

THE NEWSBOYS WILL PICNIC AT MAGOON PARK TOMORROW



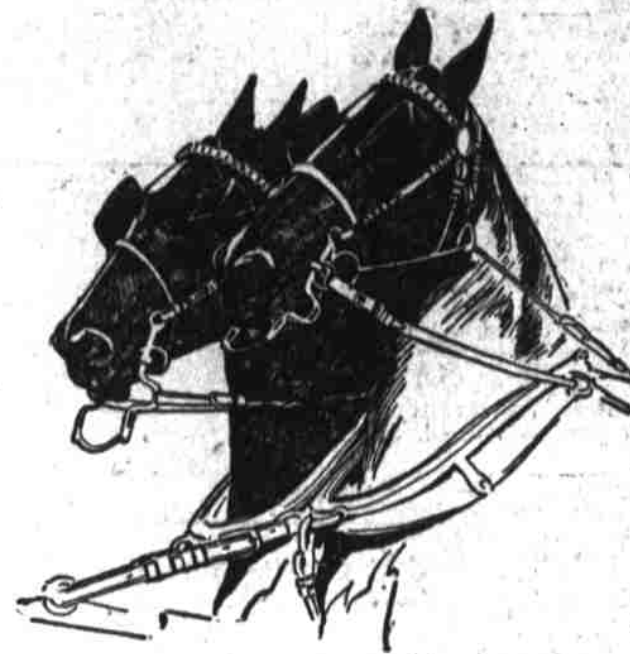
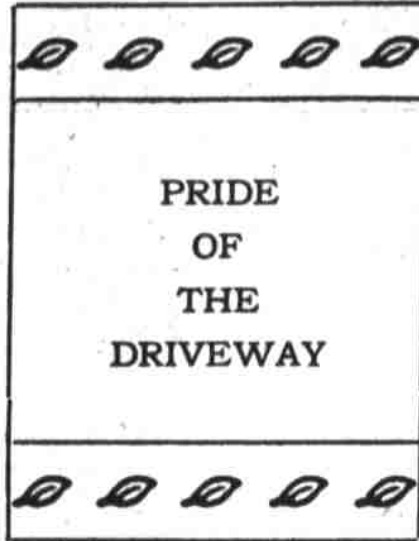

PORTAGE ROAD TO BE CONSTRUCTED

Governor Chamberlain Says that the State Will Proceed to Prepare for the Work to Be Done on Line.

As Long as There Is Room for Two Tracks Along the River the Land Can Be Condemned for Purpose Required.

"The State of Oregon will proceed to prepare for the construction of the portage road at Celilo rapids," said Governor Chamberlain this morning. "Just what our next steps will be, we are not yet ready to say, excepting that the engineer will compare the maps showing the right of way of the O. R. & N., and the route of the proposed portage, and ascertain at what points it is necessary to acquire, after which condemnation proceedings will be instituted in the courts. "The right of eminent domain is applicable to the property of the railroad company, and so long as there is room for two tracks to run along a given stretch of the river, it is legal for the state or a private corporation to condemn by court action the land necessary for another line of road."

O. R. & N. Yield Nothing. The conference between the state portage board and the O. R. & N. officials, held yesterday afternoon in President Mohler's office, resulted in no agreement being reached. The meeting was between Governor Chamberlain, Secretary of State Dunbar, State Treasurer Moore and Engineer A. E. Hammond, for the state, and President Mohler, Col. Crooks, assistant to the president, Chief Engineer W. H. Kennedy and Capt. Wanser, right of way agent for the railroad company.

In refusing concessions, President Mohler set forth that the state was asking the company to make a gift of valuable property rights which had been acquired at enormous expense, and that the portage road would injure the O. R. & N. materially as to the convenience of operating departments and the expense of maintenance of way.

