Robert Christensen, a 15-year-old boy living at Willamette station, was arrested by the Police Court yesterday morning charged with the larceny of five chicken chickens from Farmer Brown.

The arrest was made by Constable D. Malcolm, who maintains law and order at Willamette. The officer told the court how, with intuitive shrewdness, he had traced the fowls to the Christensen boy, who had them hidden in a vacant lot. He said the lad was unruly and needed judicial attention. The case was continued for sentence.

The climax came, however, when Constable Malcolm tried to collect his fees as a witness. When told that the complainant was not entitled to any money he was much disgusted.

"By gum, I'll never make another arrest again," he muttered, as he tramped out of the court room.

OLD MAN SLASHES THROAT ON STREET

Solomon Baker, Residence Unknown, Attempts Suicide with a Penknife.

With his throat well bandaged and in such an injured condition he cannot talk, Solomon Baker is a patient at St. Vincent's Hospital. He attempted to commit suicide by severing his windpipe yesterday afternoon.

While walking on the street at First and Flanders the would-be suicide, who is a middle-aged man, stopped and began slashing his throat with a sharp penknife. While the gash extended from ear to ear it was not sufficiently deep to sever the windpipe. However, the wound is dangerous and at the hospital the attendants would make no prediction as to the outcome.

The man's actions on the street soon attracted a crowd and Patrolmen Roberts, Price and Vaughn took care of him. He was resting comparatively easy at the hospital today.

Nothing is known as to Baker's home or the reason prompting him to try to end his life. He would not tell who his relatives were. He had some coin and a check for \$150 on his person.

NEGRO CHURCH AGAINST MOBS

Resolutions of Protest Against Lynching in the South May Be Passed by the African Methodists.

Rev. George W. Tolson of This City Is Member of Committee to Act at Coming Spokane Conference.

While the presiding bishop, Rev. C. T. Shaffer may not entertain the motion, it is almost certain that some sort of a protest against lynch law and mob rule in the South will be presented at the annual conference of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, which will be held in Spokane on August 19.

The "State of the Country" committee from which such a protest would emanate is composed of the Rev. George W. Tolson, pastor of Bethel Church of this city, and Rev. S. S. Freeman of Seattle, Wash. Both will attend the coming meeting. Mr. Freeman is known to have a very decided opinion that mob rule should be stopped, and the colored people of Portland think that Mr. Tolson will agree with him. It is considered probable that the latter will prepare a resolution asking for intervention by the National Government to protect prisoners from mob violence and uphold the majesty of the law, but this Mr. Tolson denies.

"I do not know whether such a resolution will even be adopted," he said this morning. "I believe there is a general sentiment among our people, just as there is among white people, against mob rule, but whether our church will protest or not I cannot tell. The question is still in the air. I brought up, but for all I know the bishop may look upon it as a political matter and rule it out. If he should hold that it is a matter that directly concerns the state of the country there will be a discussion and it is possible that a resolution or a protest against mob rule will be presented."

Rev. Mr. Tolson will deliver the annual sermon at the conference, but he says that in it he has not decided to make any reference to mob rule. Rev. Mr. Tolson will represent the African Methodist Church of Portland at the conference, which is to assemble in Bethel Church of Spokane on August 19. Among those expected to attend are: Bishop C. G. Shaffer and wife of Kansas City, Mo.; Rev. G. A. Bailey, Everett; Rev. S. F. Freeman of Seattle; Rev. J. W. Tolson of Roslyn, Wash.; Rev. N. D. Hartfield of Franklin, Wash.; and Miss Marie Carter of New Orleans, a lecturer for the Quarterly Review, one of the publications of the church.

CORVALLIS ROAD MOST IMPORTANT

Thomas Leese, a Banker of Central Oregon, Says This Line Would Greatly Benefit Entire State.

The Columbia Southern Should Also Be Extended as There Is Business Enough for Both Railroads.

"Of vastly more importance to the people of Oregon than the building of the Columbia Southern southward would be the extension of the Corvallis & Eastern Railway across the state," was the emphatic statement made by Banker Thomas Leese of Corvallis, who was at the Imperial Hotel last evening.

Mr. Leese's contention is that more timber is available on the line of the Corvallis & Eastern than that of the Columbia Southern. Then, too, he holds that the construction of a road across the state to connect with the Oregon Short Line would give a much better outlet toward the East, and shorten the haul between 200 and 300 miles.

"It would not be a bad idea," remarked Mr. Leese, "to also extend the Columbia Southern from Shaniko. Neither road would interfere with the other, as each would tap a different territory. As both lines are a part of the Harriman system, I believe it would be greatly to the advantage of the railroad powers to extend both."

Mr. Leese is connected with banking concerns at Corvallis and Toledo, and as one who is well acquainted with the financial condition of the country, he says that an era of prosperity is upon the people of that section.

"The hop crop is going to be very good," he said, "and so is the oat and apple yield. Wheat in places will be light but I know of several fields that produced 20 bushels to the acre. This is a very good yield, for our country is not a wheat-growing section."

The apples and other fruits appear to be exceptionally free from worms and other pests. A few apples are falling off, but just enough to properly thin out the crop, and all we have to fear now is bad weather. This I think we will not have."

"I was talking the other day with a woman, a prominent hopgrower, who told me that her yards were almost free from lice. She has 18 acres in hops and last year failed 34,000 pounds. She expects to produce even more this season."

Mr. Leese says that the price outlook for both grain and hops is very promising, and on every side he hears expressions of contentment.
