VANCOUVER PEOPLE SUSPECT PORTLAND

Several of Them Fall to Contribute to Dredging Fund Because They Think It Is No Use to Oppose City's Fall.

(Journal Special Service.)
Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 28.—A collection is being taken among the business men of the city for the purpose of securing the Portland dredge and having it clear out the river bar so that free traffic can be carried on between the river front and the sea.
One of the strange things connected with the subscription, according to business men interested in improving the harbor, is the indifference many local men exhibit in the matter. One leading firm that has considerable capital is said to have given only \$10 and others were as low.
One explanation of this attitude may be found in the opinion that many here are of the pull that Portland assumes. One business man said:
"The government paid out \$30,000 to have a jetty placed across the Columbia so that our harbor would be benefited. The jetty was placed by Portland engineers in such a way as to make our waterfront worse than it was before. Perhaps it was ignorance, but we believe that it was done with intent to cut out a rival to Portland's business."

Good Game Season.
Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 28.—This town boasts many sportsmen of "some ability, and these last days of the closed season are being spent by the sports in getting ready for the annual foray into the woods and plains. During the summer the local gunners have been increasing their skill at the traps, and even the youths of the town are constant patrons of the shooting galleries. The grouse and partridge, on which the law will soon expire, are said to be plentiful and the reduction of the hunting license to \$1 will encourage many amateurs to try their skill in the coverts.

An Unfounded Rumor.
Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 28.—The report has gained general circulation in the post and town that the government had authorized the installation of an electric light plant in the garrison. Inquiry at the office of the chief quartermaster of the department of the Columbia showed that the rumor was unfounded. According to the chief clerk the Washington authorities had not yet been asked to grant the needed funds, but all work that is being done is for the purpose of furnishing the chief office with sufficient data. After it has been discovered what the cost of the work will be, and what a saving can be made, if any, then the Washington office will be able to consider the matter.

Prize Pickers Needed.
Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 28.—The prize crop is about ready for the pickers and the lack of these pickers is liable to cause vexatious delay. The prize growers of the county are asking vehemently for help and are willing to guarantee a month's work at good wages to any competent men, women or children who can perform the needed labor.

PERMITS USE OF PRESERVATIVE

Idaho Pure Food Commissioner Will Allow Benzoate of Soda, But No Other Antiseptic, in Canned.

Catsups, if they contain no deleterious ingredients, now in the hands of jobbers and retailers in the state of Idaho, will be passed from now until July 1, 1904. A. J. McPherson, commissioner of Idaho, has sent a circular letter to this effect to local jobbers.

The pure food laws of the states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, while similar in many respects, vary in a great extent. The Idaho laws are more rigidly enforced than those of Oregon and Washington. However, jobbers claim that in some instances the Idaho statutes are too severe and several complaints have been instituted at different times. One law particularly opposed is that requiring that every tin of canned goods be separately labeled. "This was a law," said George Lang, of Wadhams & Co., "this was always applicable to live up to, and I believe the supreme court of the state of Idaho held it to be unconstitutional."

The circular issued by Commissioner McPherson is as follows:
"Coming to the season when you will place your order for catsup is fast approaching, and to reply to the many inquiries now being received, this department deems it proper to advise you that it will pass all catsups now in the hands of jobbers and retailers in this state which do not contain any deleterious or harmful ingredients from this date until July 1, 1904."

We earnestly request that all catsups of this year's manufacture placed upon the market bear upon the label the figures '1903'. These goods should be free from coloring matter, but until it may be established that benzoate of soda is a safe and limited quantity (not to exceed one part in 1200) will be permitted.

"At a recent meeting of the dairy and pure food commissioners at St. Paul, Minn., it was abundantly demonstrated that catsup could not be kept for any length of time after being opened without the use of some antiseptic. It was agreed by a majority of the Northwest states that as this was true and to avoid confusion as to the multiplicity of labels and to promote harmony, it was agreed as above indicated. However, if at any time benzoate of soda (which is considered the least harmful of antiseptics) be proven harmful, then and in that event, we reserve the right to withdraw permission for its use."

"Please fully understand that the use of no preservative other than benzoate of soda will be permitted in catsup, and that only under the conditions and restrictions herein stated."

"I would also state in this connection that coloring matter and antiseptics are forbidden by the law in food products; and I beg to inform you that the law will be enforced in these matters."