"The state board," said the governor, "will exhaust all means at hand to carry out the provisions of the bill passed by the Legislature. We may even hope to complete the road in time to carry the next crop over the portage, or a share of it. If the expense proves to be greater than the \$155,000 provided for in the bill, we cannot go ahead and create a deficiency. But we will first ascertain whether or not such deficiency would arise. Mr. Hammond will report to us before we make further plans. But it may be said without qualification that the State of Oregon proposes to go ahead with the project."

Engineer Hammond stated that he was at work along the lines set forth by the Governor, and would later submit his report to them covering the engineering features.

GREAT PROSPERITY DOWN AT EUGENE

Estimated that the City Has Increased 10 Per Cent in Population During Two Years.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 1.—The growth of the City of Eugene has been remarked quite often but the statement of a local brick manufacturer will go further to prove the actual condition of things than the mere estimates of the newspaper men. J. M. Martin, in a statement today, said that Eugene could use 2,000,000 bricks at the present time if they were to be had on reasonable terms. He is a manufacturer and has burned two full kilns of 250,000 bricks each and is now engaged on his third. The demand is not confined to the \$35,000 opera house, \$30,000 high school building, three business blocks and similar structures, but comes from retail trade in great orders. Every house has to have a certain amount of brick and with a new house building on every block in the city the demand is great. It is estimated that 100 new dwellings have been built this year. As many as that were erected in the same length of time last year. The population has increased at least 10 per cent on 5,000 in two years. Business feels the boom and conditions are most favorable to prosperity.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 1.—The Lane County teachers' institute convenes in Eugene next Tuesday. A three days' program has been prepared by Superintendent Miller and the names of State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman, President B. F. Mulkey of the Southern Oregon State Normal School and City Superintendent A. F. Bechhold appear prominently thereon. The subjects discussed are of wide scope. Superintendent Miller expects to conduct a most profitable institute.

HALSEY SWEEP BY DISASTROUS FIRE

Beautiful and Prosperous Town Meets Great Loss—Business Section Suffers.

(Journal Special Service.) HALSEY, Or., Aug. 1.—Deep gloom overspreads this once pretty town today, occasioned by the great fire which destroyed nearly the whole business section late yesterday afternoon and last night.

At 5:30 o'clock, while many people were at their early supper, the alarm of fire was given. At the time a smart breeze was blowing from the west and soon great masses of flames were discovered issuing from the creamery in the northern part of the town owned by Mr. Kaupich of Corvallis. From there the fire spread to the warehouse owned by M. V. Koonka, and then jumping across the street it began the consumption of Odd Fellows' Hall and the general merchandise store owned by D. S. McWilliams.

Then big warehouse of Balfour, Guthrie & Co. was attacked and also the residence of H. Owens. The fire was a disastrous one for the town. During the progress of the conflagration Frank Cunningham was injured seriously by being struck by some heavy machinery which he was moving. 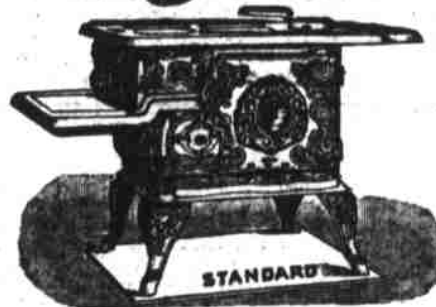

