Vancouver Elks Spend an Evening with
Lodge in a Very Flourishing Condition.

Vancouver, Wash., Oct. 7.—Vancouver Lodge No. 823, R. P. O. E., proved that they were the "Best People On Earth" last night when they treated their new members to one of the notorious good times that the Elks keep for state occasions.

The program was one of the best ever given in Vancouver and was made a success largely by the efforts of Portland talent, though the local singers and story tellers did not fall far to the rear. The Elks' quartet of the lodge, consisting of Brothers Taylor, Stewart, McCutcheon and Cohen, rendered appropriate songs. Mr. Latham, piano virtuoso of Portland, delighted the members, and Mr. Cooley, formerly of H. Henry's minstrel, rendered several vocal solos that took immensely. Perry Jackson of Portland, monologue artist and dancer, helped to render the evening's entertainment a complete success.

The local lodge has gained many new members, a class of 20 having been recently received, and there are enough new members in sight to make an even hundred in the herd. Many of the members favor the leasing of a suitable hall or block that a club room may be started and a home for the bachelor members secured, but owing to the lack of suitable quarters this plan has not been carried out. The lodge of the city are all flourishing and most of them have difficulty in securing meeting places.

EASTERN RECRUITS
FOR 19TH REGIMENT

The attenuated condition of the two battalions of the Nineteenth infantry will soon be remedied. It is announced at headquarters today that there are 100 recruits en route to this post, and that they will arrive here during the latter part of this week. The majority of the newcomers will be assigned to the Second battalion as that organization is shy about 200 men and its needs are much greater than those of the First battalion, though neither is up nearly to its full strength. During the winter months recruiting officers say that they can secure men more easily than at any other time, though the character of the recruits is generally below that demanded by the ideals of the service. Many of the winter additions are from the wandering class that lives out doors while it is warm and in winter join the army for regular meals and warm quarters. In the West, the officers say, there are comparatively few enlistments being made, as most of the men are engaged in work more remunerative than that of a private and those that are not are too lazy to do anything but eat free lunches.

Election Date Changed.
The commissioners have changed the date of the election for the decision of the Port of Vancouver question from October 21, as first determined, to November 7. The board discovered, after fixing the first date, that it would be too soon, since the required notice could not be given nor could the voters have the needed time in which to register.

Battery Benefit Draws Well.
The benefit under the auspices of the

Twenty-sixth Battery Athletic club tonight at the Auditorium bids fair to be the best attended and most successful entertainment of the season. The club members have secured attractions that insure a good house and tickets have sold at a prodigious rate. The ball will be preceded by an athletic program of merit. The chief attraction of the evening will be the six-round bout between Fred Muller of Portland and Al Short of the club. Muller has a reputation and Short is making a name for himself with various visiting pugilists. Another six round "go" will be given between Jewell of Boise and S. S. Grey of the club. A wrestling bout, three falls, catch-as-catch-can, between R. Ellis of Vancouver and T. C. Jones of the club is the third event. Club members will also give exhibitions of bag punching, bar work and general athletics.

Captain Holmes Becomes Adjutant.
Capt. G. W. Holmes, late of Company I, Nineteenth infantry, has been chosen by General Huston for the place of post adjutant to replace Capt. E. M. Johnson, Jr., resigned. Captain Johnson will probably receive an order from the secretary of war for detached duty for two years, during which time he will instruct the officers and non-commissioned staff to the Oregon guard. This action has been requested by Governor Chamberlain and the officers of the militia, and will probably be granted, as this is in line with the desires of the war department and according to recent congressional legislation.

Skirmish Drill at Barracks.
The infantry companies at the fort have been started on skirmish drill and every morning roll over the wet grass of the parade ground, make short rushes at imaginary enemies, charge for a few hundred feet, and then retreat, and generally play they are storming the earth in general. It is amusing for the recruits but falls by constant repetition on the veterans.

OREGON PIONEER DEAD.

