

ITALY'S ACTION ON POPE

ROME, Aug. 5.—8:30 P. M.—Premier Zanardelli has informed all prefects in Italy that as no official announcement has been made to the Italian government of the election of the new Pope, all employees of the state must abstain from any ceremony in connection with Pope Pius X.

TWO MORE SUITS IN WARE LAND CASES

Two more suits were filed by United States District Attorney Hall this morning as a result of the land office scandal created by the removal of Marie L. Ware as United States Commissioner at Eugene. As in the cases previously filed, the defendants named are William A. Peters, M. F. Henderson and P. F. Woodford, who now hold the land which was granted to the so-called non-existent persons, Frank H. Herne and Robert Simpson. The land which it is alleged that the defendants wrongfully hold is situated in township 24, south of range 1 east of the Willamette meridian, in the Roseburg district, and consists of 320 acres. The patents to these lands are asked to be declared null and void.

OPPOSED PETITION TO CLOSE STREET

The petition of the Macleay estate for the vacation of portions of North Eighteenth and Wilson streets will probably meet with some opposition when it comes to be considered in the regular Council proceedings. There is a growing belief in certain quarters that such a step would be harmful to the interests of the community. At present it is said that Sixteenth street is the only thoroughfare in the immediate neighborhood which offers any communication for vehicle traffic with the manufacturing district near by, and that if the desired vacation was made the situation would be deplorable. The street committee has already considered the petition, but took no definite action in the matter. However, those opposed to the scheme are endeavoring to forestall the petition when it comes before the Council as a body.

CHARGE OF ROBBING PHILADELPHIA MINT

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 5.—Robert Kilpatrick, a well-known politician, was arrested today by secret service detectives on a charge of robbing the mint of \$655. Kilpatrick was employed in a responsible position in the mint for seven years and always had a good reputation.

ARE ADDING NEW STALLS

Extensive alterations are being made in the stable at the police station, made necessary by the additional horses now used by the officers recently appointed on the force. The barn has been in bad shape for a long time, and the repairs are badly needed. The enlargement will provide for the accommodation of seven horses. A new floor will be laid and the place generally improved. Several prisoners doing short sentences are assisting the mechanics. While the old stalls were being torn down this morning Driver Price's faithful cat garrotted 27 large rats, some of which gave the feline a desperate struggle before being subdued. Incorporation articles of the Oregon Pacific Navigation Company were filed this afternoon by A. J. Farrington, J. K. Locke and F. H. Skirum. The capital stock of the company is placed at \$25,000, and the object is to operate steamboats on the Willamette and Columbia rivers.

END OF ELECTION IS SIGNALIZED BY QUIET

Pope Will Be Crowned Next Sunday in the Halls of the Vatican—Haste Necessary to Give Authority.

ROME, Aug. 5.—The Holy City has resumed its normal condition after the excitement of the past few days. At 10 this morning the Pope officiated at a grand te deum of the Sistine Chapel. Nearly all the cardinals now in Rome rendered the third adoration to the new Pontiff. The music was of an exceptionally high order, composed for the occasion by Perosi.

The Pope today appointed Laponi as physician to the Vatican.

It was learned today that the final ballot stood 55 for Sarto; four for Rampolla; two for Gotti. Rampolla and Sarto cast the latter.

On the first ballot Saturday last the vote was: Rampolla, 24; Gotti, 17.

Sunday evening saw Rampolla's high water mark, 30 votes. Germans and anti-Rampolla factions then held a consultation and agreed on Sarto.

Monday morning it was: Sarto, 27; Rampolla, 24; others scattering.

Sarto urged his colleagues not to

press his election. The choice is a victory for the triple alliance against France. The Pope speaks German fluently.

It was learned today that the reason for haste in granting the papal blessing yesterday was because the Italian government had sent a special request that such action avoid the collecting of enormous crowds in which there might be loss of life.

The coronation of Pius X will take place on Sunday next according to the decision of the cardinals today. The Pope cannot sign bulls until crowned, so an early date is decided.

The Pope today received an American pilgrimage to Rome led by Father McGowan of New York. This event is regarded as of importance as the American was the first to be admitted to his presence.

The Pope has confirmed Gregoria as camerlango. Agilardi will probably be Secretary of State.

DEATH CAME AS A WEDDING PRESENT

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5.—Within one week of the date upon which he was to marry Miss Hildon, a wealthy and prominent young woman, Harry Vander Straden had his life crushed out beneath the wheels of a freight car.

He was section foreman at Fulton for the California & Northern Railroad, and the first his companions knew of his being in danger they saw him being rolled along beneath some passing cars.

After being taken from beneath the train he, although in great physical pain, directed the men under his charge how to carry out the work they had in charge.

He was badly mangled and one leg had to be amputated. The other leg was in a terrible condition, but his condition was not such that amputation could be resorted to and death resulted.

