E. F. W. Fratte, foreman of the Hand Manufacturing Company, received a telegram yesterday stating that his son, Charles, had been killed in a train wreck at Foxcroft, Me. No particulars were given. The deceased was a conductor, and but 22 years of age.

Funeral services for John Gnos, who committed suicide in the sight of his daughter at Bellwood Friday, were held at Finley's undertaking-rooms yesterday. The Gruettl Verein Swiss society, of which deceased was a member, had charge of the funeral. Interment was at Lone Fir Cemetery.

A bicycle stolen from Mr. Anderson at Russell street and Albina avenue Friday night, has been recovered by the police. A policeman saw the wheel in the possession of Martin Tollefson of No. 518 Albina avenue, who was able to prove to policeman's satisfaction that he had purchased it innocently.

A temporary injunction was granted by Circuit Judge Cleland this morning in the case of Phil Berdruff against E. W. Bell restraining the defendant from disposing of the Popular Restaurant, No. 133 1/2 Fourth street, in which the plaintiff claims a one-third interest. The hearing of a motion for the appointment of a receiver for the establishment will be held at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. This suit was begun some time ago. The plaintiff alleges that he entered into a partnership with Bell, the shafts and wheels denied any interest in the restaurant.

DRIVER DOOLEY INJURED

Truck No. 1 Collides With Telegraph Pole While Responding to an Alarm Yesterday.

W. W. Dooley, driver of Truck No. 1 of the Portland Fire Department, is temporarily off duty, suffering with a lame shoulder and other injuries received by him in an accident at 1:30 o'clock Sunday morning. The truck was turning the corner at Morrison and Third streets in answering an alarm from Twelfth and Morrison streets, when one of the lines became unsnapped and the horses slipped, causing the truck to collide with a telegraph pole. The pole crashed between the horses' heads, the shafts and struck the truck with great force. Dooley was thrown to the walk. While his injuries are painful, none are serious. The fire was a small blaze at the residence of J. P. Blair, 171 Eleventh street.

CRIMINALS ARRAIGNED

John C. Fabricius, accused of the larceny of \$5 worth of property from the First German Evangelical Church, and Martin Allen, charged with having robbed J. W. Putney of 35 cents at the point of a shotgun, were both arraigned before Circuit Judge Cleland this morning and entered pleas of not guilty. The trial of the former was not set, but that of the latter was set for September 18.

HUME WILL NOW TEST THE LAW

Constitutionality of Sailors' Boarding-House Statute to Be Passed on by Supreme Court.

Notice of Appeal from Decision on Injunction Was Filed This Morning—Smith and White Doing Business.

The first attempt to test the constitutionality of the law creating the State Board of Sailor Boarding-House Commissioners was made this morning, when Wilson T. Hume, an attorney for Harry White and William Smith, filed notice of appeal on error from the decision of the State Circuit Court, denying his clients an injunction against the commissioners.

The case was first tried before the Circuit Court, upon a petition for a writ of mandamus, which was granted by Judges Cleland and George, Judge Sears dissenting. A stay of execution was granted, however, pending an appeal of the mandamus proceedings to the Supreme Court. This meant that Smith and White, as keepers of a sailors' boarding-house, could not obtain a license from the commissioners until the Supreme Court had passed upon the matter, and before that time the shipping season would be at an end. Their attorney advised them to keep their house open and continue in business, and he began the appeal proceedings this morning. This will be the first attempt to test the constitutionality of the law, as in the mandamus case the Circuit Court ignored the question.

As the matter now stands, Mr. Hume has carried the question up to the highest tribunal on an appeal from the Circuit Court as regards the injunction. Attorney Henry E. McGinn, for the commissioners, has already taken an appeal from the decision on the writ of mandamus, so the whole matter will be argued in the Supreme Court.

"Will your clients remain in business during the pendency of the proceedings?" was asked Mr. Hume this morning.

"They are open and doing business," replied the attorney with a smile.

Under the stay of execution granted under the mandamus proceedings, Smith and White were supposed to be out of business until the Supreme Court gave its decision.

A NOTED SCULPTOR WILL RESIDE HERE

B. J. Barrett Comes from San Francisco to Reside in Portland.

A sculptor of note, B. J. Barrett, recently from San Francisco, will make Portland his home in the future. Mr. Barrett has been in this city for several weeks past, arranging to establish himself here and says that the conditions and surroundings are most congenial.