"I would also call your attention to the matter of spices, condiments, etc., as to their labeling; if adulterated, give the name and per cent of each adulterant."

"Furthermore, I would say that distilled vinegars are colorless, and if found colored will be considered in violation of the law."

CHINESE PRISONER RECEIVES A PARDON

Woong Loong, Serving Twelve Years at Salem for Manslaughter, Released Because He Suffers from an Incurable Malady.

Salem, Or., Aug. 28.—Woong Loong, a Chinaman serving twelve years in the penitentiary for manslaughter, was yesterday afternoon pardoned by the governor and he is now at liberty. Woong Loong was received at the prison in March, 1900, from Clatsop county. He has since that time been afflicted with an incurable disease of the eye, and it was upon the recommendation of the prison physician, Dr. J. D. Shaw, and Dr. A. B. Gillis, an eye specialist, that this pardon was granted.

John Seymour, the runaway trusty, is still at large, and officers thus far have found no trace of him. It is believed he will try to join the circus trains at Eugene tonight.

Will Study Abroad.
Salem, Or., Aug. 28.—Prof. LeRoy Genser and Miss Lelo Nicklin, two of Salem's leading young men, left last night for Berlin, Germany, where they will become students under the renowned Dr. Joachim, the great violinist. They will remain abroad for several years.

Will Arrest Perdue.
Salem, Or., Aug. 28.—Ore Chamberlain yesterday afternoon issued a requisition for the arrest of Jack Perdue, and his return to the agent of the state of Oregon. Perdue is wanted in Douglas county for the kidnapping of a girl aged 14 years. He is at Wenatchee, Wash., under arrest, and Sheriff J. Parrott of Roseburg was appointed agent of the state of Oregon to present the requisition to the governor of Washington, and secure the man.

Investigate Water System.
Salem, Or., Aug. 28.—Prof. Sweetser of the State University at Eugene, and Dr. Pierce of Salem, a member of the state board of health, have made an investigation of Salem's water supply during the past few days, and Prof. Sweetser returned to his home last night, armed with a number of samples of water to be tested as to its purity. The work is being done for the state board of health.

PUNY WATER SUPPLY DOWN AT EUGENE

University of Oregon Has Advantage of Best of City and Is Ample Supplied—Test Made Yesterday Which Proves.

Eugene, Or., Aug. 28.—The new water system which has been under way at the university this summer was completed yesterday and the official test made before P. L. Campbell and others. The results of the test showed that the water power in the university mains was about twice as strong as that of the puny supply of the city water, which is almost useless in case of a fire. The new system threw a big stream of water well into the air, and high enough to completely deluge the tallest building on the campus. R. L. Jones, a student of the university, had complete charge of laying the system.

Baffles Scientists.
Eugene, Or., Aug. 28.—Eugene has a mysterious specimen of bone which seems to be baffling local scientists. The specimen came in yesterday from Alsea bay, and was discovered by a camper in the sand, and he dug it out on account of its enormous size. The bone weighs 72 pounds and is about four feet in length. Some say it is the remains of a mastodon, but this theory is squelched on account of oil which is present in the bone, in addition to the good condition of the same.

ALLEGED FORGER IS CLEVERLY CAPTURED

An Exciting Scene in a Forest Grove Bank When J. H. Burke Appears With a \$300 Note Which Is Bogus Paper.

Forest Grove, Or., Aug. 28.—Instead of having a \$300 note cashed at the Haines bank here last yesterday, J. H. Burke had two ugly-looking revolvers thrust into his face by President Haines and Cashier Kane.

It is alleged that the note had been forged by Burke and the bank officials, getting knowledge that the paper would be presented, they determined to take the matter into their own hands and secure the fellow's arrest.

Wednesday morning J. H. Burke appeared at the bank and asked if a \$300 note endorsed by Walter Bernard would be good. Cashier Kane replied that it would, as Mr. Bernard was one of the solid men in the district who owns much valuable property in the state.

Believing that something was wrong, and not liking Burke's appearance, both Haines and Kane drove out to Bernard's ranch Wednesday night, where it was learned that he had not signed a note to Burke, but had written his name in the man's memorandum book with the understanding that Burke would send a catalogue of certain goods he represented to be selling for a Portland firm. With this information it was decided that the man would be given into custody should he appear at the bank with a note.

