PORTLAND PEOPLE OFF TO REGATTA

With Old Glory flying from her mast and Brown's Band playing on the upper deck the steamer T. J. Potter pulled out from the Ash street dock at 8:15 o'clock this morning, bound for Astoria, where the annual regatta will open.

The steamer was crowded with people, almost every available spot being occupied. It is estimated that between 600 and 700 people were aboard, perhaps the largest crowd that ever made a trip to the mouth of the river on a steamboat.

Long before the hour of sailing the dock was filled with a happy throng, and when the whistle blew a few minutes before its departure the wharf was filled to its full extent with hundreds of spectators who had gathered to bid friends goodbye. They did it in royal fashion, cheering and waving handkerchiefs until the vessel had vanished from view.

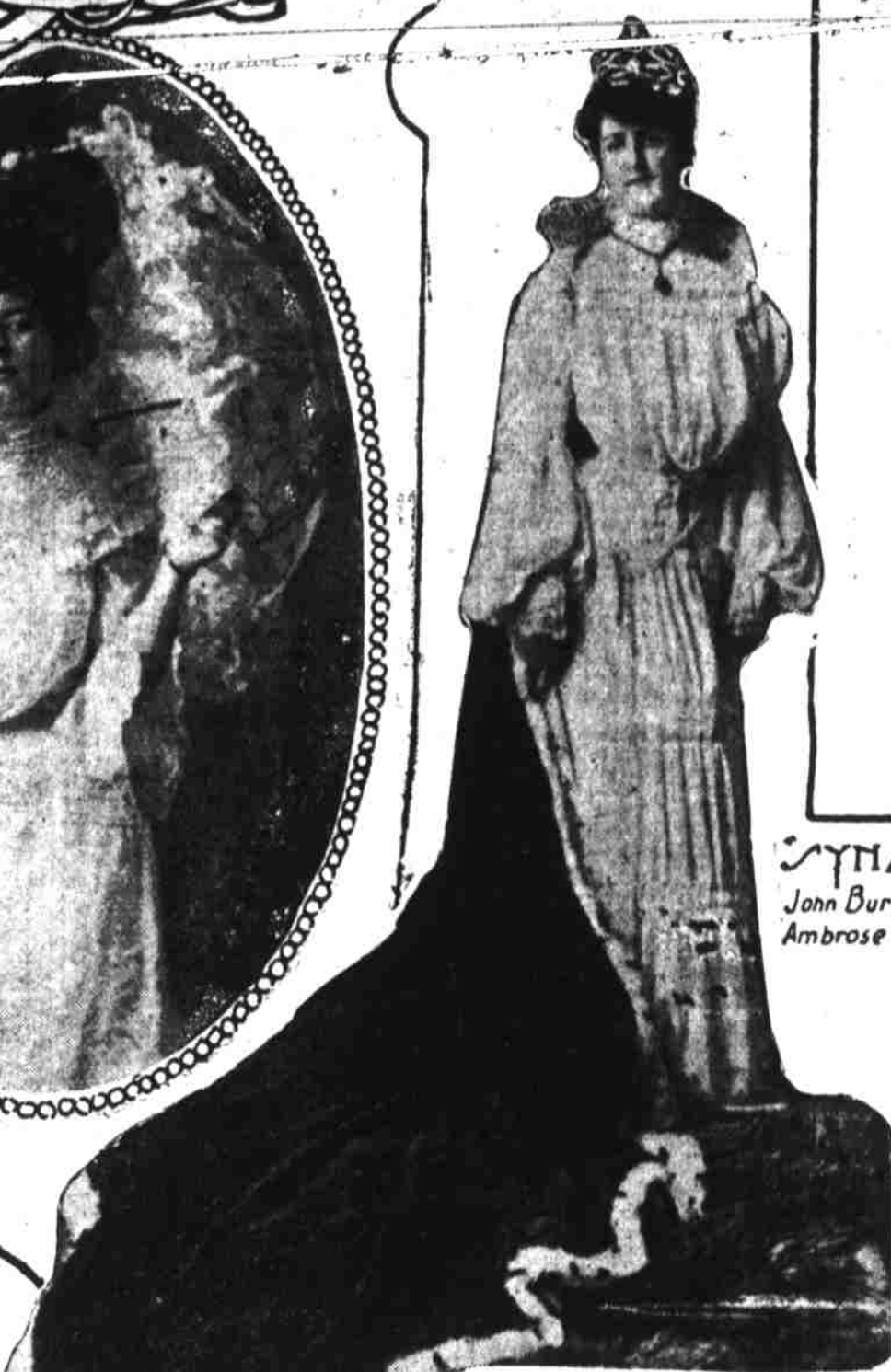

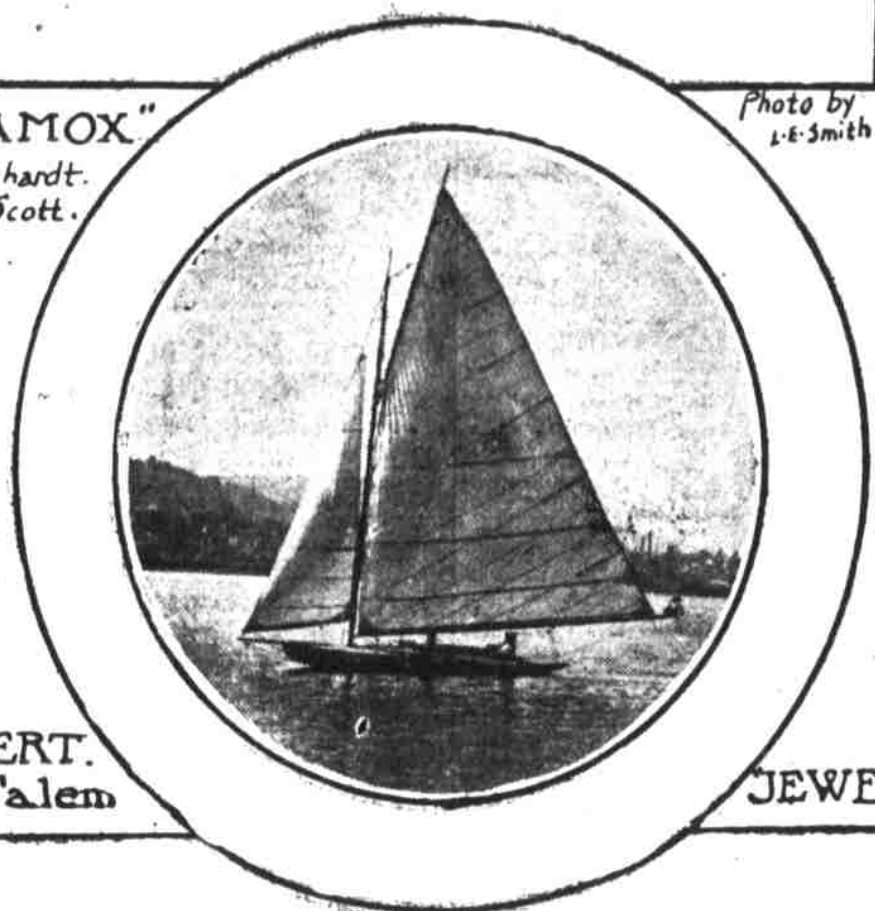

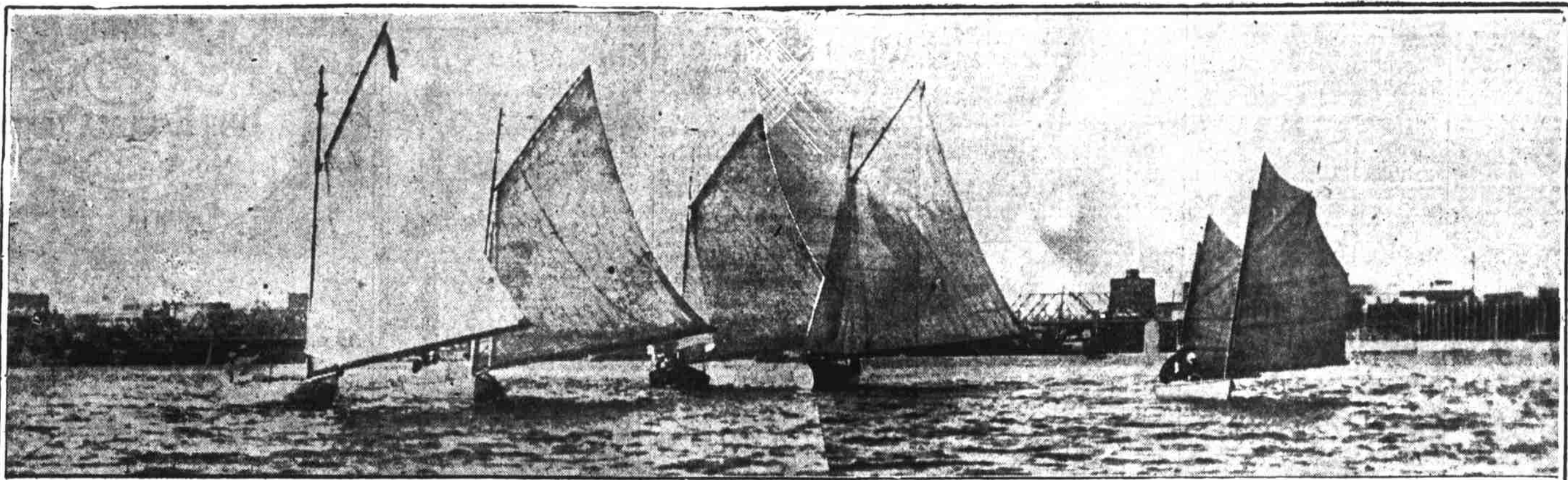

The arrest of Waddell on Saturday was due to the refusal of Louis Huff, who had entered \$500 bail for him in an assault and battery case, to continue on his bond.

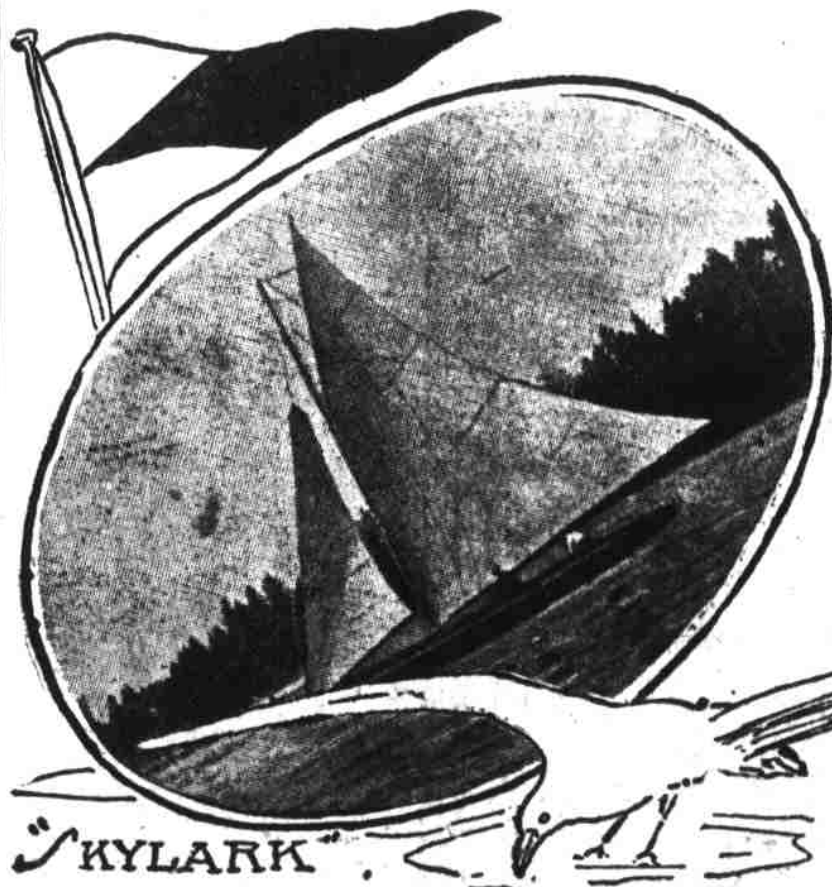
Several of the pitcher's friends went to work yesterday searching for another bondsman for him, and they were finally successful. The identity of the new bondsman could not be learned.

AMERICAN LEGION

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 18.—The supreme grand council of the American Legion of Honor assembled here today in biennial session. Each of the delegates wore upon his breast the decoration of the French Legion of Honor, the badge of the famous French order being used by the American organization by special permission of the French government, granted in 1878 to Darius Wilson of Boston, who was the founder of the order in America. The sessions of the council, which will extend over a week or longer, will be presided over by Supreme Commander William N. Davenport of Boston.

The biennial report says that the membership, which extends into every state and territory, is in the neighborhood of 70,000, and that since its organization the legion has paid out nearly \$2,000,000 in benefits.
