UMPIRE AND ERRORS COST THE GAME

REUBEN LEVY STOOD IN WITH FIVE LONKMAN AND DECIDED EVERYTHING IN THE OAKLAND MANAGER'S FAVOR—THIELMAN FITTED FIRST-CLASS BALL.

Umpire Levy and Brownie errors were jointly responsible for the loss of yesterday's game. To say anything more about Levy, in the face of what has been said, would be making too much of a nincompoop of his batting average. It is by long odds the worst umpire in the world and, should there be any other worlds in which baseball is played for national diversion and financial enrichment, which we know nothing, they certainly couldn't boast of such a helpless creature. Levy has the timidity and modesty, so thoroughly characteristic of baseball umpires, to tell people that he is as honest as the day is long, but Mr. Levy should remember that the days have been getting shorter since June 21, and also that people of eminent virtue rarely ascend house tops in a quiet effort to proclaim their immaculateness. Blake was called out at first without any more reason than Levy has to do a mask and sport a stomach pad on the diamond. Francis hit the third strike called on him that couldn't be reached with long-distance communication. Thielman was in fine form and pitched splendid ball, but poor decisions and several errors caused his good work to count for naught.

Hollingsworth went out at first, Shea tore off a single to left. Thielman followed with a double to the same territory, Blake flew to O'Hara and Shea attempted to score but O'Hara made a perfect throw and Shea was out.

Fourth—Schwartz was passed, stole second, took third on a passed ball and scored on a wild pitch. Murdock popped to Thielman, Kruger struck out, Martinke walked, Messerly went out at first.

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MIKE FISHER VISITS TACOMA MAGNATES

MANAGER OF SACRAMENTO BALL TEAM QUINCY INVADERS THE CITY WHICH HE WOULD LIKE TO REPRESENT ON THE DIAMOND—FOOTBALL NOTES.

The baseball situation in Tacoma is still rather vague, and fans here are beginning to wonder whether Tacoma will succeed in breaking into the game next year at all. The outlook is not so bright as it seemed in the first flush of enthusiasm over breaking away from the control of the Pacific National League.

Michael Fisher of Sacramento was in Tacoma for a few hours this week and will run over from Seattle again before the end of the week to look over the ground and consult with some of the local baseball promoters. J. L. Carman, president of the Tacoma baseball club, was in Portland last week and it was upon his invitation that Fisher took the occasion to come to Tigerville to look over the situation.

Fisher is not very communicative about his plans. Beyond saying that he knew Tacoma was one of the best baseball towns on the coast he did not commit himself. Whether he will decide to invest money in this city for next season and consent to the transfer of the Sacramento franchise to Tacoma is the question which is agitating some of the fans. The cost of putting team on the field next year will be three times the usual expense owing to the necessity of buying new grounds and building grandstands and bleachers. The old grounds must be vacated, owing to the remonstrances of property owners who brought proceedings last year to have the game stopped. The matter was fixed up for the balance of the season with the understanding that new grounds would be secured this winter.

The present grounds are close to the center of the city and the car service excellent. The new grounds must be a good way farther out and some uncertainty is therefore projected into the situation by a possible falling off in attendance the first season.

The matter of Tacoma's entry into the Pacific Coast league will not be definitely decided until the annual meeting of the league next month.

Byron E. McKibben, manager of the 1903 Tigers, Ed Hutchinson, James Hanan and some of the other boys of the team are wintering in Tacoma.

Football Gossip.
Football is being played in Tacoma as it has not been for several years. A revival of interest in the game is apparent, and both the Tacoma High school and the University of Puget Sound teams are stronger than in many seasons past. Coach Paul Rader, a Minnesota player, is directing the practice of the High school eleven, which is making a good showing for so early in the season. A number of outside games have been scheduled and Tacoma will see good football, if nothing else, this fall. The first game of the High school lads was played Saturday with Vashon college, the High school winning against a heavier team by a score of 11 to 0. The university team has played no outside team as yet, but has games scheduled with the University of Washington, Washington Agricultural college and the University of Idaho.

The High school management is anxious to secure a game with the Portland High school, an interstate High school game not yet having been played in the Northwest.

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TEXAS COTTON MEN AND THE BOLL WEEVIL

Growers of the Lone Star State Will Appeal to the National Government to Furnish a Remedy for the Evil.

Dallas, Tex., Oct. 8.—The efforts of the state government of Texas which offered a reward of \$50,000 for a satisfactory remedy for the extermination of the boll weevil, having failed in the desired result the hopes of the cotton growers are now turned toward the national government, whose aid in the employment of scientific knowledge and inventive genius is sought. At the instance of the Dallas Commercial club a conference is being held here today to which representatives of the department of agriculture at Washington are being especially invited. While the boll weevil ravages in Texas this year are much less than last year, still the feeling prevails that only by constant vigilance and the most extensive and comprehensive efforts can the pest be kept from extending into the entire cotton growing section of the United States.

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
