BOGUS OFFICERS BLUFF AND ROB

Myrtle Collins Accosted by a Stranger Who Pretends to Be "Joe" Day and Threatens Her with Imprisonment.

Girl Is Held Prisoner for Half an Hour While Her Captors Steal Ring and Search Her Clothes for Money.

In the clutches of two men, who pretended to be detectives, Myrtle Collins was robbed and kept a prisoner for half an hour last night.
Miss Collins is young and recently came to Portland from Pendleton, Or. About 10:30 o'clock last night she was walking along First street, near Alder, on her way home to her room in a lodging-house near Fourth and Alder streets. She was accosted by a well-dressed young man, who said:
"I am Detective Joe Day," he said, in a gruff voice, "and I am going to arrest you for being out late."
Miss Collins protested that she was on her way home.
"Well, come up to my office. I do all my business there," replied the stranger.

Greatly frightened and convinced that he was a detective, the young woman accompanied the stranger to a room near First and Alder streets. In the apartment was another man, who also pretended to be a detective.
Taking the woman's hand, the first "detective" examined a gold ring on one of her fingers, asking her where she got it. She explained, whereupon the man tore it from her finger and put it in his pocket. Both men searched her clothes for money, but found none. Then they threatened her with arrest, and whenever she protested they said they would take her right down to the police station. Miss Collins attempted to scream for help, but they smothered her cries.
After keeping her prisoner for half an hour, they permitted her to go, telling her she was at liberty.

"I honestly believe that they would have killed me for my money if I had had any with me," said Miss Collins in telling the story to the police last night. She says she has learned that another woman was treated in the same manner recently and robbed of \$10.

CENTRAL OREGON IS STILL WONDERING

No Definite Action Has Yet Been Taken Regarding Harriman Railroad.

Matters pertaining to the penetration of Central Oregon with an extension of the Columbia Southern under the control or ownership of the O. R. & N., or the construction of another road south from some point near The Dalles, have not been affected by anything that has occurred during the past few weeks. Proposals for the sale of the road have been made by the Columbia Southern president, E. E. Lytle, and have been taken under consideration by the head of the Harriman system, E. H. Harriman, being transmitted to him from President A. L. Mohler of the O. R. & N. No action has yet been taken. President Mohler makes a journey to New York every fall to take up items of policy and matters of paramount importance. Probably President Mohler will be in conference with Mr. Harriman upon the subject of the Central Oregon proposed road when the former goes to New York in a few weeks. Prior to that time action of a final character may not be looked for.

FUNERAL OF MRS. ALBRIGHT

The funeral of Mrs. Jennie Albright, who died at 8 o'clock Tuesday evening, was held from the Evangelical Church in Upper Albina this afternoon. Mrs. Albright was the wife of G. A. Albright, 301 Bellwood street, and was 28 years of age. She had been afflicted with drowsy and heart disease for three months. Mrs. Albright was a native Oregonian.

SYDNEY, Aug. 13.—The most unusual scene was enacted here this morning when the State Parliament N. S. W. opened with its usual flourish of trumpets.
If the preliminary sitting is any criterion the session will be an extremely lively one.
Such expressions as "get back into your hole," "rats," "blackguard," "break his neck" were heard on every side, culminating when Norton, from Northumberland struck Broughton, a member of the King's Division, in the face with several well-directed blows.
Wild excitement followed and it was not until the session broke up in a general fight was the hall cleared.

WOMAN OARSMAN OF GREAT MERIT

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 13.—Thillie Ashley, who in private life is Mrs. Edward N. Atherton, of Hartford, Conn., arrived here today to try conclusions with the champion oarswoman of the world and make a mile and a half in 12:30. Her husband was many years a champion oarsman, runner and skater, but has been out of sporting life for some time. Miss Ashley has a daughter, 17 years old, who also promises to be good with the oars.
When interviewed today, she said: "Yes, I row some, and have been doing so for years, and am now out for money or fun. I hope to make a match with a woman oarsman, but, if not able to, I will try a man, if given a handicap."

JETT-WHITE CASE WITH THE JURORS

CYNTHIANA, Ky., Aug. 13.—The Jett and White case was given to the jury at 11 o'clock this morning after a trial seen in the United States. The arguments were sensational in the extreme but there is no way in which to forecast the result of the jury's deliberations. Attorneys for either side appear confident of winning the legal battle which has all along been sharp.

FIVE ARE KILLED BY AN EARTHQUAKE

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 13.—Five people were killed and the splendid Church of San Francisco was destroyed by an earthquake which this morning in the town of Mendoza. Many other buildings were seriously damaged and hundreds of people were injured. The shock lasted only a brief interval.