Several specimens of Mr. Barrett's work have lately attracted considerable attention, displayed in the plate glass show windows of one of Portland's large department stores. One particular work was a portrait bust of the deceased Pope Leo XIII, which is said to be a remarkably clever likeness.

The fountain in the famous public gardens of Hong Kong was designed and worked out by Mr. Barrett for the British government, as was also a life-sized statue of Lord St. Germain, in the Cathedral at Cornwall, England; the entrance and gate for the Mount Olivet Cemetery at San Francisco, and the altar in Poney, India, which cost \$75,000. In competition for the Spanish Armada memorial design, the anniversary of which event was recently held in Plymouth, England. Mr. Barrett took second prize.

DIDN'T WANT THEIR SAFE SPOILED

Defiance Tea Company Left It Open and Cracksmen Secured Between \$150 and \$200 Without Trouble.

It Is Believed that Robbery Occurred in Broad Daylight Yesterday Morning—Meager Clues for Police.

Because a visit by cracksmen was anticipated, W. C. and C. H. Brettell, proprietors of the Defiance Tea Company, Second and Ankeny streets, have been in the habit of leaving the outer doors of their safe unlocked. They didn't want the safe wrecked by nitroglycerine. This fact alone probably obviated the necessity of their purchasing a new strong box, for robbers visited their place of business yesterday.

This robbery is the most daring which has occurred in the city for some time. From all indications it was the work of experts. They did not resort to the use of explosives because they had no difficulty in opening the doors. From the inner drawer of the safe between \$150 and \$200 in money was taken.

Probably Mobbed in Daylight. The time of the robbery is unknown, but it is believed that it was after 9 o'clock yesterday morning, at which time the special officers leave, their beats. The first known of the theft was at noon, when W. C. Brettell visited the store and found the money gone.

The rear door he found unlocked and slightly ajar. The front door was locked. It is thought that the front lock was picked with a skeleton key. Entering the office the burglars drew the curtain over the front window so as to conceal their movements from the street.

The outer doors of the safe were for the combination, which was never set. Then with a hammer or a wrench the knobs of the inner door were knocked off and the cracksmen used a pencil, which they found in the office, to push back the steel catches. Then there was no trouble in opening the doors and taking the money. The checks and valuable papers in the safe were untouched. This adds strength to the theory that experts did the job.

As soon as the matter was reported to the police Detectives Kerrigan and Snow were assigned to the case. No tools of any kind, except a skeleton key, were left behind. A survey of the premises shows that the men left by the rear door.

Another Attempted Burglary. An apparent attempt at burglary was discovered about 12:30 o'clock yesterday morning by Patrolman Robson, who found the front door of an empty store building, adjoining the feed store of Cruickshank & Mackie, 294 Grand avenue, pushed in. The officer made an investigation and found that from the vacant room thieves could easily go into the feed store. Nothing was missing and evidently the thieves were frightened away.

WISHES TO SEE HIS OWN CHILD

Edward G. Granville of Colorado Gets Out Injunction Against Temporary Guardian of His Daughter.

He Alleges Attempt May Be Made to Spirit the Little One Away and Wishes to Frustrate Such Act.

Although the father of the child, Edward G. Granville, of El Paso county, Colo., alleges that he cannot see 5-year-old Dorothy Granville unless aid is given him by the court. The little girl is at present in the custody of her grandmother, Rebecca J. Lofgren, near Judge George on Saturday. No public announcement of the case was made until this morning.

In his petition Granville says that his wife, Minnie M. Granville, secured a divorce from him in El Paso county, Colo., on November 18, 1901, and the court awarded the custody of their five-year-old child, Dorothy, to the mother, but allowed him the privilege of visiting his daughter.

It is alleged that the mother deserted the child and went to New York. The little one was left in the custody of the grandmother, an unfit person, and permission to visit her had been refused her father. It is further charged threats to spirit the child away had been made by the grandmother, and the father, who declares he is well able to provide for his daughter, asks that an attempt to take the child out of the state be restrained.

A temporary injunction was granted late Saturday afternoon, and the matter will probably be brought up in court in a day or two. Nothing is known of Granville further than that he is a merchant of El Paso county, Colo. He is now in Portland, but declines to discuss his suit. His attorneys, Bronaugh & Bronaugh, are equally as non-committal. It is claimed that his former wife is in California instead of New York and that both the grandmother and the child are in or near Portland.
