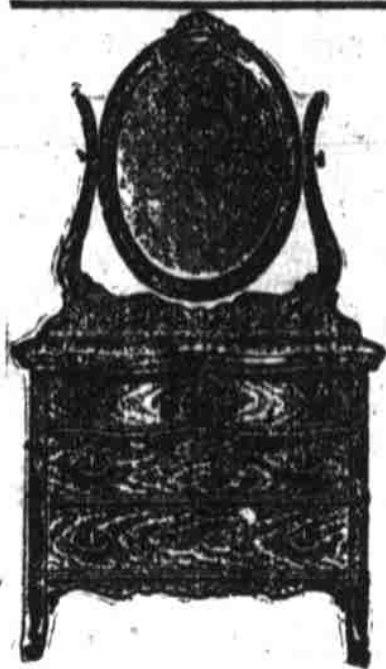

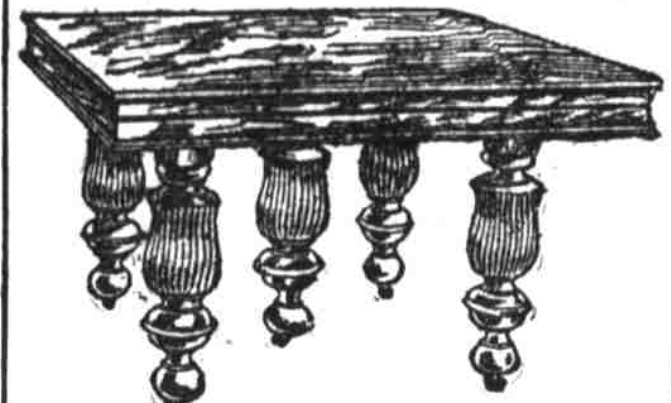

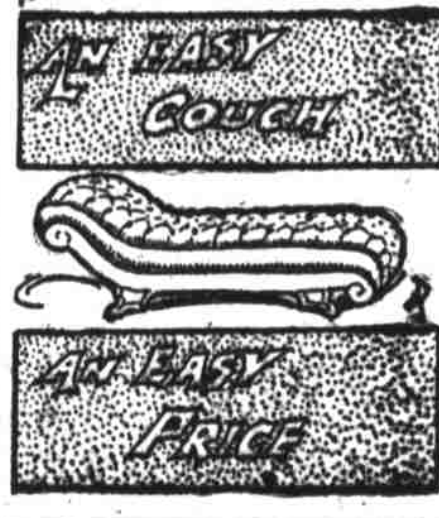

ENCIRCLES GLOBE IN THRILLING MAN HUNT

Two U. S. Marshals Search Earth for James C. Beasley, Accused of Forging Pay Checks at Nome---Find Their Man in South Africa.

(Journal Special Service.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., July 30.—When C. E. Herron and D. W. Dwyer, deputy United States marshals of Alaska, arrived here a week ago they had completely encircled the globe on a romantic and thrilling man hunt. They had left here six months ago, minus four days, with the necessary warrants and requisition papers for James C. Beasley, indicted by a Federal grand jury at Cape Nome, Alaska, on the charge of forging army pay checks for \$7,000. Herron and Dwyer had their man in charge when they arrived in Washington, but the chase for him has cost the Government \$11,000. They left with Beasley for Seattle Saturday night and should arrive there tonight.

A Letter Gave Him Away.
By means of a letter received at Cape Nome by a friend of Beasley's last December, Herron and Dwyer learned that Beasley had been in Tasmania, Australia, about a year before. They left here January 24 with the necessary papers. For two months they raked the mainland of Australia and all the adjoining islands for their man without result. They had lost track of him when they happened to occupy a table at a Melbourne hotel with an operative manager fresh from South Africa, who had played all the principal towns there with his company, on the way from London to Australia. The American sleuths had passed themselves off in Australia as mining experts from this country on a tour of inspection. The London man was full of admiration for the gold fields of South Africa, which he had just visited. Herron and Dwyer talked Alaska against South Africa.

Had About Given Up.
Had the sky sent down upon them at that moment a shower of gold, Herron and Dwyer could not have been more astonished. Just as they had given up pursuit of their quarry and were thinking of starting on their long return trip, empty handed, a fresh clue, and one that was substantial, was found. The deputy marshals were directed to proceed directly to South Africa from Australia and keep on the trail of Beasley until they found him.

