

CHILD DIES BUT REVISITS EARTH

Psycic Phenomena Which Is Puzzling Some of the Best People in Stockton, Cal.

(Journal Special Service.) STOCKTON, Cal., Aug. 14.—All Stockton is talking over the psychic phenomena surrounding the death of Walter Smith, son of J. Walter Smith, a prominent citizen of this city. The boy apparently died, and the body was laid out and preparation was begun for the funeral. Suddenly the supposed dead boy opened his eyes and began to talk and said he had been dead and had visited heaven, but had to come back when he heard his grief-stricken parents calling him.

A WIFE REFUSES TO AID SICK HUSBAND

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14.—Capt. Harry E. Smith, aged 33 years, and a graduate of West Point, retired from the U. S. army on account of ill-health because of service in the Philippines, committed suicide by the carbolic acid route at a cheap hotel here Tuesday night. His body was found last evening.

MATTERS OF MONEY BEFORE PRESIDENT

TO ARREST JOINT PROPRIETORS TOO

While the case of G. Frey, accused of smoking opium, was being heard, Judge Hogue interrogated Chief Hunt regarding the practice of when frequenting the Chinese join. The court wanted to know why the proprietors of these places were not brought into court as well as the patrons.

Chief Hunt tried to make light of the matter by saying that the practice was not so common as before he assumed office. However, Judge Hogue was of the opinion that the Chinese should also suffer, and in the future the proprietors will be arrested as well as those in the joints.

G. Frey, a young man of good family, but who has become addicted to the deadly habit of smoking opium, will spend 90 days in the County Jail, in the hope that the confinement will break him of a desire for the pipe which induces pleasant dreams.

Frey was arrested after yesterday morning in a Chinese den at 185 Second street. Patrolmen Hensworth and Hogeboom raided the resort and found three white men smoking. With Frey were J. McGrath and Fred Arnold. They entered pleas of guilty and were each fined \$20.

When he faced the court Frey's appearance plainly showed the effects of the deadly drug. He had the pallor, the dreamy eyes and far-away expression common to "dope fiends." Friends of the young man had spoken to the court, asking if he could not be weaned from his old habit. The jail sentence was imposed for the prisoner's own good.

DELEGATES TO BE ENTERTAINED HERE

President J. K. Kirby of the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress, which will be in convention at Seattle from August 18 to 21 inclusive, will arrive in Portland Sunday evening at 7:30 o'clock in charge of the Texas and Louisiana delegations, and will be entertained at the Portland Hotel by a committee of representative citizens. The party will leave at 11:45 p. m. for the city of Seattle.

The Portland delegates to the congress yesterday afternoon it was decided to entertain President Kirby and his party during their short stay in Portland and the following committee was appointed to have charge of the reception: A. H. Fevers, J. Thorburn Ross, F. B. Porter, R. L. Darrow and A. King Wilson.

Mr. Devers was selected as permanent chairman of the local delegates and Max M. Shillock and M. Mosessohn were chosen as secretaries. It was decided that the Portland delegation should leave for Seattle Monday night in a body.

It was voted the sense of the body that Portland favors a national appropriation of \$1,000,000 for the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition and a committee was appointed to draw up a resolution to be presented at the Congress, stating Oregon's desire.

Yesterday's meeting was very enthusiastic and was attended by 22 delegates. In the neighborhood of 40 are expected to attend the Seattle meeting. Secretary Shillock was instructed to secure hand-painted badges for the delegates, advertising Oregon and the Fair. Each delegate will supply himself with literature pertaining to Portland, the state and the coming Exposition.

PHILIPPINE ORDERS

ROME, Aug. 14.—Rev. Father Hendricks, recently appointed Bishop of Cebu, Philippine Islands, had a long conference with the Pope, after which he visited Cardinals Gibbons and Sattoli. He was previously securing final instructions on Philippine matters.

DEBTS SWAMP VON EGLOFFSTEIN

Major in the State Guard Files a Petition in Bankruptcy—Liabilities \$1,400, Assets \$400.