After covering Burke with revolvers Marshal P. W. Cronin was called and the man was hustled to the city jail. On Burke's person were found \$465. He is well dressed and carries a very valuable gold watch.

WILLOW CREEK VALLEY.

Tone, Or., Aug. 28.—T. W. Atkins of Douglas sold his crop of alfalfa hay this week at \$7.37 per ton. He had about 100 tons of fine hay, and was more fortunate than most of the Willow-creek ranchers in that he had it stacked high and dry before the Heppner flood came.

Will Rebuild Church.

At Lexington the Methodist church, south, which was destroyed by the Heppner flood, is to be rebuilt. About \$1,500 has been raised. It is the intention of the members to erect a building at a cost of \$2,500.

Heppner Coal Mines.
Perry Taylor & Son, extensive ranchers of Douglas, returned from the Heppner coal mines this week bringing home three tons of coal. Having lived in the immediate vicinity of the Indians

coal fields a number of years, they are in a position to judge the value of the Heppner mine and pronounce it good. A wagon can be loaded in less than a minute, and improvements for the convenience of handling the coal are rapidly being made.

Portland Men Visit.
T. J. Mahoney of the Lewis & Clark Land Company, with headquarters at Portland, accompanied by James E. Cronan and C. C. Wiley, speculators, spent a day in town this week. They are so well pleased with this country that their intention is to return and engage in real estate business this fall.

COTTAGE GROVE WILL WORK PAINT BEDS

Cottage Grove, Or., Aug. 28.—The Simmons Paint Company has been incorporated here with a capital stock of \$50,000 for the purpose of working or developing the paint beds near this city and which have been known to exist for years. The incorporators are Ellis Simmons, Mrs. Etta Simmons and Barton Brown, all of this city. The mere announcement of the incorporation of any kind of a company would ordinarily secure only passing attention, but the organization of this company means much to Cottage Grove and will very soon be the means of materially increasing the pay roll of laborers who spend their money here. That the paint beds have been known to exist for many years makes it seem strange that nothing has been done to make the matter known or no effort made to develop the same, but the solution is in the fact that Mr. Simmons held the property at an unreasonably high figure and heretofore has refused to go in with anybody on a proposition to stock the business in order to raise funds, and, as a poor man himself, he has done practically nothing with the matter, further than to erect crude machinery and grind out paint in a small way, which has been used locally with a great deal of satisfaction to those who have tried it.

Mr. Brown will be practically the manager of the concern, and will direct the affairs, and no more stock will be sold than is absolutely necessary to put in the machinery required to produce the paint. In fact, the capitalization is rather small and lends confidence to the concern. Mr. Simmons has many times been offered what his neighbors thought a reasonable price for the property, but has always refused to sell, as the paint beds cover some 30 or 40 acres as already known and reaches a depth of 30 feet, which would furnish a large plant with more of the raw material than could be worked up in years. The people here have confidence that before long Oregon will be pointing with pride to the fine quality of paints produced in the state and the developments will mean much to Cottage Grove.

A Complete Alarm.
Eugene, Or., Aug. 28.—The Eugene city council is contemplating establishing a complete fire alarm system over the city. The machinery required to produce the alarm is being ordered in so many other cities. The alarm-bells will be distributed about the city and electric connections made with the three fire stations at present supported in Eugene.

BLUE OUTLOOK FOR WILLOW CREEK CROPS

Tone, Aug. 28.—Willow creek valley, and especially the country tributary to Tone, has the smallest wheat crop for six years. Seven bushels to the acre is more than an average crop this year, although a few favored places run 12 bushels and very rarely to 15. Even 18 bushels is considered a small average for this country. In many places only 5 or 6 bushels are being gotten. One-third of the grain will not be cut at all. The cause of this crop failure is the very dry spring. The rains in June came too late to save the crops. As this section depends almost solely on wheat, the crop failure will bear pretty heavily on the people.

The farmers in the lowlands along the creek are in no better luck. The Heppner flood came down the valley, just at the time when most of the hay had been cut, and this was scattered and ruined by the water. Those farmers who had not yet cut were still more unfortunate, for the water not only beat down and ruined the grass and alfalfa, but it became so matted in the sediment left by the water that it will be next to impossible to prepare the ground for next year's crop.