EXCELLENT REPORT IN GOLD OUTPUT

BAKER CITY, Aug. 5.—The clean-up in gold from the mines of Eastern Oregon for July is equal to the record month of June, 1903. The total amount of gold bullion which passed through Baker City within the past week from the mines in adjacent territory, exceeds in value the sum of \$350,000. This was the amount taken out of the mines during June. The greatest producer during July was the North Pole mine, the output of which for 30 days amounted to \$80,000. The Bonanza and the Columbia are tied for second honors with the sum of \$60,000 each in gold bullion to their credit. Fourth was the Red Boy with an output of \$25,000.

TWO NEGROES MEET WITH BAD ACCIDENT

PENDLETON, Or., Aug. 5.—Two negro tramps met with a horrible accident at Huron 40 miles east of here this morning, while riding under a freight car on an east-bound train. Both men were caught in the couplings and each had both feet mashed to pulp. One foot of each man was amputated at the county hospital today. Other amputations will probably follow.

WILL BE SENT HOME

A sad case came to light in the Police Court today, when the story of Violet Howard was told.

The young woman, whose right name is said to be Violet Stinson, is said to come of a good family at Everett. Coming to Portland she fell into bad company, and was arrested for vagrancy by Patrolman Roberts in a disreputable colored dive at Second and Everett streets. After being locked up she became violently ill and a physician stated that she was dangerously sick with consumption.

The girl's parents were communicated with, and they replied that she would receive a welcome home. Her attorney explained matters to Judge Hogue, whereupon the case was referred to Chief Hunt, and the wayward girl will likely be sent to her folks.

Kittie Jones, a white woman, said to be married to a negro, was arrested in the same place. Patrolman Roberts proved that she had used abusive language toward him, and a fine of \$20 was imposed.

DIAMOND RING MISSING

Detective Joe Day is searching for a beautiful solitaire diamond ring, valued at \$300, which mysteriously disappeared from a residence at 655 Washington street two days ago.

The woman who owned the piece of jewelry took the ring off to wash her hands and laid it upon the stand. Leaving it for a few seconds, she returned to find it missing. A thorough search has been instituted, but no trace of the ring or diamond has been found. The detective is uncertain whether it was lost or stolen, although there is nothing to prove that a thief was present.

A liberal reward has been offered for the return of the ring.

CATHOLIC SOCIETIES

ATLANTIC CITY, Aug. 5.—The American Federation of Catholic Societies selected today Detroit as the next meeting place and elected Thomas Minahan of Columbus, president; John Oelk of Newark, vice-president; F. J. Pierce of San Francisco, second vice-president.

FATAL EXPLOSION

HARTFORD, Ind., Aug. 5.—The Empire nitroglycerine magazine exploded at 1 o'clock this afternoon. Three men were killed. The cause of the explosion is unknown.

JETT AND WHITE MAKING DEFENSE

Judge Hargis Was on the Stand as Witness in Their Behalf Today.

MEN BURNED ALIVE IN NEW YORK FIRE

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Two men were seen to fall into the flames and it is believed that others were burned to death in a fire in the meat storage plant of Schwartzhold & Sulzberger in Brooklyn today. The buildings were being repaired and 10 men were working when the fire was discovered. The fire spread so rapidly that the floors fell remarkably quick. Two men jumped from the second story window and were seriously injured, one, Fred Klossman, fatally.

MILLION DOLLAR COPYRIGHT SUIT

NORTHROP, L. I., Aug. 5.—In the million-dollar copyright suit brought by the West Publishing Company of St. Paul against the Edward Thompson Law Publishing Co., of Northport, the latter won the first victory in the United States Court today by that body refusing a preliminary injunction restraining Thompson from publishing the West works.

FUNDS FOR RELIEF OF THE FILIPINOS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—The \$25,000 left from the Martinique fund, which the President's suggestion was sent for the use of individual cases of distress in the Philippines, will be used principally in emergency cases. Governor Taft, replying to the message sent by Cornelius Bliss, notifying that the money had been sent, thanks the committee in behalf of the Philippine people.

FREEMAN SEEMS TO BE CERTAIN WINNER

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 5.—In the lawn tennis tournament yesterday afternoon there was awakened a great deal of interest by the phenomenal playing of Freeman of Pasadena, Cal., who gives strong promise of carrying off the championship. He beat Beecher of Vancouver, B. C., yesterday, 6-0, 6-1. Today he is pitted against Powell, the crack player of this city. Much disappointment is felt here that Goss of the Portlands, could not attend.

SAN FRANCISCO HAS DISASTROUS FIRE

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5.—Fire this morning destroyed the planing mill, office and yards of the Excelsior Redwood Lumber company at Fourth and Channel streets. The loss was \$150,000, with insurance at \$68,000.

THE CHECK WAS BOGUS

John C. Carroll was arrested by Detectives Kerrigan and Snow this afternoon, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses. The complainant is "Bob" Patterson, upon whom Carroll is said to have passed a bogus check a few days ago. The check was drawn upon an Astoria bank, but it was returned, as Carroll had no account there. The amount of money secured was \$25. Carroll was once arrested by Captain Simmons on suspicion of having stolen a horse and buggy.

AGREEMENT REACHED

(Journal Special Service.)

