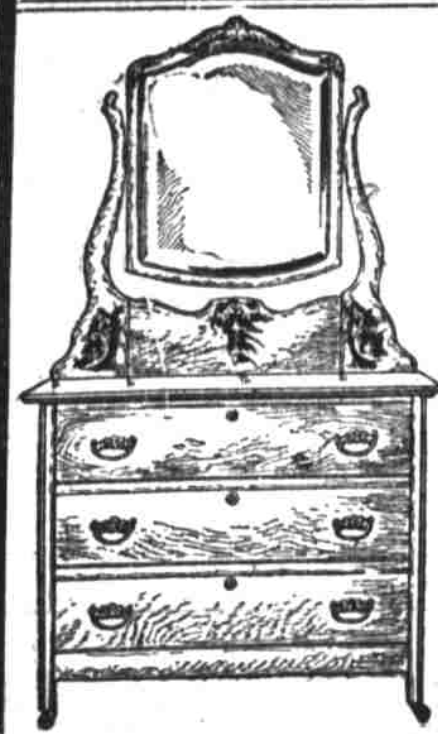

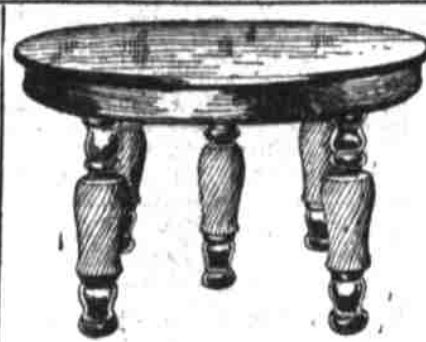

BEAUTIFUL FAIR SOUVENIR ISSUED

Booklet Published to Commemorate Laying Lewis and Clark Monument Cornerstone by the President.

Contains Beautiful Oregon Pictures and the Addresses—Volume Gotten Out by Press and Publicity Committee.

What is said by many to be the most beautiful souvenir yet issued by the Lewis and Clark Fair Corporation will be distributed by that company within the next few days. The memento is a booklet entitled, "Souvenir of the Laying of the Cornerstone of the Lewis and Clark Monument," the act which it honors having been performed in this city, May 21, 1903, by President Roosevelt. The booklet consists of some 40 pages, and contains all the notable addresses made at the City Park during the ceremonies incident to the laying of the cornerstone. The souvenir also contains a number of very pretty views. The first picture is the official emblem of the Lewis and Clark Fair, and was drawn by the noted Buffalo, N. Y. artist, Raphael Beck, who won the \$500 prize offered by the Exposition directors for the best symbolic design. The first Oregon scene contained in the booklet is a new view of Mt. Hood, having been reproduced from a photograph of that hoary mountain taken from a point on the Sandy River. The picture shows the eternal snow-capped peak in the distance, while in the foreground is seen the laughing waters of the Sandy; the great pine forests that lay between the river and the famous mountain are also shown in the view. The whole effect is a most pleasing one, not only on account of its beauty, but because the view is a new one.

Besides the picture of Portland's favorite mountain, the booklet contains a view of the Mount Hood National Monument, the Lewis and Clark Fair, the President in his carriage during the parade; the banquet table at the Hotel Portland laid for the Presidential feast on the evening of May 21; a double page view of the 1905 exposition grounds, showing Mt. St. Helens in the distance; a corner in the City Park; a large herd of Oregon elk, photographed in their native haunts; a moonlight view of a portion of the Fair site; Multnomah Falls; and a "spied van Glade on Balch Creek." The last named view is thought by many to be next to the Mt. Hood picture in point of beauty.

The souvenir also has the notable speeches made on the day of the Fair site; the visit to the City of Roses. The first is the address of welcome delivered by Mayor Williams on behalf of the City of Portland. The speech of Harvey W. Scott, entitled "The Purpose of the Exposition," is also printed in full. President Roosevelt's remarks at the cornerstone laying are in the booklet. The last of the articles printed is one by the late Hon. H. W. Corbett, and is entitled, "The Mighty Achievements of Lewis and Clark."

The cover of the wee book will be a

very artistic one, a complete description of which was printed in The Journal some time ago.

Copies of the souvenir will be sent to President Roosevelt and the members of his party who visited Portland, to the leading statesmen of the nation, and to a few others prominently connected with public affairs. Only 250 copies of the handsomely bound numbers of the souvenir will be issued.

The book was gotten out by the Fair's Press and Publicity Committee, of which I. N. Fieschner is chairman and Paul Wessinger and Leo Friede are members.

THE DALLES IS NO PLACE FOR CROOKS

One Arrives from Portland and Is Soon Gobbled Up by Town Marshal.

THE DALLES, Or., July 31.—F. H. Smith, alleged to be a notorious crook and pickpocket who arrived here several days ago from Portland looking for a greener field, was arrested yesterday for robbing a stranger of \$40.

Smith came up Tuesday on the Bailey Gatzert with several other crooks and while enroute he picked the pockets of a man by the name of Bristol. Accidentally, Smith let the man's purse fall to the floor, and through fear of detection dared not pick it up. The cabin boy, finding the purse, brought it to the marshal, who discovered a certificate of deposit on French & Co., for \$300 drawn to Bristol. The owner was soon found and his money returned. He then described Smith and his pals, who were acting suspiciously coming up on the boat. Smith, leaving the boat at Hood River to hide his tracks, came on to the Dalles on the night train and engaged rooms at the Umatilla House. He was well dressed and appeared to have money. Last night, falling in with a Finlander, he soon started to instruct the stranger how to play a new game, which was a sure thing. After learning the game and finding himself short \$40 he complained to Officers Wood and Sexton. Describing the man they soon recognized Smith, and calling at the Umatilla Hotel they landed their man. He at once broke down and begged to be let loose and offered as a special inducement \$100 as a bribe. He was taken at once to jail, where he now is. His pals, who have been closely watched since coming to the city, were ordered to leave town at once, which they did not do in doing.

