Fred Dahl who, laboring under the delusion that the police thought that he was implicated in one of the street car robberies, jumped 50 feet from a bridge over Eagle Creek, is still at the County Hospital. In his attempt to commit suicide his legs were crushed and mangled. However, the surgeons hope that they will not have to amputate his foot. He is becoming rational and his recovery is expected.

Formal notice of the revocation of his license and decision of the Court to refund the unexpended portion of the license fee has been served upon John C. Fritz, proprietor of the Favorite saloon at Fourth and Couch streets. Fritz closed the place and gave a receipt for the money. The saloon is said to have been under the proprietorship of "Bob" Patterson, but in Fritz's name.

Suit to restrain the county from selling property in Fernbrook addition has been begun by Henry Berger. In his complaint Berger alleges that the property was purchased for unpaid taxes in 1899 and was sold to D. M. Haskins. Haskins transferred his title to Berger, who obtained a sheriff's deed to the property, numbering 20 lots. The county bid in the property for delinquent taxes in 1891 and 1896 and now threatens to sell the property.

Suit has been begun in the State Circuit Court by School district No. 41, in the eastern part of the county, against L. Ferdinand Flores for the possession of an acre of ground upon which the school house is located. In 1891 the ground, so it is alleged, was leased to the district by Flores for 99 years, but in 1892 he, then clerk of the district, had the papers of the district in his possession and recently he has contended that he never executed the lease.

The Edward Holman Undertaking Corporation has removed to its elegant new building, Third and Salmon, and begins business at its new home today. So soon as it gets "real good and settled" President Holman says that the building will be open to the public in the evenings, so that those whose curiosity prompts in them a desire to see a

modern, strictly up-to-date undertaking establishment, may have an opportunity to do so. It is certainly a finely arranged and superbly equipped concern.

Articles of incorporation of the St. John's Water Company have been filed with the County Clerk by J. L. Hartman, E. L. Thompson and H. L. Powers. The object of the company is to establish a water works at St. John's, and its capitalization is placed at \$10,000.

ENGINEERS' TEST SATURDAY WEEK

All the Department Employees Are Being Placed on a Civil Service Basis.

The examination of the engineers and inspectors in the City Engineers' Department will be conducted by the Civil Service Board on August 25. The other men in the department, numbering about 70, will be examined as rapidly as possible, and then the entire force will be placed on a civil service basis.

The questions for the written examination are already being prepared by Secretary Potter, so there will be no delay. In addition the men will be put through practical tests by competent authorities.

It will not be many months until the various departments of the municipal service will be all on a civil service footing. There are two or three departments yet to be examined.

CODE IS CORRECT, SAYS C. B. BELLINGER

To the Editor of The Journal: An article announces the discovery that the new code makes no mention of the law of 1899 authorizing counties to work their prisoners on highways. The act will be found in Bellinger & Cotton's Code, sections 4,864, 4,865 inclusive. It is included in the subject "of highways," and is indexed under "the head 'Roads and Highways.'"

TO OPEN THIS EVENING

The Dazzling Concert Hall Will Swing Its Doors Outward to the Multitude When Electricity Begins to Shine.

What is said to be the most elaborately decorated saloon and concert hall in Portland is to be opened at the corner of First and Main streets this evening at about the time the electric lights begin to shine. The building is the name given to this place, and its owner, the A. De Martini Company, have been lavish in its expenditure of money in fitting up the establishment for the entertainment of those who may be present. The decorations of the place are described as masterpieces of mechanical skill. A stage has been provided for concert purposes. Admission is free to all.

Ernest Miller had charge of the scenic decorations. Povey Bros., the decorated art glass, and the Brunswick-Balke Company is responsible for elegant fixtures. The building of this hall has been in process for a long time, and plans were completed after protracted deliberation by experienced architects. The combined ingenuity of a large force of the most skilled artisans finally produced the most dazzling institution of its kind anywhere in this section. A large orchestra has been engaged to furnish the music, which will be heard nightly. At the bar the celebrated Weinhart Columbia beer will be served. This is known as the most healthful beverage of its kind anywhere. The usual liquors will also be served.