Pendleton, Or., Oct. 7.—B. Stanton died at his home at Weston Saturday night from the effects of a facial cancer, from which he had suffered for some time. Mr. Stanton was 65 years of age at the time of his death, and was one of the pioneers of the state. He came to this state from Clay county, Mo., the place of his birth, in 1853, and had lived in Marion and Umatilla counties. He was a veteran of all the Indian wars of the state, and was buried in the Milton cemetery, which was the scene of an Indian battle in which the deceased fought. Mr. Stanton leaves many relatives of prominence in the county and state.

The funeral was held from the Christian church at Milton Sunday afternoon.

NEBRASKA LIBRARIANS MEET.

MECCA FOR MISFIT
MARRIED COUPLES

AVERAGE OF ONE DIVORCE SUIT
A DAY IS THE RECORD OF THE
COURT AT COUNTY SEAT OF
CLACKAMAS COUNTY FOR THE
PAST YEAR.

Louise Holzworth Tells Tale of Woe in
Complaint in an Action By Which She
Asks the Court at Oregon City to
Sever Her Marital Ties—District Fair
to Be Held Under Auspices of Patrons
of Husbandry.

Oregon City, Oct. 7.—At this season of the year, or, to be more explicit, just before the opening of the circuit court, parties seeking to be relieved from their matrimonial ties are exceedingly numerous in Clackamas county, and the records show an average of about one divorce suit a day. Yesterday Louise Holzworth filed a claim through her attorney for a divorce from Jacob Holzworth. The complaint alleges that the couple married last June. Mrs. Holzworth alleges cruel and inhuman treatment and declares that her husband demanded that she perform manual labor on his ranch. She rebelled and she declares that her husband mistreated her on that account. She says that her husband pulled her out of bed when she was sick, choking and abusing her. August 4 last she declares that she was thrown bodily out of the house and told never to return. Since that time she has not lived with her husband. She declares that Holzworth's property is valued at something like \$5,000 and asks that the court give her alimony and counsel's fees. Holzworth lives in Yamhill county.

Another divorce suit was filed by George A. Moore for a divorce from Celeste Moore, on the grounds of desertion. The parties were married at Macksburg, this county, in 1898.

District Fair.

Oswego grange, No. 1, Patrons of Husbandry, is making preparations for holding its annual district fair, October 10. The exhibits are to include all kinds of farm produce, dairy and specimens of the handiwork of women. In the afternoon there will be a show program of interest to all. The articles placed on exhibition are to be disposed of at the close for the benefit of the grange, and a dinner will be served for the same purpose. There will be no evening session. The committee of arrangements is composed of Averil Fisher, Ursula Knauss, L. J. Borland, C. A. Lacey and Mrs. J. Ranges. Mrs. C. A. Lacey is kitchen superintendent and will appoint her assistants at the meeting. Premiums will be ribbons only. The chairman will name the judges who will award the premiums.

Estate of Patrick Duffy.
The estate of Patrick Duffy, who died here last week, amounts to about \$3,000, so those in a position to know state. This is a surprise to a great many people here who believed that he was worth a great deal more money. Duffy, that nearly all of his property was in cash. He left a will but the instrument has not been found. The eldest son, James Duffy, has not yet been located and the partition of the estate will remain in suspense until he can be found. There are five legal heirs.

China pheasants they say are also plentiful and they killed quite a number.

The Lewis and Clark club will hold a business meeting at the home of Mrs. George A. Harding this afternoon. A number of ladies from Portland have been invited and are expected to attend. After the business meeting a lunch will be served to the visitors and a social hour will be spent.

The Clackamas county court meets today. In the absence of Judge Thomas F. Ryan, the business of the court will be transacted by Commissioners Brobst and Killen.

The city council will hold its monthly session in the council chamber this evening.

Rev. Dr. Gibbons of Spokane, Wash., formerly pastor of the Presbyterian church in this city, recently received a call to the pastorate of a Presbyterian church in Indiana. He tendered his resignation to his Spokane congregation, who by a vote of 120 to 18 refused to accept it and raised his salary to \$2,400 per annum.

Reports from various parts of the county state that the high winds and heavy rains of the week have damaged prunes in all sections. Much of the fruit was overripe and fell off when the wind and rain struck it. In many instances heavily laden trees were broken down.
