advisory committee. The historical significance of the Exposition was touched upon, and the bearing the enterprise will have upon the development of American commerce with the Orient was emphasized as well.

The Fair Presented.

"Oregon, the mother of the entire Northwest," also said the speaker, "prepares for the entertainment of guests, who if they accept the invitation, will come to a grateful climate, a rich region, a hospitable people, a world of opportunity and in short, the most glorious spot that was devised when Almighty God created His universe. They will witness what another state, neighbor to this great state wherein now we are visiting, is doing for the development of the nation's possibilities, to justify the bravery of those who, in 1792, risked their lives to bring the country to the empire of the old Oregon country, to equal the persistency of the statesman who foresaw the future, and who withstood the pessimism of those who would have cast as the detriment of nations, as it was called by some of the former men of affairs. Those guests will learn that our here are not wild Indians, not alone rudeness, not solely the rude beginnings of what might some time be, but that already are culture, refinement, industry, commerce, manufacture, literature, oratory, and all of the concomitants of a civilization boasting its place among the best communities of the continent."

Co-Operation, Not Antagonisms.

"This invitation is extended in the spirit of hearty co-operation with other Western and Southern States in any enterprise calculated to make for the common good. We of Oregon propose, and we know the proposal will be received with glad acclaim, that hereafter, in place of obstruction by one locality against the wishes of another, we all join the Anti-Knockers' Club, and name the organization the Co-Operative Association of the Trans-Mississippi Region. Membership shall be conditioned upon the belief in a common brotherhood, a common flag, community of interest, positive expenditure of effort, instead of the expenditure of that effort in purely negative endeavor to prevent some other people from obtaining what they desire and what they should have."

"It shall be Puget Sound with the Lower Mississippi River projects for construction of proper levees along that great waterway. It shall be, also, New Orleans and Texas with Oregon for the improvement of the Columbia. And, too, it shall be the Columbia Webfoot and the Texas ranger and the Louisiana planter and the Arkansas colonel standing shoulder to shoulder with the brilliant promoters of Puget Sound for compelling the national Congress to recognize the justice of their demands for the improvement of Lake Washington and the development of its matchless commercial and industrial possibilities."

Invitation to Oregon.

To the end that there be engendering of this spirit, we whose toes are grown together, who can swim so soon as we are born, who are known as Webfooters, and who, being thus designated, are rightly classed, we of the state to the

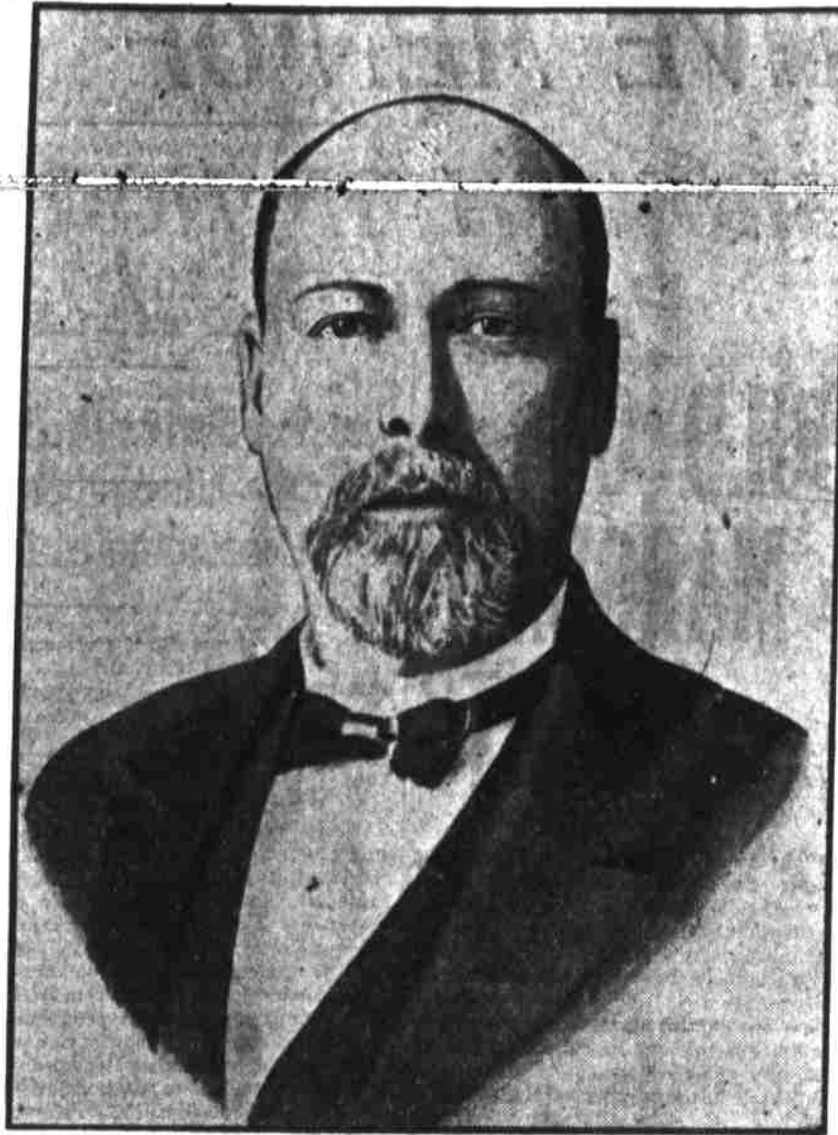
the great West and the advancement of the interests of its people.

