

WAITING FOR THE NEW POPE

Anxious Throngs Gather About St. Peter's and Watch the Sistine Chapel Wherein the Conclave Is in Session.

A Puff of Yellow Smoke Gives Disappointment as It Tells that the Morning Ballot Was Unsuccessful.

Not Believed that a Long Meeting Will Be Necessary—Advices State that Rampolla Is in the Lead.

(Journal Special Service.) ROME, Aug. 1.—Subdued excitement has possession of Rome today. The populace expects an early election of the new pope and in consequence thousands are gathering this afternoon in sequestered places of the city in holiday attire waiting the news from the secret chamber, wherein the cardinals gathered in solemn conclave.

THOUGHT BRIDGE UNSAFE

Multnomah County Owns Morrison Street Structure, but Had Never Condemned It Since Securing Control.

Yesterday's Accident Was the First Serious One Occurring While Aquatic Sports Were in Progress.

County Is Liable for Damages If It Is Shown that Footwalk Was Not Safe on Account of Weakness.

The Morrison street bridge is owned by Multnomah county and not by the city. The accident yesterday was the most serious one that ever happened during aquatic sports on the Willamette River, and the only one that resulted in fatalities.

Considered Dangerous. The Morrison-street bridge has at different times during the past 10 years been considered dangerous by travelers.

Was Repaired. Three years ago more repairs were made and among them was the sidewalk that fell with its human load.

Question of Liability. District Attorney John Manning was asked this morning what effect the Morrison-street bridge accident was liable to have upon the county.
