BLITHSWOOD IN FROM HONOLULU

Handsone Ship Arrives in Portland Harbor This Morning and Is Tied Up at the Oceanic Dock.

Master and Crew Enjoy Themselves Playing Cricket on Board and Would Like to Meet Local Team.

Portland windjammer ever entered the harbor looking more spick and span than the British ship Blithswood which arrived this morning at 7 o'clock in tow of the Harvest Queen. From stem to stern she is clean as a pin and the appearance of her cabin is sufficiently attractive as to appeal strongly to the most artistic.

The vessel came in ballast from Honolulu and did not bring coal, as was erroneously stated in a local newspaper. She secured a berth at the Oceanic dock, where her ballast will be discharged. Immediately afterward she will begin taking on lumber for South Africa at the Eastern & Western Mill.

The Blithswood made the passage from Honolulu in 25 days, the smoothest and glassiest of voyages without incident. Captain Owen B. Pritchard, master of the ship, says that the time was enjoyably passed by himself and crew in playing cricket.

This is about the only craft on the seas on which the great English game is played with the same interest and dexterity that it is on land.

Cricket at Sea. Nets are arranged all around to prevent the balls from going overboard, and no more enthusiasm was ever thrown into any sport than the Blithswood sailors show when they are arrayed against each other in a game of cricket on the high seas.

Captain Pritchard says he has two of the best cricket teams that ever visited Portland, and he is anxious to get up a game with some local club, just to show how easy it is for the "land-lubbers" to gain a victory over the "sea-lubbers."

Two religious services are held each Sunday on the Blithswood, which is also a radical departure from the usual custom on sailing vessels. Well Acquainted Here. Captain Pritchard has only been master of the Blithswood during the past month, but he has been at Portland several times before as captain of the British ship Humber B. Hall, and he is fairly well acquainted in port. Last winter, he says, he made the second passage from San Francisco to Sydney, Australia, covering the distance in 42 days with 2,345 tons of flour aboard. He left the Bay City December 19 and reached the Australian port on January 30. From there he went to Newcastle, N. S. W., and took on a cargo of coal for Honolulu, coming from there direct to Portland.

The Blithswood is well known in Portland, having been here in 1897 and again two years later. At that time Captain Benjamin Dixon was in command, but as the result of a fall on deck he was badly injured and is now lying in a Liverpool hospital.

When leaving here on her last voyage, bound for Alcoa Bay with a cargo of grain, the Blithswood encountered a severe storm while rounding the Horn, and was almost wrecked. About one-half of her starboard bulwarks were carried away and her "choke" was lost, necessitating her putting into Valparaiso for repairs. Many alterations were then made in the appearance of the vessel, her cabin being converted into two "houses."

First Mate H. Johnson has been with the ship for the past 11 years and four months. He is a typical seaman and is listed for the first captaincy made vacant in the fleet of vessels now operated by the company which owns the Blithswood. He formerly resided in Portland and while here he was called on many of his old-time friends.

Rails in River. A barge containing 60 tons of steel rails, belonging to the City & Suburban Railroad Company, tipped over yesterday morning near the Greenwicks dock and spilled its cargo into the Willamette. It is believed the rails can be recovered with little difficulty.

Saxon Chartered. The British ship Saxon was chartered yesterday by W. R. Grace & Co., of San Francisco to load lumber for a South American port. The Saxon has just completed discharging her cargo of lumber from Antwerp. She will load lumber at the North Pacific mill.

Blocked Navigation. The big raft of logs, built and owned by the Robertson Raft Co., will probably be started on its way to San Francisco today from Coal Creek Slough, near Stella. For the past few days the logs have blocked navigation in the slough, but Captain Shaver of the Shaver Transportation Co., has been informed that his boats can again get in there after today.

Opposition to Line. A printed time table of The Dalles Transportation Company has just been issued giving the days of the week on which the steamer Charles R. Spencer will sail from Portland and The Dalles. C. E. Steadman is named as the Portland agent, J. W. Critchton as The Dalles agent and Capt. E. W. Spencer as the general manager. No date is given for the first sailing. The steamer's cabin is being considerably altered, but otherwise very few repairs are being made to the vessel, consequently the work will soon be completed.