JOHN BARRETT ON
LEWIS-CLARK FAIR

SEATTLE, Aug. 19.—The Lewis and Clark Fair received all attention from the Commercial Congress today, two addresses being given, one by John Barrett, the ex-minister to Siam, who is a Portland man and also Commissioner-General to the St. Louis Exposition. In the course of Mr. Barrett's remarks he made some new comparisons in regard to the development of the commerce between the United States and Australia which were interesting and instructive. Mr. Barrett said we took particular pleasure in pointing out the wonderful progress of the Pacific trade in view of the prophecies he made when a United States Minister to Siam some 10 years ago, and when he was often criticized by certain papers for indulging in optimistic estimates. Having always been an earnest advocate of advancement of American interests with Pacific, and being practically a pioneer in the awakening interest on the subject, he was gratified beyond measure to see his prophecies had been more than realized.

Gives Statistics.

After Mr. Barrett had spoken at some length in regard to the St. Louis World's Fair and its relation to the development of trans-Mississippi commerce with the Orient, he gave some new statistics showing the power of progress our trade on the Pacific had made during the last 10 years. He made special reference to the Lewis and Clark Exposition, prefacing what he said with the statement that he was discussing the Lewis and Clark Exposition as a citizen of Oregon, having a deep interest in the welfare of the state. He urged the delegates of the Trans-Mississippi Congress to take an interest in the undertaking and use their influence in their respective states to also take part therein.

Every one in the trans-Mississippi commonwealths, he said, is looking forward to the benefits to be derived from the development of commerce on the Pacific.

"The Lewis and Clark Exposition will show," said he, "more than any other enterprise of its kind in the history of this country, our close commercial relations with Asia and Australia, and will demonstrate how important is the trade with Trans-Pacific lands. There is no state or territory on the west side of the Mississippi River that is not either directly or indirectly concerned in the prosperity of the Pacific Coast."

What benefits one state or section will benefit all states of the trans-Mississippi portion of the United States, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana ask their sister commonwealths South and East to assist them in the great celebration to be held at Portland in 1905."

ELKS' CLAM BAKE
A BANNER AFFAIRElaborate Preparation Being
Made for Entertainment of
Portland's Contingent.

OLYMPIA, Aug. 19.—Olympia citizens have elaborate preparations well under way for the entertainment of the Portland contingent which will arrive here for the clam bake next Saturday. Business houses are decorating for the occasion and all the main streets of the city are decked in the colors of the order.

Many private residences will be thrown open for the entertainment of the visitors who are expected not only from Portland but from the 11 different Elks' lodges in Washington. A hospitality committee is at work now and has secured accommodations for 2,000 persons.

The feast is to be spread upon the old capitol grounds, a most picturesque spot and one of the historical points of interest in the city. Two big pits are being built for the clam bake, which is to be in charge of J. H. Cobby, who arrived today. George H. Wemple of Portland, advance agent, arrived Tuesday, and is busy co-operating with the local committee.

The clam bake on the capitol grounds is to be followed by a large reception in the evening and a big dance following that. There is to be a continuous smoker for the visitors at headquarters of the Olympia lodge. On Sunday an excursion to the navy yards at Bremerton is being planned. This, if carried out, will return in time for the special train to leave here Sunday evening. It being the plan to send one special train back Saturday night and keep the other until Sunday evening. If the excursion to Bremerton is not arranged there will be a band concert and other Sunday entertainment here.

SIDELIGHTS ON THE

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 19.—The present Trans-Mississippi Congress is in all respects a representative body of men—men who do things; big-brained, active Westerners who have objects in life, and those objects the development of
