FIERCE STORM VISITS VICINITY OF ST. LOUIS

POWERS FEARS THE DEMOCRATS

Celebrated Case Now on at Georgetown Had New Feature Today When Politics Was Allowed to Enter.

Defense Claimed There Should Be a Few Republicans on the Jury, but the Court Did Not See it that Way.

GEORGETOWN, Ky., Aug. 6.—Pow-ers' attorneys this morning moved to dismiss the entire venire of Bourbon County citizens, called for jury duty, on the ground that of the 95 summoned all but two are Democrats, purposely selected by the deputy sheriff, who refused to call all who were known to be Republicans.

It was held by the attorneys for Powers that Democrats would naturally be prejudiced against the defendant, but the court ruled that if the men were true to their oath as jurors they would not let a matter of politics enter into consideration of the case.

The boy left Portland to spend a short vacation in the country below Kalamia. Yesterday afternoon while picking berries near a logging camp he was caught by a locomotive and crushed under the cruel wheels.

The young patient was brought to Portland with all possible speed, arriving here at 9:40 o'clock last night. He was removed to the hospital where, after an examination, Dr. Hollister concluded that the injuries were necessarily fatal.