River, where he was the owner of what is reported to be one of the richest copper mines in the world. He recognized his captors at sight and without any ado expressed a willingness to accompany them back to Alaska. From Petersburg, the extreme northern outpost of Transvaal civilization, Beasley's copper mine is a distance of nearly 300 miles through the wildest country on earth. The roar of lions, the shriek of hyenas, the trumpeting of elephants and the chatter of monkeys and parrots made sleep impossible to the detectives in camp at night. It was only in the day time that they were able to obtain rest. They were accompanied by six Kaffir guides, and it was necessary to go into camp at night to avoid the wild beasts of the jungle. That Beasley had captured his captors they themselves acknowledged. While expressing no opinion of his guilt or innocence, they say that he is one of the most companionable men they have ever met. At Cape Nome he was a high roller in a community of high rollers.

"He can spend \$500 quicker and with more resultant hilarity to everybody in the party than any man I ever saw on a frolic," said Deputy Dwyer. "He must have made \$1,000,000 or more in Alaska in three years," Dwyer went on to say, "and he spent it nearly as fast as he made it. If he gets out of this trouble and can hold onto his property in South Africa until he develops it, he will be one of the richest men in the world in a few years. I know what I am talking about, for I saw some of his property and talked with experts about other holdings of his which I did not see."

His Hair Turns White.
Beasley's frame is slight but sinewy. He is all bone and muscle. He is only 32 years old, but the thick hair on his head which was black before he went to live among the Kaffirs and lions of Africa, is white as snow. His black mustache is pointed and trimmed like that of the Kaiser. He was born in Australia, where his father went 40 years ago as engineer for an English mining syndicate. His brother is married to a daughter of Sir John Howell, a leader in the new Australian colonies. To this brother Beasley cabled for funds on his arrival here. That was Sunday night. Monday night an order on the Western Union Telegraph Company for \$2,500 in favor of Beasley was cabled here from Tasmania. Beasley was reared in California. His father owned a large ranch in that state near San Jose. It was here that Beasley built up the strong constitution that has withstood the icy blasts of Alaska and

the torrid temperature of South Africa. He was a graduate of the Leland Stanford University and then struck out for himself. Before he was 24 years old he had developed a copper mine in Arizona that is now a part of Senator Clark's great property in that region. His education at Leland Stanford University not only fitted him to know "pay dirt" when he saw it and how to develop it, but also to master the Kaffir language, strange as that may sound. This, in turn, enabled him to get on such friendly terms with the savages as to put him in possession of what he is convinced is one of the most valuable copper mines in the world. Beasley learned Latin thoroughly at the California University. He had not been among the Kaffirs a week before he discovered that their language resembled Latin. Beasley says they learned it from the Romans in the days of Rome's mastery of the world. The Latin these naked Kaffirs speak is for the most part purer, declares Beasley, than that spoken by any other people. When the words used by the modern Kaffirs are stripped of the prefixes and endings Beasley declares the original Latin is revealed.

Shown Him the Mines.
It was through this discovery that he was able to master the Kaffir language. This in turn placed him on such good terms with the Kaffir chiefs that one of them personally conducted him to an abandoned copper mine on the Crocodile River that had not been worked for more than 800 years, according to the traditions among the Kaffirs. He has collected evidence that shows that the Romans delved into this original vein of copper 2,000 years before. This sounds romantic, but Beasley's evidences seem to be convincing.

At any rate he has so far convinced an Anglo-American syndicate of the truth of his discovery, as to have nearly completed a deal for the sale of the major part of the property for \$5,000,000. He has turned over to his captors correspondence which establishes beyond a doubt the truth of this huge negotiation. This correspondence shows that a western Republican politician of national fame, who now lives in New York is his financial representative in the United States. This fact was learned only on condition that the name of the American should not be printed now. This man kept in constant communication with Beasley while the latter was here both by telegraph and long distance telephone. Beasley declares that the mineral wealth of Africa scarcely has been touched. He says now that the Boer War is over, and the bars are down, immigration is pouring into South Africa from every country of Europe and America in a constantly increasing stream.

FAIL TO SECURE THEIR LICENSES

Department Officers Will Make Arrests to Compel All the "Mystery Dealers" to Take Out Permits.

A Warrant Is Out for O. Yates, Candy Dealer, Who Is Delinquent—Others to Be Served Immediately.

Palmists, clairvoyants, mediums and other professionals engaged in business of that character are to be favored with closer attention by the city license officials. The report is made that there are very few who have paid their license fees, and taken out a proper permit, as provided by law, and unless they come within the next few days and settle up, arrests will follow. Already

the officers are drawing up a list of delinquents for whom arrests will be issued.

The delinquents are found in almost every line of trade and, while the officers have been exceedingly lenient heretofore, City Auditor Devlin has instructed his deputies to swear out warrants if there is shown a deliberate intent to violate the law.