Marine Notes. The steamer Albany is undergoing slight repairs at Supple's boat yards. Capt. O. W. Stosford has returned from a visit to San Francisco where he purchased machinery for the new launch he is having built. The steamship Robert Dollar sailed from Astoria this morning for San Francisco with a cargo of lumber.

The schooner Robert Evans and Mabel Gale arrived last evening from the mouth of the river in tow of the R. R. Thompson. The Evans will load lumber at the Eastern mill and the Mabel Gale will take similar cargo at Inman's.

Early Sunday morning the Indrasama will sail for China and Japan with a cargo of flour and general merchandise whose value will approximate \$200,000. The flour alone is worth \$177,727. The Oriental liner Indrapura reached Yokohama yesterday. She sailed from Portland on July 9.

NOT ALLOWED TO GRADE STREETS

W. C. Brown, an East Side Property Owner, Says He Is Being Imposed Upon by Inman, Poulsen Company.

Company Occupies Thoroughfare and He Cannot Improve It—Declares Judge H. W. Hogue Insulted Him.

W. C. Brown, a property owner of the East Side, declares that for over a month he has been unable to grade the streets in front of his lots, although holding a permit from the city to do so, on account of the actions of Inman, Poulsen & Co. Brown further alleges that he can get no redress in the Municipal Court and that he has been repeatedly insulted by Judge H. W. Hogue.

Brown, with the exception of two lots in the southwest corner, all of the block bounded by East Third, Division and Iron streets and Union avenue. The Inman, Poulsen Company and the Banfield, Veysay Fuel Company are just across Division street from the north. "The Inman, Poulsen Company has for a long time occupied a great deal of Division street and when I secured a permit to grade along my half of that thoroughfare the company prevented the contractors from putting their side of the street under the street. The contractor nor I desired to take the matter into the courts if possible and work was stopped."

"I took the matter before Municipal Judge Hogue, but he refused to do anything and has insulted me on several occasions. I intend to go before the Mayor. Several of the councilmen have interested themselves in the matter, but so far nothing seems to have been accomplished. The Inman, Poulsen Company has been notified by the City Engineer to vacate the street but the company still occupies the thoroughfare."

Mr. Brown declares that one of the companies maintains a barn in the middle of the street.

City Engineer W. C. Elliott is absent from the city, but Office Deputy A. M. Shannon confirmed Mr. Brown's story regarding the taking out of a grading permit and the notifying of the Inman, Poulsen Company to remove its lumber from the street. "The company was notified over a week ago," said Mr. Shannon, "but so far the street has not been vacated. The Engineer's office would like to see Mr. Brown allowed to vacate his property and get his rights."

DOES NOT EXPECT HIS MONEY BACK

"Yes, I am back in Portland, but I have little hope of ever getting my money back," was the plaintive comment of George Peterson, whose recent visit to Portland cost him a \$1,000 bill. Peterson is a miner past middle age who was robbed in a North End colored dive of \$1,000 in cool cash. He reported the matter to the police, but they seemed unable to do anything for him. After waiting around for a week, the miner became tired and went to St. Martin Springs from which he has just returned.

It was reported that the thief had made a proposition to the Police Department to compromise by returning \$750, but this was refused. Now Peterson is shy of money and no one has been convicted of the crime. There is another story going the rounds that "Ready Money," a notorious colored woman stole the money and left the city.

Chief Hunt tells me I can't identify the thief, so I suppose they will never do anything about it," Peterson said in disgust.

SHANLEY IS CHARGED WITH BEING THIEF

C. Shanley was arraigned in the Police Court today, charged with the larceny of a quantity of clothing and jewelry, the property of A. Williams.

