BUYS A SALOON
THAT IS CLOSED

A Portland Firm Pays Well for Vancouver Saloon that Will Soon Be Shutup by Recent Session Law.

Place Is Too Close to School for Infirm Youth and Will Be Closed when License Expires—\$6,000 the Price.

(Journal Special Service.)
VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 20.—A peculiar "situation" exists here in relation to one saloon and its conflict with a recent session law passed by the last Legislature. The Eckard saloon, east of the city, was recently sold to a company of Portland for \$6,000. The figure was thought to be excessive, but the saloon being outside the city limits and subject only to county license, it was evidently considered a good buy by the foreign concern.

Now comes the new session law that proscribes all saloons within 2,000 feet of any normal, reform or industrial school owned by the state. It chances that the saloon mentioned is within 1,500 feet of the grounds of the State School for Defective Youth, and is clearly within the limits of the law, since this institution is particularly mentioned.

The Star Brewery Company of this place has heretofore controlled in part the Eckard saloon, and now that a competitor has it, they expect to see that the law is enforced. Should opposition be lacking, there are numerous residents of that locality who object to a saloon and who say they will take action under the state law to close the place.

The owners of the saloon have no recourse, for if they move away from the school they come into the city limits, where the Council has jurisdiction and the license fees are much higher; then, too, no other desirable location could be found near the present one.

According to legal talent here, the saloon will be closed when its license expires, and the Portland company has expended \$6,000 for an up-to-date place.

BATTERY ATHLETES
GAINING GOOD FORM

Members and Teams of Amateur Club Ready to Meet Outside Aspirants.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 20.—The athletic club of the Twenty-sixth Battery has not been making any open boasts of late for field practice, and long "hikes" have kept many members busy, but some of the men have been constantly in training, and in the near future several challenges will be issued to outside athletic clubs.

None but the members of the company can join the association, which is pledged to clean sport and expects to pull off various events in its big club-rooms this fall. A football team is being formed, a basketball team is in the field ready for amateur combats, and basketball will begin later.

Among the members of the club are several that will take rank among the best of Western amateurs when they finally gain their form and meet in the ring with outsiders. The best of these is Al Short, who stands ready to meet any unprofessional "pug" at 140 pounds. Short has backing that is strong, and is willing to talk business with those who go in for the love of the sport, and not for the money to be gained. George Jeffries is another good lightweight boxer of the club, and Ed Spaulding, as a wrestler, is pronounced exceptional by Portland critics who have seen his work.

After the return of the Twenty-sixth Battery from the Sandy the club will give an exhibition for the benefit of their gymnasium fund, and later will challenge the Multnomah Club for bouts at handball, wrestling and boxing.

FOREST FIRES DREADED

Commissioners Go to La Center to Prevent Burning of Slashings, Should There Be Danger.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 20.—The Commissioners made a hurried trip to La Center today to inspect the slashings burning situation there. An application came in yesterday for a permit to burn about 100 acres of slashings near La Center, and with the application came in several protests.

It is understood that near the land to be burned are many sawmills and perhaps 1,000 cords of wood stacked up for delivery. If the slashings are burned it is said that the mills may go, and the wood certainly will. In order to avoid the possibility of another forest fire devastating the county, the Commissioners stopped all other work and went to La Center to prevent the burning of the land, should it seem dangerous. Under the new forest-fire laws the board has the right at this season of the year to stop all such fires at any time.

Roseburg Camping Grounds.
EUGENE, Or., Aug. 20.—Inspection for a camping ground at Roseburg was made yesterday by Major George O. Toran and Capt. J. M. Williams of the First Separate Battalion. The ground is said to be excellent for camping purposes but a field near the camp has to be used for more extended maneuvers. The members of the battalion are expecting a fine encampment. The new rifles are on hand and have been inspected by the boys, who are delighted with them. The two companies of Eugene will make their usual good showing at the annual encampment.

Salem Labor Day.
SALEM, Aug. 20.—The Central Labor Union of Salem has arranged a program for the celebration of Labor Day on September 7, next. During the forenoon a grand parade is to be held, beginning at 10 o'clock, and later a program will be rendered in Marion Square, to be followed by a basket dinner. The afternoon will be given up to sports, such as foot races, sack races, tug-of-war and other amusements, to be followed by a match game of baseball, the afternoon program to be held at the C. A. A. C. Baseball Park.

CELEBRATION OF
COMING LABOR DAY

Oregon City Preparing for Entertainment of Painters and Carpenters.

OREGON CITY, Or., Aug. 20.—The program for the celebration of Labor Day on Tuesday, September 1, by the Painters' and Carpenters' Unions of Oregon City has been perfected. Mention of this celebration was made in these columns several days ago. The date is September 1st, and not September 6th, as misstated in the Evening Telegram of yesterday.

