

M. P. MAY USE A FOURTH TRAIN

Mr. Charlton of that Road Says that Unprecedented Travel to Seattle Justifies Extra Service.

Southern Pacific, Too, Bringing in Empty Coaches from San Francisco to Handle Enormous Traffic Here.

Travel into Portland at present is almost without a parallel in the history of Pacific Coast railroads. It is straining the passenger equipment of the Southern Pacific and Northern Pacific railroads to their capacity.

A special train of 10 coaches filled with Pennsylvania members of the A. R. who have been attending the grand encampment at San Francisco, has left the Bay City and is due in Portland today.

Room for a Fourth Train. The Northern Pacific travel between Portland and Puget Sound is now the heaviest in the history of that railroad.

It is proposed to cut the present time of a little over seven hours down to about five hours. This would require a speed of a fraction over 37 miles an hour, and could easily be made.

Passenger traffic to Astoria during the regatta is unprecedented. The Astoria & Columbia River railroad is running trains of from 12 to 15 coaches each morning and evening.

ROOSEVELT TAKES STAND ON LABOR

Believes that no Discrimination Can Be Made in Respect to Men Working in Government Employ.

(Journal Special Service.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 21.—President Roosevelt has declared himself pointedly on the matter of unionism, so far as it invades Government departments.

At the time of the controversy there was much correspondence carried on with the Chief Executive, and that there shall be no discrimination or interference with any employee who is not a member of any labor organization.

Concerning this principle, the President wrote: "It is, of course, merely a matter of decency to require that all Government departments shall be conducted in accordance with the principles clearly and fearlessly enunciated."