POPE LEO HAD A HORDE OF MONEY

LONDON, Aug. 13.—The Central News publishes a Rome dispatch this afternoon that Cardinals Rampolla and Mocceni, the executors of the estate of the late Pope Leo, opened the private apartments of the late Pontiff today and found in addition to many valuable articles, several million francs in money.
Pope Leo is well today, and took a long walk in the vatican gardens. He later received the Austrian Ambassador.

POOR WOMAN GETS WORST OF IT ALL

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 13.—Captain John Pederson left for parts unknown several months ago and when his wife returned from Norway where she had been on a visit she learned her husband had induced Mamie Forsett to marry him, saying that the absent woman was not married to him but only his mistress. The court decided today that the Norway wife is legal. This leaves Mamie Forsett with a small child on her hands without a legitimate father.

RATES FOR THE FAIR

Conference of O. R. & N. Officials to Discuss Special Railway Fares During the Exposition.
A conference to agree upon sale days and rates over the railroads to the Lewis and Clark Centennial, is expected to take place in Portland sometime tomorrow between the local heads of the traffic departments of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company, the Southern Pacific and the Northern Pacific. The visit of Charles S. Fee, general ticket and passenger agent for the Northern Pacific, who will arrive in Portland this evening, is said to be for the purpose of attending the meeting. A. L. Craig, general passenger agent for the O. R. & N., will return this afternoon from Meacham Springs.

CHANGES AT SALEM STATE PENITENTIARY

SALEM, Or., Aug. 13.—Edward A. McPherson and Chapel Guard Jdy J. McCormick of the penitentiary have resigned and leave the prison tonight. It is believed that Deputy Warden Smith will succeed McPherson. Both men have contemplated this step for some time. McPherson will return to Portland.

KING ALFONSO IS IN POOR HEALTH

MADRID, Aug. 13.—There is a persistent rumor that the condition of King Alfonso's health is grave. His physicians, owing to the rapid progress of consumption, have ordered him to stop bathing and horseback riding.

TWO SMALL ROBBERIES

Boy burglars were at work Tuesday night on the East Side, but their plunder was only a few boxes of cigars and a small amount of change. M. Moulder's tobacco store at Union avenue and East Burnside street was visited, the front and side doors being pried open. The stock was scattered over the floor, but only one box of cigars was missing. From the register and a slot machine about \$5 in small change was obtained.
The second burglary was at the store of Wren & Faust, grocers, Powell and East Twenty-sixth streets, and is thought to have been done by a gang of boys who hang around the neighborhood. They entered by a rear window. One box of cigars was taken here also.

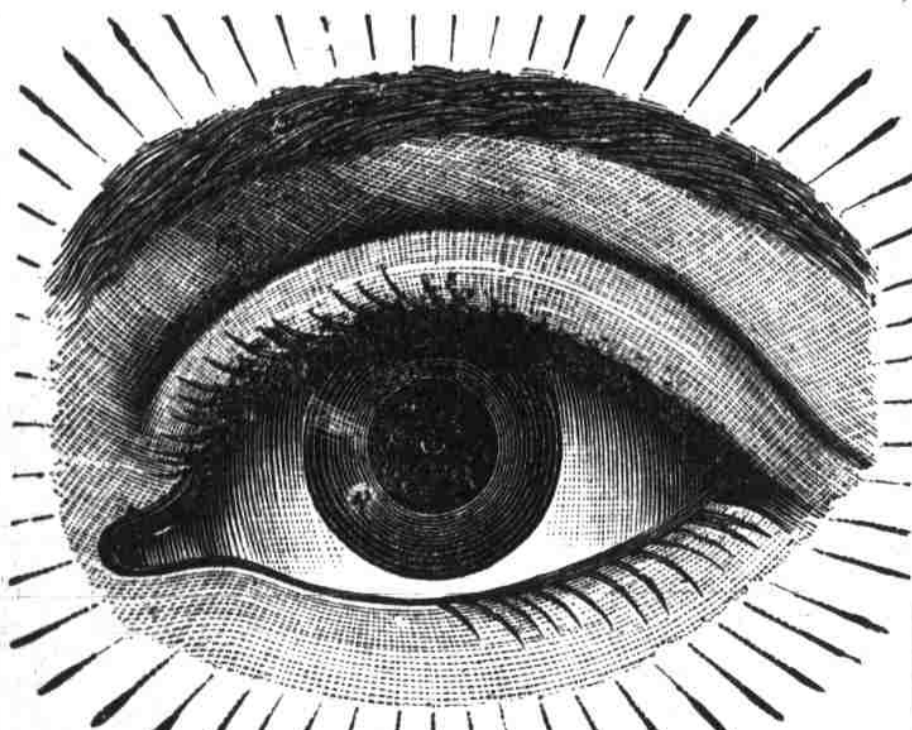