BUILDING ALBINA BRANCH

MRS. SEYMOUR CHIPMAN

Mr. and Mrs. Seymour Chipman celebrated their golden wedding in Corvallis August 14. The fiftieth wedding anniversary of the aged couple was attended by their five children, 23 grandchildren and one great grandchild, and 150 invited guests. Mr. and Mrs. Seymour Chipman were married in Clayton County, Iowa, in 1853. At the beginning of the war of the rebellion Mr. Chipman joined the Union forces and served during the entire war. During his absence at the front Mrs. Chipman had joined the ranks of that grand army of women, who so greatly assisted the boys in blue, and ever since then has been an honored member of the Women's Relief Corps.

During the hours of the reception when the couple were congratulated by friends the bride and groom of long ago told of the stirring times of their early wedded life. From three o'clock until ten o'clock at night the guests were entertained. At night rows of colored lamps festooned among the vines and shrubbery of the spacious lawn were lighted. Refreshments were served, and all of the guests recorded their names in a register which will be preserved by the family. There was no formal renewal of the vows exchanged 50 years ago, but many handsome presents were given. Many years ago Mr. Chipman became a Master Mason and is at present an active member of the Mystic Shrine. Mrs. Chipman has been and is an ardent member of the Order of Eastern Star. The Shriners presented the couple with a handsomely engraved loving cup. In the name of the Masonic order T. H. Crawford made the presentation.

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NEW THEATRE IS NOW BEING BUILT

Continuous Vaudeville Show to Start at Seventh and Washington Street or Before October 1.

Theatre Is Built and Backed by S. Morton Cohn, and Edward Shields Will Be Manager—Cost Will Be \$8,000.

Portland is to have a new theatre. It is being built now in the rear of the Arcade, near the corner of Seventh and Washington streets. S. Morton Cohn, proprietor of the Arcade, is behind the enterprise. Work on the theatre building has been going on for about two weeks. Edward Shields of Shields Park will be its manager. Financially the theatre is in the erection of the theatre with Mr. Cohn is J. J. Jennings, lessee of the McGinn property on which the theatre will stand. The stage walls are being built of brick.

Picturesque Drop Curtain.

The dimensions of the new theatre will be 52 feet long by 40 feet in width. The stage will be 20 feet wide and 14 feet high. A gallery will run almost entirely around the main auditorium. The seating capacity will be close to 500. The drop curtain will represent some Oregon landscape.

"The main entrance will be through the present Arcade," said Mr. Cohn today, "and in order to give the people room there I may have to remove the center tier of machines there. The performance will be of the continuous vaudeville variety."

Continuous vaudeville shows have become very popular all over the country," he continued. "Portland is the only city of considerable size on the Pacific Coast that has no theatre of that kind, but it will have one on or before October 1. We expect to open the Arcade Theatre, for that will be its name, late next month. The main entrance will be on Washington street and the exit just around the corner on Seventh street."

Two small buildings on Seventh street are being reconstructed to accommodate the new theatre. The total expense of construction and equipment is about \$8,000.

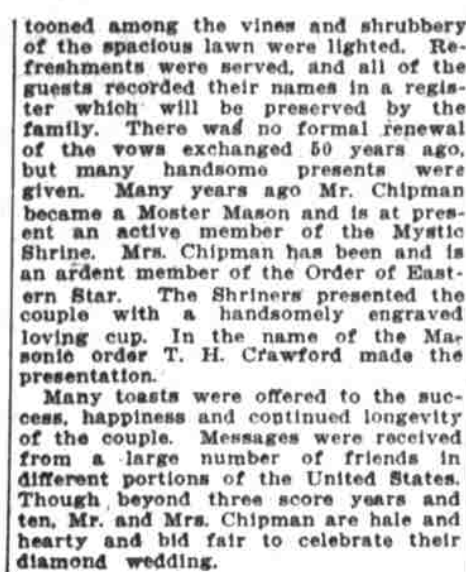
COLUMBIA RIVER SCENERY