His Action Precipitated by a Doctor's Suit on Which His Uniform Was Attached—Moved in Good Society.

Pressure on the part of his creditors for the payment of debts, caused Major G. C. Von Egloffstein, once an instructor in the Hill Military Academy, and a prominent member of the Oregon National Guard, to file a petition in bankruptcy in the United States District Court this afternoon. The petition, which was prepared by Attorney Charles J. Schnabel, states that the liabilities of Major Von Egloffstein reach \$1,400, while his assets amount to less than \$400.

Under the state law all the assets, which consist of personal property, are exempt. The liabilities consist of promissory notes and accounts due for merchandise. The notes were given to other officers of the regiment, and none of them has been redeemed.

In one instance suit has been begun to collect. The plaintiff is Capt. Robert J. Marsh, a member of the regimental medical department. Marsh sued the Major for \$140, and it is understood that this single debt forced the battalion officer to appear to the court. In this suit all the uniforms of the Major were attached.

Under the state law the Major's attached apparel is exempt, and Attorney Charles J. Schnabel, representing the Major, will demand the return of the military apparel and accoutrements seized.

The lawyer points to the statutes for proof of the exemption of the military man's equipment as a member of the National Guard. Section 3197 says that the uniform, equipment and horse used in the service by each officer and soldier of the National Guard shall be exempt from all suits, distresses, executions or sales for debt, or for the payment of taxes.

Section 3281 of chapter 2 provides: "Every male white citizen above the age of 16 years is entitled to have for his own use and defense the following firearms, either or any of the following named guns: One revolving pistol, rifle, shotgun, single or double-barrel, yager or musket. The same shall be exempt from execution in all cases under the laws of Oregon."

The section following says that no civil or military officer shall demand or take firearms, except where the service is required to keep peace.

Upon these laws the attorney expects that the equipment of the Major will be returned to his owner.

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POLICE BLOCK DIAVALO'S PLAN

Forbid Miss Schaar to Loop the Loop on the Cyclist's Shoulders—Disappointed Spectators Howl "Fake."

Chief Hunt Takes Responsibility for Preventing Exhibition, Though It Has Been Tried Successfully in Private.

Diavolo looped the loop at Multnomah Field last night, but because the authorities interfered Miss Clara Schaar did not ride astride his shoulders as was advertised. Hundreds of the spectators hissed the police and howled "fake."

But the police had given their orders. Diavolo could loop the loop if he wanted to—and he did—but the Chief of Police, backed up by District Attorney Manning, said he could carry no one with him in his perilous ride.

When manager Kilpatrick attempted to explain hoodlums jeered and howled until his voice could not be heard. Having paid their money to see something out of the ordinary, and having the in-born American feeling of fair-play, which believes that those who want to kill themselves for the amusement of the public should be allowed to do so, the people went away disappointed.

Fully 4,000 assembled to witness the daring feat, and when Diavolo made the round, in place of the cheers and hand-clapping which heretofore have greeted his accomplishment of the difficult feat in Portland, only cat-calls and derisive cries were heard.

She Has Made the Ride. Miss Schaar has several times made the ride with Diavolo in private, preparing for her initial appearance before the public which was to have occurred last night.

There was a strong feeling manifest, as the crowd filed through the gates after the conclusion of the performance, to criticize Manager Kilpatrick and accuse him of having deliberately planned to balk the people. "The girl never intended to make the ride!" "It was all a put up job!" "I knew she wouldn't do it!" and many similar remarks were heard.

Chief Hunt Responsible. Chief of Police Hunt today assumed all responsibility for preventing the exhibition.

"I was not influenced by outside suggestion or statements," he said, "but acted wholly upon what I consider to be the lines of duty and to prevent the possibility of accident."