S. Weiss, proprietor of the Portland Sawdust Company, was arrested on Tuesday and yesterday was tried in the Police Court. Upon the recommendation of License Officer Hutchinson, Judge Hogue imposed the minimum fine, \$5, but issued a warning that if the offense was repeated he would assess the maximum. Weiss had fallen behind four quarters without taking out a license, although notified repeatedly, so the officers claim. A warrant was also issued today and served on O. Yates, the proprietor of a candy store at Third and Morrison streets. His case is said to present several redeeming features, but it was thought best to take the matter up immediately.

The officers of the department are now working on a list of delinquents comprising almost every branch of trade, with a view to issuing warrants. These will be served within the next few days. In some flagrant cases it is thought that the maximum fines will be imposed.

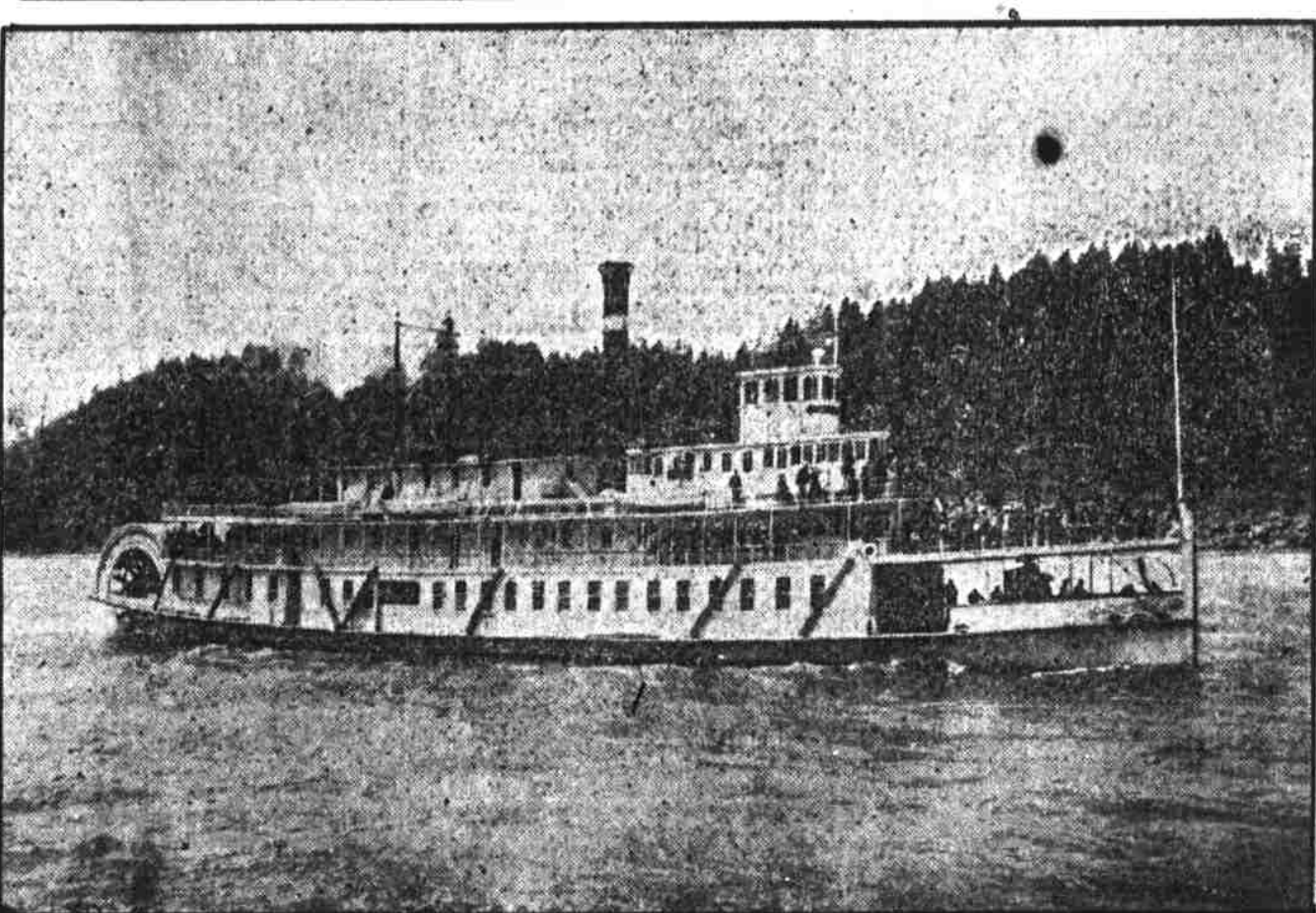
BEN STEARNS CAPTURED

KANSAS CITY, July 31.—Ben Stearns, the one-armed train robber who escaped from the Leavenworth Penitentiary 10 days ago by scaling the wall by the aid of his teeth, was shot through the leg and captured near Richmond last night by a posse in pursuit. The man hunt extended across four counties and had been in progress one week.
