BROWNS DEFEAT 'FRISCO TEAM

Portland Batters Hit Harder Than Opponents and Capture a Well-Played, but Not Exciting Game.

Francis Appeared at Third for the Locals, but Owing to Stiffness Did Not Do Anything Marvellous.

Portland 4, San Francisco 3.
Batteries, Hogg and Vigneux, Whalen and Jacobs.

The Browns defeated San Francisco yesterday by better batting, having practically won the game in the first inning, when, upon short acquaintance with Jimmy Whalen, the locals captured three runs, on a two-bagger, triple and a single. The contest, while a close throughout, was not of the exciting kind. Kelly's catch of a difficult foul fly in the seventh inning and Shay's home run in the seventh being the principal features. Blake, the center, did not seem to center the hits that came his way with the accuracy of a first-class fielder, letting Krug's single get away from him, thus allowing that runner to advance to third. A similar blunder last week resulted in four runs crossing the plate. Francis appeared at third in Andrew's place, but failed to distinguish himself in the position or at the bat. Out of two easy chances he juggled one, and threw the other wide for first, but Van Buren stretched himself to extra inch and pulled in the leather. Four times at bat resulted in nothing. Of course it being his first game, and the fact that he has just come across the continent, not much could be expected of him, but those who are supposed to know say that he is a clever player. His style, however, in going after infield balls is not correct. He appears to move in a chunk. A few days' work ought to bring him into playing form. His arm is swift and accurate.

The work of the Browns was not so brilliant the last two games as it was when Sacramento was here, but the team work is in evidence. The Browns ran bases well yesterday, taking several desperate chances, getting caught occasionally. Vigneux's work behind the bat was good and the manager made a safe bing to Whalen's legs. Hogg pitched a masterly game, striking out four batters, keeping the hits well scattered and making a clean single himself. With men on bases he was steady and at all time had the batsmen guessing.

Bad Decisions Again.
Umpire McDonald's work was just as bad as on the previous day, his decisions of bases and balls and strikes being very poor. On a fly to Meany, in the fifth, Nadeau was caught off first in a country block. But the determined official insisted upon calling him safe. Shay was fairly struck out in the seventh and Vigneux should have had a base on balls in the fourth, but McDonald wouldn't issue the decrees.

Exclusively stated in yesterday's Journal, Umpire Levy was recalled from Seattle last evening and will officiate in this city today. McDonald being relegated to the woods at Seattle. Levy arrived last night and looks the picture of health, although he was ill in Seattle on Tuesday and unable to umpire the Sacramento-Seattle contest. The return of Levy is welcome news. Levy made his first appearance here three weeks ago when Los Angeles played his series. His work the first four days was not up to the standard, but after he got accustomed to his new surroundings he gave excellent satisfaction. His awards during the series last week were fair and just.

Detail of the Game.

Shay led off with a single to left, stole second, took third on Meany's out and scored on Irwin's long fly. Krug singled to center and went to third when Blake allowed it to go through him, but Lynch flew to Nadeau leaving Heinley stranded. The Browns gave Jimmy Whalen a warm reception in their double, when Herbert smashed out a double, Van sacrificed, Nadeau followed "Spears" example and also hit for two and Hurlburt was over the pan. Nadeau tried to score on Anderson's hit to Wade. Whalen, the gentleman had some difficulty in fielding, but McDonald called Phil out at the plate. Hollingsworth hit to right, Pat Meany in running in on a full down and when the ball was in the net Anderson had crossed the plate. A "Holly" was perched on third. Blake's single brought Holly over the pan. Francis, hit to Delmas and was out at first. Frisco got one more in the fourth when Jacobs hypnotized Willie Hogg into passing him after two were out and scored when Anderson muffed Shay's fly, and the ball rolled to the foul line out of Hurlburt's reach, allowing Shay to take third before it could be fielded. Meany flew, retiring the side. Shay, the first man up, tied the score in the first of the seventh with a clean home run over the left field fence. Willie Hogg took a brace and got the next three batsmen.

The Browns came back in the seventh with the necessary one run to the good on Hogg's single. Hurlburt's sacrifice and Van Buren's two-bagger, which scored Hogg. Van tried to take three bases on the hit but was caught on third base pretty throw from Krug to Irwin. Nadeau hit safely and stole second, but Anderson was out at first and the scoring was over for the day as neither team got a man past second during the rest of the game. This is the official score:

The Chicago boy will be heavily backed when he steps into the arena in Mechanics' Pavilion next Saturday night.