The Chief says his prohibition of such exhibitions is general and lasting and that no exceptions will be made. The officers who entered the grounds last night and notified Kilpatrick that Miss Schaar would not be permitted to place her life in jeopardy, were armed with the following order signed by the Chief:

"PORTLAND, Aug. 13.—Mr. Charles G. Kilpatrick, Manager Loop the Loop Company, Multnomah Field, City.—Dear Sir: I see by the local newspapers that one of your performers, Diavolo by name, proposes to carry a girl with him tonight in his ride through the loop. In view of the fact that this act is dangerous beyond reason, I hereby order that the said feat be not performed in this city. Yours truly,

"CHARLES H. HUNT, Chief of Police."

WOODMEN WILL GET TOGETHER TONIGHT

All the Woodmen of the World lodges in the vicinity of Portland will meet in union session with Webfoot Camp this evening to discuss the recent troubles among members of the order over the division of central receipts.

The members of the Board of Directors of the Woodmen Amusement Association, which was organized to give and manage the carnival, are to be present and will undoubtedly be asked to make a statement concerning the financial aspect.

Unless some arrangement is made to satisfy the claims of the members of Sunnyside Lodge, for what they allege is their just share of the receipts of the carnival, a suit will be commenced in the courts and the papers will be filed tomorrow morning.

This action was only prevented earlier in the week by the influence of those members who wished to avoid any such unwelcome publicity. Attorney Joseph had the papers drawn up as early as Wednesday, but at a joint conference with the legal representative of the Amusement Association, it was decided to postpone action until after the union meeting tonight.

Some question is aroused as to whether Sunnyside camp can legally sue the head camps, as it is only a subordinate camp, and has no charter of its own.

In the meantime the different parties are airing their side of the controversy and the lodge members in general are eagerly awaiting developments from the meeting tonight.

TO DREDGE AT VANCOUVER

Residents of Vancouver, Wash., want a deeper and better harbor and they intend to have it. A representative from Vancouver is in Portland today perfecting arrangements to secure the North Pacific dredger with which to make the proper improvements.

The water at that place is shallow at the docks, and it is estimated that a cut 500 feet in length will have to be made in order to open up a channel that will meet with the present shipping requirements.

The ship Two Brothers, which just completed loading a cargo of lumber there, is reported to be touching bottom, and it is considered dangerous to move her. She will probably have to be lightered before she can get away.

GENERAL MILES SPEAKS

D. MCCOY CANNOT NOW BE LOCATED

Friends of D. McCoy, who for the past three or four months has been rooming at No. 12 North Sixth street, at the house of N. J. Johnson, an ex-policeman, are worried over his continued absence. About a week ago the man complained of feeling indisposed. He went out one day and did not return. His belongings were left in his room, for which he had paid in advance. He has not since been seen by his friends or landlord, who are at a loss to account for his disappearance.

Mr. Johnson thought his boarder might have gone to the hospital, but inquiry failed to reveal his whereabouts. The police will be asked to watch for the missing man. There is no known reason for his absence, and he appeared to be well off financially and was not of a dependent nature. He is about 35 years of age.

PACIFIC WEATHER

The forecast of wind and weather in the North Pacific Ocean for September, which has just been issued, shows an area of high barometer central in latitude 40 and 45 degrees north, longitude 140 and 150 degrees west. In Honolulu the average prevalence of the trade winds during September is 26 days. Tolerable calm, extending over several days in succession, will occur. On the Pacific Coast the prevailing direction of the wind, north of 45 degrees, will be northwest. They will rarely attain force. Temporary areas of alternately high and low barometer, with attendant anti-cyclonic and cyclonic circulations, will be found moving in a general easterly direction across the ocean in temperate latitudes. Several typhoons may be expected in the South seas.

AMERICAN FLEET

(Journal Special Service.) STONY BROOK, N. Y., Aug. 14.—A portion of the fleet under Admiral Walker is anchored here today. The Admiral expects to steam up the bay Sunday afternoon, where he will be joined by vessels in Frenchman's Bay and these will be reviewed by the President at 11 o'clock Monday morning, after which the fleet will go to Pensacola Bay and prepare for the maneuvers there, which will last from August 28 to 29.