INLAND EMPIRE WILL HAVE CROP

Leon Cohen of Pendleton Says the Yield Will Be Close to Normal and Prices Higher Than Last Year.

Joseph Barton Says the Sumpter Valley Railroad Will Be Constructed to Burns, and Not Simply on Paper.

"The loss occasioned to farmers in the Inland Empire by reason of the shortage of wheat yield will be completely offset by the higher prices that are being received," said Leon Cohen, one of the leading merchants of Pendleton. "The yield will be something like 70 per cent of the normal quantity, and the price at which the market opened this year was 62 cents for No. 1 Club, the standard grade by which the market is judged. The opening figure last year was 48, so that the producer is receiving fully as much for his crop as he would were the amount and the price as usual."

There has been much discussion in Portland regarding the status of the cereal crops of the Inland Empire, and many have feared a marked effect upon the business Portland does in that section. Reports have come of ruined crops in several places. The particular localities mentioned were the Juniper country in Umatilla County, Oregon, the Eureka Flat portion of Walla Walla County, Washington, parts of Adams County, Washington, and parts of the country known as the Palouse. C. W. Cather, a well-known machinery man of Portland, has received information concerning destruction of crops in various quarters, and hears from others in his line of trade the same alleged facts.

So general have been the statements of injury that considerable alarm has been felt among commercial and financial men here for the business of the coming fall and winter.

The statement of Mr. Cohen will reassure many who were perturbed by the reports, and his assertion is backed by Joseph McCabe, general manager of the Washington & Columbia River Railway, who is here from Walla Walla. Mr. McCabe asserts that the crop will be about 70 per cent of normal, and that higher prices will realize to the rancher his customary profits.

The same character of information was obtained from Joseph Barton, one of the general officers of the Sumpter Valley Railway. Mr. Barton is at the Portland Hotel, and said this morning that the region tributary to Baker City and Sumpter is highly prosperous, and that the mines are really now upon a basis of legitimate production, such as assures permanency for those camps.

Railroad to Be Extended.

"The Sumpter Valley road will be extended this year from Whitney, present terminus, to the Greenhorn ridge, eight miles," said he. "This will take us to the divide between the Powder River and the John Day River."

Being asked if the road will be ex-

tended further, Mr. Barton said, hesitatingly: "Of that, there is not the slightest doubt. We are to go on to Burns, Harney County. Our articles of incorporation call for construction that far, and we propose to go on to that point. We are not in the habit of building railroads on paper, and so we regard it as settled that our road is to go on to Burns, because it was the original intention of the owners of the company."

The Sumpter Valley road is owned principally by David Eccles, one of the leading Mormons of Salt Lake, Ogden and other cities wherein center Mormon interests.

"Every one appears to be well off who has any business in the county of Baker," said Mr. Barton, "and there is no reason why they should not be, for times are good and opportunities abundant."

**E. N. HUTCHINSON
NOT OUT OF RACE**

Though Gone He Is Still Being Offered as Candidate for State Veterinarian.

A numbers of supporters of Dr. E. N. Hutchinson, lately in charge of the Bureau of Animal Industry at Portland, today called on Gov. Chamberlain and Secretary of State Dunbar, who are in Portland, to urge his appointment to the office of State Veterinarian. Senator W. H. Weirung, the third member of the board, was also seen in his interest.

Indorsements continue to come in from influential persons, who are furnishing the State Board of Agriculture to appoint Dr. Hutchinson. It is understood that action will be taken within a few days, and it is believed by well-informed persons that his selection will be made by the board.

Dr. E. N. Hutchinson bears a high reputation among the medical fraternity of the state, having received exceptionally unanimous support from those of that profession who have moved in the matter. None is opposing him among the physicians. Live stock interests are enthusiastically urging his appointment.

All question has been removed concerning the justice of allegations touching his conduct of the office he held here under the Department of the Interior. The special officer, Mr. McVella, who was sent to investigate, reported, and the department approved the report, that Dr. Hutchinson's work was that of a skilled scientist and worthy of the highest commendation.

That he has gone to Salt Lake to report for duty under the same bureau does not affect his position as being offered by his supporters to the State Board as a candidate for the State Veterinarian's office. They are continuing to urge him, and know that, in the event the board sees fit to name him, he will return to accept the position and at once file his acceptance.

While his personal political views are not particularly germane, he chances to be a Kentucky Democrat. However, his supporters for the office of veterinarian number as many Republicans as Democrats. They have urged him purely upon the grounds of efficiency, which they believe he possesses.

SHADE TREES TO BE CULLED OUT

Those Interfering with Sewer Pipes and Other Public Improvements Will Be Removed from Streets.

Mayor Williams Explains Why This Course Was Made Necessary—Powers of the Park Board Limited.

The Portland Council has adopted an ordinance providing that the City Engineer shall hereafter be invested with the power to regulate shade trees, the city charter having failed to make provision for the City Park Board to compel observance of any rules it might frame for discharging its functions.