Shanley formerly roomed at the Oregonian house, Third and Couch streets. Tuesday, it is claimed that he entered Williams' room and also that occupied by J. Green in the same place. From Williams' room he took a watch, a silver jewelry case and a revolver were taken. Green lost a pair of clothes, a pair of shoes and some linen.

Detective Hartman followed a number of slight clues and after some skillful work located the booty in Shanley's room in the California House, Third and Davis streets, where he had moved. The value of the goods recovered is about \$150. Shanley was arrested on the street by the officer.

DAVIS AND HOWARD MAY ESCAPE TRIAL

The Police Department is much chagrined today at the refusal of the District Attorney to send to Tacoma for Slim Davis and Lame Louie Howard, alleged bunko men, who are said to have swindled William Lund out of \$95 Wednesday.

It was after considerable activity that the men were found, and it was expected that Detective Day would go to Tacoma to bring the pair back, but the District Attorney claims that the evidence is not sufficiently conclusive to secure a conviction.

Lund was enticed into a card game and was bunked out of his money. The stand taken by the District Attorney is that if a man voluntarily enters a game with the intention of gain, the man who cheats him cannot be convicted. If they take his money from him by force the evidence is conclusive if proved.

THE ORDINANCE AGAIN SHELVED

Health Committee Did Not See Its Way Clear to Take Any Action on Meat Inspection Bill Today.

Councilman Albee Fought for the Measure Vigorously, but Was Overruled by the Majority Members.

"Groggy" is the best term to describe the condition of the meat ordinance when the Health and Police Committee relegated it to the shelf again today. Councilman Albee fought vigorously for the recommendation of the ordinance, but Councilmen Sigler and Cardwell opposed him and practically defeated any action on the measure for another month at least. This is taken to mean that it ultimately will be killed, as The Journal stated last evening.

Zimmerman's substitute ordinance was first considered, but it was immediately tabled indefinitely. Then the original Board of Health ordinance was taken up and Councilman Sigler opposed it for two reasons: First, that it meant more offices and he was against the increase of the municipal expenses; and, secondly, that there would possibly be three out of 10 animals inspected which might be infected and still pass the inspectors. He insisted further that the city had no means to pay for inspection now. Health Officer Dr. Hutchinson thereupon asked the member if he would simply report the ordinance to the council without recommendation, but this question he did not answer.

Albee fought vigorously for the ordinance, but the remainder of the committee still objected.

The ordinance was finally laid on the table "until the finance committee could see their way clear to provide the expense for inspection."

FAVORITE SALOON RAIDED BY POLICE

The Favorite Saloon, at Fourth and Couch streets, the rendezvous, it is alleged, of crooks and thieves, is now closed and "Bob" Patterson and the others connected with the place were in the Police Court today on various charges.

This resort has been under the ban since the robbery of Frank Kempler, a farmer, last week by Annie Pollard, an inmate of the place. The license issued to John Fritz, but reported to be in reality belonging to the notorious Patterson, was revoked by the City Council Wednesday afternoon.

The place continued to run full blast until 5:15 o'clock yesterday afternoon, when a well-planned raid was carried out by Patrolmen Bay and Gibson, under the orders of Chief of Police Hunt. At noon License Inspectors McEachern and Hutchinson served formal notice on Fritz of the revocation of the license. He said he desired to consult his lawyers and continued to run.

Those arrested were Patterson, who was charged with keeping a bawdyhouse; Mollie Gordon, Bess White, Marcel Laclede and Fiuella Maclede, accused of being inmates of the place; John Fritz, selling liquor without a license. Charles Derry, the bartender, was held for Chief Hunt, but later released.

In the Police Court a plea of not guilty was entered by all the prisoners. The cases against Fritz and Patterson were continued until next Wednesday, while those of the women will be heard tomorrow.

OLD-TIME RESIDENT DIES

Joseph Sechtum, Who Came Here in the Early Days, Expires at His Home.

Joseph Sechtum, one of the well known residents of Portland and a man of wide acquaintance, died last evening at his residence, 271 1/2 Fourth street. He had been sick for some time, but gradually grew worse and last night the end came. The deceased was 50 years of age and is survived by a wife and two brothers. No definite arrangements have been made as yet for the funeral services.

