So Says Vice-President McCallum in Speaking of Leather Workers' Unions Throughout the West.

He Has Just Returned from Meeting of Executive Board at Kansas City—Visits Several States.

Telegram to the Local Strikers States that Fight Is Yet on in California and at Other Points.

Men Appear to Have no Fear of Failure and Say that All Reports to the Contrary Are False.

R. H. McCallum, third vice-president of the Leatherworkers' International Union, has returned from Kansas City, where he attended a meeting of the executive board of that organization. He reports that the gathering was very successful in every particular, the various members of the board reporting that the conditions were prevailing in their respective localities. During the past year, he says that the leather workers have gained 6,000 new members.

Each official of the executive board has a certain district which he represents and keeps in close touch with. McCallum's district in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Utah, and California. His headquarters and home are in Portland, but he usually manages to visit each of the other states in his district at least once a year. When a strike occurs he leaves for the scene and superintends it in person. Of late, however, the leather workers have had very few serious labor troubles. Whenever everything is serene and peaceful he obtains work the same as any other member of his craft, and draws the same rate of wages. No strike is put off by the executive board, but when it becomes necessary for him to make an official trip his expenses are paid.

When returning from Kansas City Mr. McCallum visited the more important points in the district, and states that industrial conditions, among the leather workers particularly, were never better. While at Denver, he says, the union agreements secured one of the best in the history of the organization. The employees got better and fuller concessions than they expected. At a later date he expects to visit other sections of his territory that were overlooked on this trip.