The Southern Pacific Railroad will run a special train service from Oregon City to Gladstone Park, leaving Oregon City at 9:12 a. m.

The Oregon City brass band will furnish the music for the occasion.

The program of the day will begin at 10 o'clock in the morning. Mr. Morgan, a prominent labor leader of Portland, will make an address along labor lines. Speeches will also be made by Hon. George C. Brownell, Grant B. Dimick, J. H. Westover and other local talent of Oregon City.

In the afternoon games and sports will be the order of the entertainment. Bicycle races, foot races, sack races, potato races, after which the sport of the day will be brought to a close by a baseball game between the Carpenters and the Painters.

All of the unions of Oregon City are invited to participate in this celebration of Labor Day as well as all of the unions of Portland and vicinity. Every one should bring a well filled basket, as the basket social feature of the meeting will be one of its strongest points.

Ice water and refreshments can be had on the ground in abundance.

All trains from Portland will stop at Gladstone in the morning and afternoon.

Mrs. Dowell alleges that her husband is an habitual drunkard and that he has been in the county jail at Portland for 120 days and that for years he has failed to support her or her family.

EUGENE AT THE SALEM STATE FAIR

Very Satisfactory Arrangements Made for Lane County's Exhibit.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 20.—President W. H. Wehrung of the Oregon Agricultural Society was in Eugene yesterday and was pleased with the preparations which have been going quietly on in this city for representation at Salem during the big State Fair next month. E. M. Warren has been commissioned to gather a specially fine exhibit and his success is assured, for he already has as fine a collection of wild and tame grasses, growing grains and fruits as ever have been exhibited at Salem. This county will be amply represented. The exhibit will be brought from Salem after the State Fair and placed in the District Fair to be held here a week later. This insures Eugene and Lane county making an extra effort at a fine display of the wonderfully inexhaustive products and resources of the county.

A special excursion will be run once and probably more than that. The regular concession of one fare and a third, however, will extend during the entire time covered by the life of the Fair.

WHEELMEN HAVE
GREAT GRIEVANCE

Salem Council Restricts Them from Using Sidewalks on Many Streets.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 20.—The Salem Council a few weeks ago passed a new ordinance restricting the use of the sidewalks in the business portion of the city by bicycle riders far more than was the case under the old ordinance. After the ordinance had received the Mayor's approval the members of the Council decided that the ordinance was too sweeping in its provisions and at the first meeting after the passage of the new law a bill was introduced repealing the new ordinance and re-enacting the old law on the subject. This bill was passed to second reading and referred to the ordinance committee, with orders to report at the next meeting of the Council, when it was expected that the bill would be passed. That meeting was to have been held this week, and it was thought the bill would become an ordinance and the one enacted a few weeks ago, which will be effective on next Tuesday, would be repealed before it really became a law. However, the plan has miscarried, for the Council at this week's session was unable to secure a quorum, and the next meeting will not be held until a week after the new law is effective. In consequence the bicycle riders of the city will have a taste of the restrictions before the Council can give them relief, and it is believed that no relief will be given, now that the new ordinance will be operative for a time.

Will Be Burdensome.

Salem wheelmen will find the new regulation very burdensome. The sidewalks will be closed to them on some of the streets on which the roadways are not fit for use of wheels and particularly is this the case where the walks on entire streets, from one end of the city to the other, are prohibited territory, and this on streets with which the principal roads leading into the city from the surrounding country connect. The bicycle riders of the city are discussing the proposition of perfecting an organization and making a determined effort to secure rights now denied them by the new ordinance. The Council agreed to build bicycle paths on all of the streets affected by the ordinance, but after the ordinance was passed and signed by the Mayor, an effort made to secure the carrying into effect this agreement resulted in a complete failure, the Council defeating the measure promptly when it was introduced, and the wheelmen will not secure the paths promised them, but this failure on the part of the City Council to provide the wheelmen is liable to bear fruit in the future, for Salem probably has more wheelmen who have votes than any other city in the state in proportion and if they organize they can secure their rights.

FIRE WAS THE WORK OF INCENDIARIES

Now Proved that Salem's Blaze Was Due to Fire-bugs.

SALEM, Aug. 20.—Yesterday morning's fire was due to incendiarism. This much is now certain. Morris Klinger, a capitalist of this city, living near the scene of the fire, was aroused by the barking of his dog but a short time before the fire alarm was sounded, and going to the window, he plainly saw two men running away from the fannymill factory and dodge into an alley. Mr. Klinger thought nothing of the occurrence at the time and returned to bed, but within a few minutes was again called out by the fire alarm. There had been no fire or light in the building for two weeks, and the theory of incendiarism is strengthened by this fact. Mr. Holman, the owner, is a heavy loser by the fire. His property destroyed, including a large electric dynamo and other electric machinery and supplies, together with a number of new fannymills and the machinery required to make them, aggregate, with the value of the burned building, between \$5,000 and \$6,000, and the insurance is but \$1,500.

