Engineer Today.

The 16 prisoners who are working out their sentences by decree of the Municipal Court did not go to work this morning grading Kelly street as they have been doing for the past 10 days. The grading is being done on the side of a hill and it was decided that owing to the rain it would be inadvisable to continue the work today. Therefore the prisoners were ordered to the old rock pile and R. M. Riner, who formerly drove the patrol wagon, was put in charge of the gang. The men are protected against the elements at this place as they work under a canvas roof.

The blacksmith and his "friend" walked down Second street and finally turned into First street. When they reached the corner at Gilsan street the strange man suddenly turned on Wagner and dealt him a stunning blow on the head with the butt-end of a revolver. An ugly gash was inflicted and the dazed man dropped to the ground. While he was lying in the street the thug went through the victim's clothes, taking all the money he had, \$21.

BEFORE THE SEARCH WAS COMPLETED WAGNER RECOVERED HIS STRENGTH AND, LEAPING TO HIS FEET, HE DETERMINED TO CAPTURE THE MAN, IF POSSIBLE.

The two struggled for a few minutes during which both men lost their hats. The highwayman finally escaped, but he took Wagner's hat and the latter helped himself to that of his false friend. Wagner's injuries on the head gave him much pain this morning when he appeared at police headquarters to tell his story. It is not believed, however, that they will result seriously. The blacksmith related his story at length, but was unable to give an accurate description of his assailant. He thinks that he is a German.

POLICEMAN'S NEGLECT OF DUTY.

Last night about 11 o'clock great excitement was caused in the vicinity of First and Market streets by the loud cries of "help" and "murder" which came from a room in the lodging house at 335 First street, over the notorious saloon where Guglielmo was recently stabbed to death. A large crowd gathered and listened to the terrible cries of a woman who was being beaten or murdered. No one made a move to go to the rescue, but an effort was made to get a policeman. Finally when the cries of murder were being choked from the lips of the woman and the sounds were but gurglings and groans, several men went to the room and tried to gain admittance. The voice of a man on the inside called out that he would kill the first person who entered the room.