NIAGARA, Aug. 5.—The joint convention of the Teamsters' National Union and the Teamdrivers' International Union reached an amicable settlement this morning.

ARCHITECT BALLIN ON NEW FIREBOAT

Fred A. Ballin, the naval architect who drew up the plans and specifications for the new fireboat, says:

"I hear a great many of nonsensical arguments being made against the action of the Fire Committee in awarding the contract for the construction of the fireboat to a Seattle firm, instead of to Portland shipbuilders. If the contract had been let to the latter they would have sent East for the engines, and very little of the work would have been done here, because the local shipyards are not properly equipped to do that kind of work. During the past two years there have been a number of propeller boats built at Portland, but the Guy Howard and the Elkkader were the only two that were constructed here throughout, including engines and hulls. The others built during the same period were the Athlon, the Indian Flyer, the Reliance, the Collier, and the Arrow. Their engines were produced in the East. Even the engine for the new Telephone, now under construction, was purchased at Dubuque, Ia. Shipbuilders send out of the city to have their work done, but still they protest if any one else is compelled to follow the same practice."

TO LIGHTER CARGO OF GERMAN VESSEL

Capt. F. Rowhl, master of the German bark Naurechos, which arrived at Astoria a few days ago, with cargo from Hamburg, is in Portland. The vessel is drawing too much water to come up to Portland at present, and the captain says that her cargo will be lightened. He is here for the purpose of making an arrangement of this nature. It is believed that by removing about 400 tons from her hold the ship will be enabled to make the trip up the river without coming in contact with the bottom.

Rowhl says that the passage from Hamburg to the mouth of the Columbia was made in 141 days, severe storms being encountered just prior to entering the English Channel. The vessel drifted around for 26 days before the contrary winds subsided and any headway was made. From that time on good weather was experienced, and the vessel, near Cape Horn, when the elements again interfered and made progress slow. When the Horn was reached the winds again became favorable and a fine run was made up the coast.

The ship's cargo consists of cement, coke and iron to the amount of 4,450 tons, and is consigned to Meyer, Wilson & Co.

Marine Notes.

The Glencairn is expected to complete her lumber cargo at the Inman-Poulson mill about Friday.

All the sailors on the Agnes Oswald have about the month of the Columbia on lumber this morning at the Inman-Poulson mill. She goes to South Africa, and will be given quick dispatch.

The British ship Hlythwood is trimming her ballast, preparatory to shifting from the Columbia dock to the Eastern mill, where she will receive a lumber cargo.

A small amount of ballast is being put in the hold of the Saxon in order to give her the proper equilibrium to carry a lumber cargo, which she will begin receiving in a day or two.

The steamship Homer sailed last night for Free Point, Alaska, with a shipment of lighthouse supplies for the Government.

The gasoline schooner Gerald C. sailed this afternoon for Neastucca Bay with 60 tons of general merchandise. In about a week she will return with a cargo of farm produce.

NEW WEAPONS COMING

United States Regular Army Equipment Soon to Be Used by Oregon National Guard.

Adjutant-General C. U. Gantenbein this morning received word from the War Department at Washington that the following list of arms and accoutrements were ordered for the use of the Oregon National Guard:

Nine hundred and fifty-nine United States magazine rifles, calibre 30, model 1895, with model 1901 sights, complete.

Fifty United States magazine carbines, calibre 30, model 1895, with model 1901 sights, complete.

Nine hundred and fifty-nine bayonet scabbards, calibre 30.

Nine hundred and fifty-nine cartridge belts, calibre 30, infantry.

Nine hundred and fifty-nine gun slings.

Fifty cavalry cartridge belts, calibre 30.

The weapons are expected to reach here the first of next week.

CLEARING THE CITY

The police believe that they have cleared the city of a bad gang of worthless characters who they say are "young men." The quintet was in the Police Court charged with vagrancy. Sentence was continued to permit them to leave the city.

The suspects are R. Winkle, W. L. Stutman, George Wilson, F. Kink and Frank Wilson, one of whom is said to be an ex-convict. Three of the men were arrested on suspicion by Detectives Kerrigan and Snow Sunday, while Mounted Patrolman Mallett arrested Winkle and Stutman. All were found in the North End. Before being charged from the city this afternoon the men were photographed and measured for future police reference.

The detectives state that they suspect these men of some of the recent petty crimes, for whenever they appear in the city numerous small thefts occur.

AFTER A MYSTERY

The police today are trying to unravel a deep, dark mystery which has the scent of gore.

While in the neighborhood of the Sellwood Woolen Mills yesterday morning Ed Albrecht, 721 East Thirteenth street, discovered a woman's undergarment thoroughly saturated with blood. The sight startled the young man and he reported the matter to Patrolman Smith last night. In turn it was reported to Chief Hunt and he is having the matter investigated today.

Mr. Albrecht was of the opinion that the garment might belong to some woman who had been kidnapped or murdered, but the police are not inclined to take much stock in the mystery until they look into the affair.

WANTS HER MIND EASED