If this was incendiarism, and there is no reason to doubt it, Salem will probably have more of that kind of work soon, for the firebug usually continues his operations. A close watch is being kept on all suspicious looking strangers in the city, and men without visible means of support are unable to give an account of themselves as being floated as fast as possible by the police.

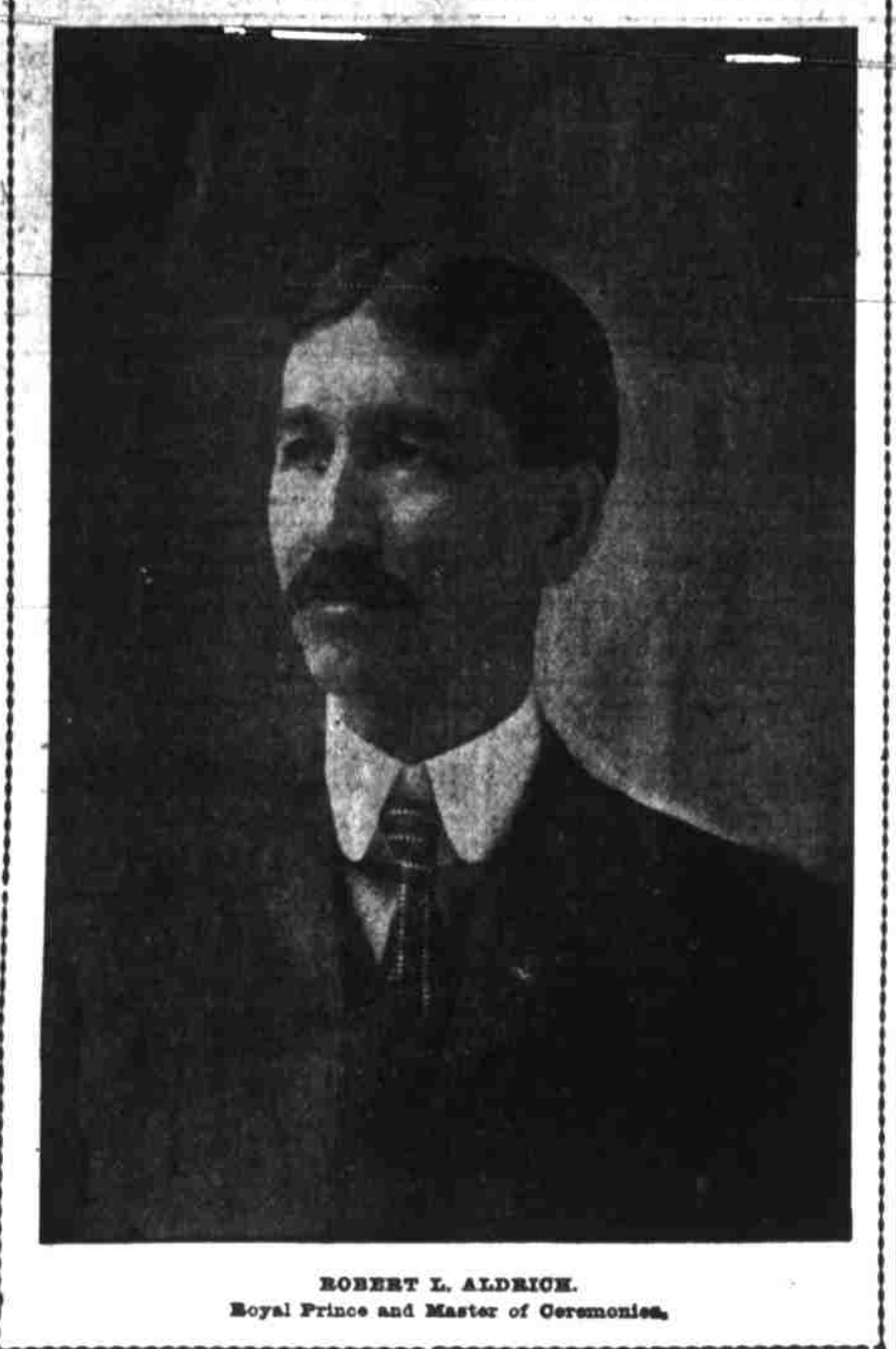

She leaves two sons, Dr. B. L. Steeves of Weiser and Dr. B. Steeves of Salem, and the daughter, Mrs. H. H. Lafruge, in Canada. She leaves considerable property in this country.