Mr. Sechtum came to this city early in the 80's and has resided here since. He went to California during the early gold rush coming over as an emigrant from Germany and in 1889 he was married in this city to Mrs. Katherine Reynolds.

ONCE A MINISTER, NOW HIGHWAYMAN

Falls in Love with Parishoner's Wife and Is Compelled to Leave Church—Becomes Soldier, Then Desperado.

SALT LAKE CITY, July 31.—Once an eloquent preacher enjoying the respect of a large congregation in an Illinois town, Rev. A. L. Blazor now lies in the city jail here charged with being a desperate highway robber and one of two men who held up a streetcar here two weeks ago.

Rev. A. L. Blazor, an outcast from his church, upon completing a term of enlistment in the army at the close of the Spanish War, during which he was noted for his recklessness, he settled here in this city and became a heavy drinker. A few years ago he was pastor in a prosperous Methodist Church in Illinois, but fell in love with the young wife of one of his parishioners and was forced to leave the town and the church.

He was once a preacher in California and Colorado before going to Illinois. A couple of weeks ago two masked men held up a streetcar and went through all the passengers and then made their escape. Blazor was arrested last night and was later identified by the conductor as one of the robbers.

YOUNG GIRL STEALS ALL FATHER'S MONEY.

With a Boy of 18 She Runs Away and They Register at a Bakersfield Hotel as Man and Wife.

BAKERSFIELD, July 31.—Roy Boyd, aged 18, and Rosa Fields, 15 years of age, came here from Fresno and put up at the Arlington Hotel under the name of Thomas Brown and wife of San Francisco. The City Marshal, under instructions from the girl's father, went to the hotel yesterday morning and arrested the couple. The girl is charged with stealing all her father's earnings as a streetcar employee at Fresno. The amount was \$500. The girl disappeared from her home and it was said she had gone to Missouri to join her mother who is visiting there. Boyd claims that he intends to marry the girl.

POSSES ON TRAIL OF DESPERATE OUTLAWS

(Journal Special Service.) LOTUS, July 31.—Convicts are now believed to be on one side of Weber Creek, and the posses on the other waiting for reinforcements. Capt. Taylor has been sent to Folsom for more help. He says the Placerville troops are six miles away and doing nothing and that the convicts cannot be taken without plenty of assistance.

MOB AFTER NEGROES HOLD UP A TRAIN

(Journal Special Service.) MAYSVILLE, Ky., July 31.—The Chesapeake & Ohio train was held up near Clifton Forge, Va., last night by a mob who wanted to lynch three negroes who had been arrested for killing a prominent citizen of that place and who were being taken to Covington for safe keeping.

Some of the mob held up the engineer while others searched the train, and falling to find the negroes they fired on the train as it pulled out, breaking a large number of windows and terrorizing the passengers, who laid on the floors to escape the storm of bullets. Two hundred men were in the mob. The conductor closed the vestibules of a portion of the train, making it impossible for the mob to pass through. Fifty shots were fired through the Jim Crow car, where the prisoners were. The train was a double-header and after the first few volleys the throttle wide open, thus frustrating the crowd.

COVINGTON, July 31.—A strong guard has been placed around the jail where the negroes are now confined, as it is believed an attempt will be made to lynch them tonight.

CHINESE MURDERER COMMITS SUICIDE

(Journal Special Service.) HEPPNER, Or., July 31.—Wong Hong Quong, the confessed murderer of Wong Ching at Heppner Junction, committed suicide last night by hanging himself in the county jail here.

Quong tied a silk handkerchief around a bar of the steel cage, making a loop, through which he stuck his head. His feet were within a few inches of the floor. Gong Lane, who is being held as an accessory, was taken to Condon today by Sheriff Johnson of Gilliam County.

NEBRASKA IS COLD

LINCOLN, Neb., July 31.—A cold wave is prevalent here. The thermometer is 50 degrees, the lowest ever recorded here in July.