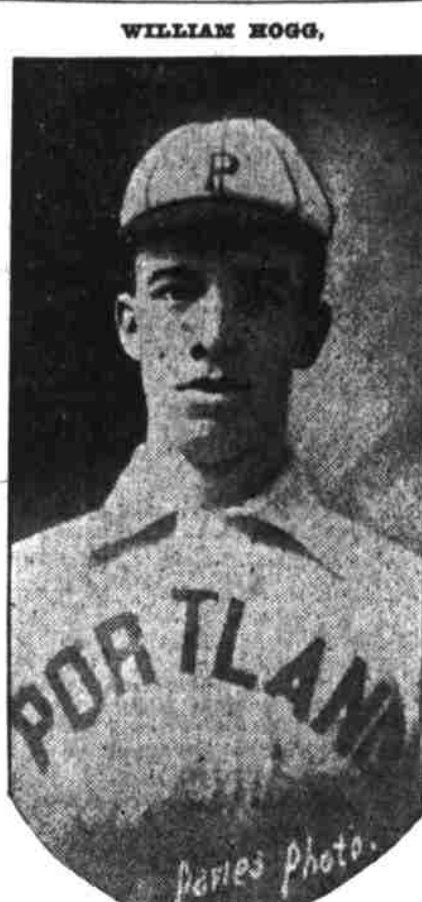
The preliminary battles will be between Charley Hawley and George Fuller; Dave Barry and Billy McDonald. All these men are in training and should put up interesting preliminaries.

FITZ WILLING TO TAKE JEFF'S PLACE

"Lanky" Robert Says He Will Gladly Fill Jeffries' Engagement with Corbett to Avoid a Postponement of Fight.

The Big Champion in a Rage Because Press Reports Have Gone Out Regarding His True Condition.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30.—Bob Fitzsimmons surprised the sporting people today by announcing that there would be no postponement of the big fight if he had anything to say. "I think Mr. Jeffries is the best fighter in the world, and think that I have it on all but him," remarked the red-topped heavyweight. "If Mr. Jeffries cannot fill the bill on August 14 you can say for me that I am ever ready to take his place. And I am not joking."

Fitzsimmons has had a play written that he is thinking of producing in the fall, in which the action causes him to take the place of a drugged fighter and save an enormous wager for the father of his sweetheart. Bob has fixed the wager in the thousands and his strong scene is in the second act where the father cries out that he is ruined, upon learning that his protegee has gone to the bad from the villain's plot. The daughter tearfully pleads with Bob to re-enter the ring and fight for her hand. Fitz hesitates, meditating with arms folded, and finally replies in melodramatic fashion that he will come to the rescue. It is unnecessary to state that Bob fights and wins—in the play.

When Fitzsimmons heard that Tommy Ryan was assisting Corbett, he remarked: "He couldn't teach Corbett anything. He never taught Jeff a single move. Jeff is just a natural fighter, and it's no use for anyone to try and teach him the game. When a man is fighting he has to watch the fellow in front of him, and he can't listen to words from his corner. If he tries to he usually gets a clout on the side of the head that wakes him up. I wouldn't be able to do anything myself for Jeffries, and I know more than any of them. Jeff has beaten me and that is enough. All he has to do is to hit Corbett and it will be all off. Tommy Ryan can't prevent that, and no one knows it better than Tommy himself."

At Harbin Springs.

James J. Jeffries is completely disgusted at the reports sent out from San Francisco, and especially from the Corbett camp, that he may ask for a continuance of the big battle. He was as mad as a bull when questioned, and said:

"There will be no postponement of the big fight. That news was invented for some other reason. Its author will find, however, that the scheme will not work for I will be on hand good and hard when the time comes, and I will also be in good condition."

Billy Delaney then chimed in and told Jeff not to bother about what had been said. "You have never humbugged the public as long as you have appeared before them, and I don't intend you to begin now. You are now in good condition, and you will be better than when you faced Fitzsimmons. You box much faster than before, and in my opinion, you know much more of the game."

That Jeff is much faster and has recovered good use of his leg was shown by the fact that he sparred several fast rounds with Fitzsimmons and roughed it a bit with Kennedy. He also went through his regular routine and finished up in good shape. He is now tugging along as well, if not better, than when the injury first caused the doctor to be summoned.

At Camp Corbett.

Jim Corbett was not so full of talk yesterday regarding Jeffries. He received tidings from Harbin Springs this morning to the effect that Jeff is working hard for the contest, which contradicted previous stories that made him remark that Jeff was trying to crawl. He no longer imagines that the fight will be postponed.

In view of the changed conditions, Corbett went to the boxing platform and put in a hard morning's work. He took on Big Kenny and Sam Berger and made them go as fast as they could for five rounds each. He wound up the performance by trying out little Frankie Neal. He clouted the little bantamweight hard and often, but Frank would not stop, and kept coming for more. After the bout Corbett remarked that in Britt, Hamilton and Neal, the Frisco sports have three lads who could be backed to win their respective championships.

Corbett jumped on the scales today and touched the beam at 185 1/2 pounds. Professor Darr claims he will continue building Jim up until the date of the fight, when he will weigh in the 190 division.
