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NOTED Highbinder, POLICE DECLARE

Woo Sheok, Supposed to Be Ah Gee, Held by Court Pending the Arrival of Detective Gibson from California.

Attempt to Secure His Release Today by Writ of Habeas Corpus Fails—Six Companies Offers a Reward.

The return upon the petition for a writ of habeas corpus in the case of Woo Sheok, supposed to be Ah Gee, accused in San Francisco of one of the most daring attempts at assault and robbery ever made in Chinatown of that city, was filed in the State Circuit Court this morning by Deputy District Attorney Spencer, and the hearing was set for 9:30 o'clock tomorrow morning, when Detective Edward Gibson of California will arrive and claim the prisoner. Gibson was in Sacramento last night to secure requisition papers which they will present to Gov. Chamberlain for his indorsement at Salem some time today. They will probably arrive in Portland tonight and appear in court tomorrow morning.

Ah Gee, alias Leong Yee, Wong Chung, Louie Sing, Too Sheok and Yee Shuk Yee, the police allege, is a noted highbinder in San Francisco. Woo Sheok was arrested in Portland by Detective Day last Wednesday upon the receipt of circular information from the chief of police of the California metropolis.

The crime charged. Ah Gee, in company with several other highbinders, made a desperate at-

tempt to rob the store of Wong Kee Cheong, Wong See Chon and Wong Slick, at 726 Dupont street, on May 20. The proprietor resisted the robbers, and in a battle with pistols and knives Wong See was shot twice by the robbers. Two of the robbers, Wong Kee and Chee Gun, were captured by the intended victims and the former was sentenced to 20 years and the latter to 14 years in the penitentiary. Three others escaped, and the Chinese six companies offered a reward of \$100 for the capture of each. Two disappeared, but Gee, as stated, was arrested here.

After presenting the return, Mr. Spencer moved that no action be taken by the court, excepting so far as the arrest and detention of the prisoner was concerned. In his opinion the court should not question the identity of the man until the arrival of the California officers, with the requisition of their Governor and the indorsement thereupon of the Governor of Oregon.

Pipes & Tift, attorneys for Gee, wished to have the question of identity passed upon at once. Mr. Pipes said he could produce witnesses who would testify that Woo Sheok had been in Oregon for the past two years, and that he had always borne a good reputation. The witnesses were six Chinamen, who occupied seats in the courtroom.

Court Detains Him. Judge Cleland ruled that the only matter immediately at issue was the question of detention. So far as that was concerned, the court could do nothing until the arrival of the California officers. It was not within the jurisdiction of the court to inquire into the actions of the Governors of the two states, and there was no reason why it should inquire into the identity of the prisoner before the requisition is received. He therefore continued the case until 9:30 o'clock tomorrow, when the officers will be in the city.

After the continuance had been granted Sheok was taken back to the city jail and was arraigned in the Municipal Court, and was allowed until tomorrow to plead.

"Oh, Judge, maye it five, I'll be good" wailed Casey, but the balliff led him away to begin a month's work scrubbing the station floors.

PLAN APPROVED BY FEDERATED TRADES

Report of Committee Urges Adoption of Arbitration Plan.

The committee appointed by the Federated Trades Council to investigate the Scullin plan of arbitration has forwarded a report to the president of that organization in which it says:

"We have examined into the plans for a local board of conciliation and arbitration for the settlement of all further labor disputes; also a bill for the enactment of a state law, creating a state board of arbitration for the above purpose, as drafted by P. H. Scullin, member of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, and beg to report:

"We most heartily recommend the endorsement by the Federated Trades Council and all other trades unions, believing that their adoption and operation will prove themselves an industrial blessing alike to employer and employee and the public at large; and ultimately bring about that much-to-be-desired end, a better feeling, greater confidence, and a mutual desire between the now contending forces for a closer co-operation for their mutual benefit, and the general prosperity of the public at large.

George Estes, president of the United Brotherhood of Railway Employees, will be in Portland on September 2 and deliver an address in the A. O. U. W. Hall on economic subjects. He will also set forth reasons why workmen should be members of the American Labor Union. A. P. Apperson, business agent of the local organization, is sending communications to all the unions in the city, apprising them of the meeting. Mr. Estes is now in Southern Oregon and will speak in all the towns along the line of the Southern Pacific.