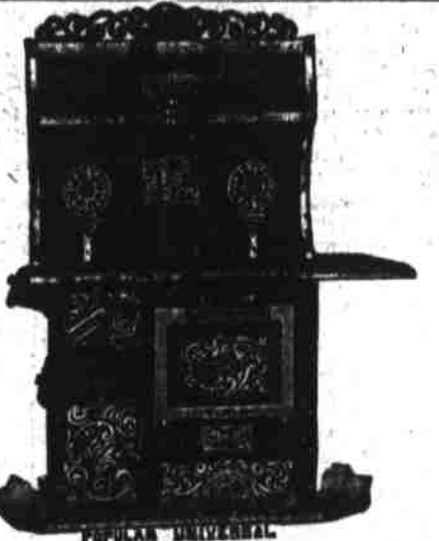

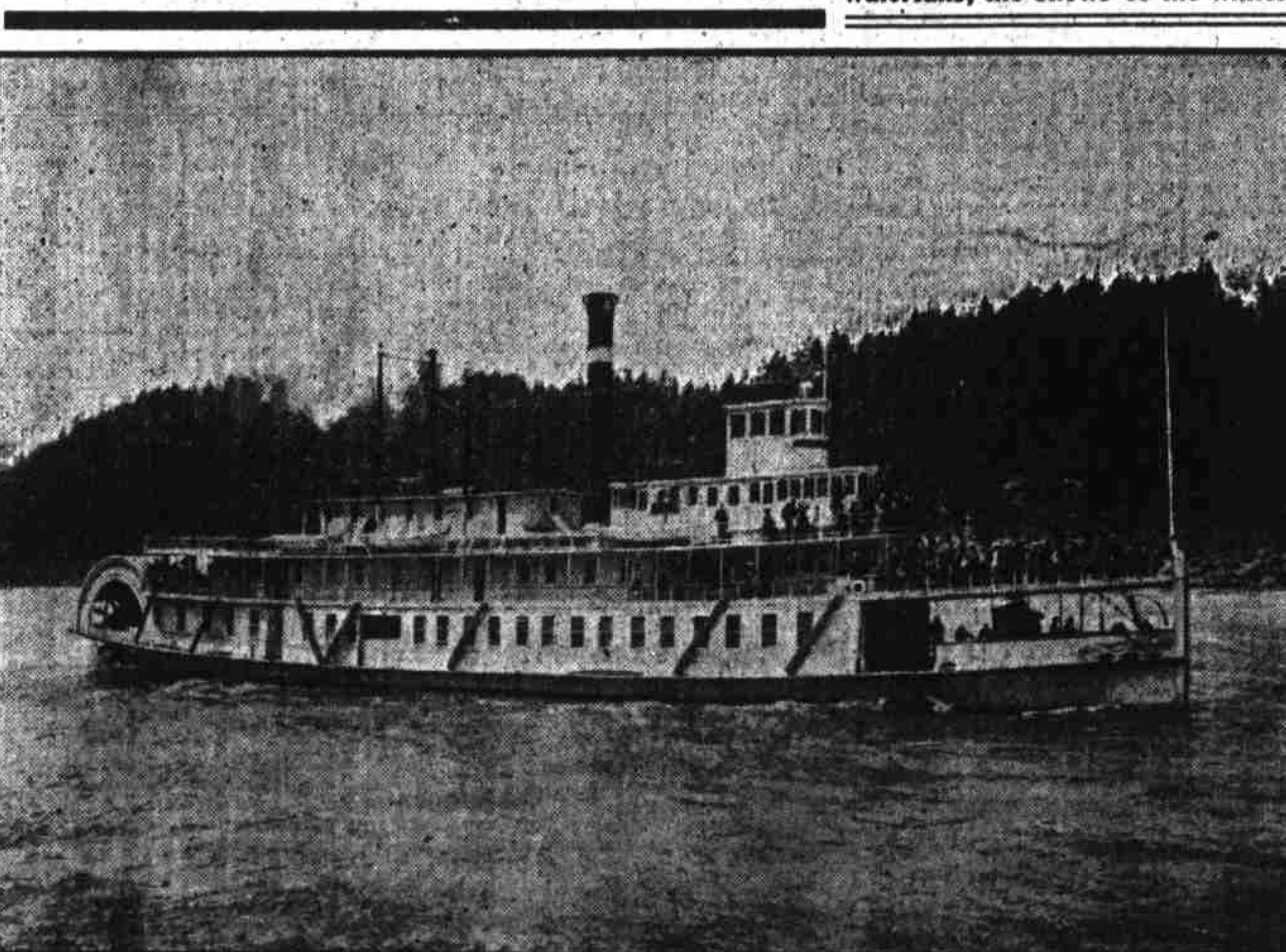
