

CHEN JOE'S HARD LUCK CONTINUES

YESTERDAY CHEN SAYS HE WAS ROBBED OF HIS QUEEN, HIS COAT, \$5 AND HIS PARCHMENT CERTIFICATE—TODAY THE SUPPOSED THIEF IS FOUND.

J. J. Conway Is Charged With Inducing the Chinaman to Visit His Room, and Then With Assaulting Him—Chen Says that in His Terror He Jumped from the Second-Story Window and Hair Was Torn from His Head.

A bold robbery in which a Chinaman's certificate of identification seemed to be the article most desired by the thief occurred early yesterday morning. John J. Conway, accused of the crime, was held to the grand jury under \$1,500 bail by Police Judge Hogue this morning, under charge of intent to rob. He waived examination.

Conway, a young man of good appearance, has been employed as a solicitor for the Home Builders' association. Chen Joe, known also as Chin Yen, is the complaining witness. As a result of his experience he is in bed in his room, 245 1/2 Alder street. In attempting to escape one of his ankles was broken, the other was sprained and his queue was torn from his scalp.

About 6 o'clock yesterday morning the Chinaman was on his way to a saloon in North Fourth street, where he was employed as a porter. He claims to have been accosted by Conway at Sixth and Burnside streets and induced to go to the white man's rooms at 22 North Sixth street, under promise of a job of cleaning the room. Chen says that Conway drew a long dirk and threatened to kill him if he did not give him his money and a "chotch chee," or his certificate of identification, entitling him to live in the United States. This document is the most valuable of a Chinaman's possessions in this country.

Frightened by the knife, Chen made a dash for a window and jumped through it to the cement sidewalk below. As he was escaping Conway seized his queue and tore it from his head. In his fall Chen broke one leg and sprained the other ankle.

The injured man lay some time before he could send word to his fellow countrymen. He was finally taken to his room where he gave a good description of his assailant to Patrolmen Reising and Carpenter, who were detailed on the case. They found Conway in his room. A dirk was found in the room. However, the Chinaman's coat was missing as well as the precious "chotch chee." Conway admitted, it is said, having the Chinaman in his room and drawing the dirk on him, but denied knowing anything about the certificate.

The police have made a thorough search, but have been unable to find Chen's coat or certificate. They are wondering if an organized gang is stealing identification papers in order to smuggle Chinese into the country.

sections in good standing, with a total membership of 291, carrying insurance aggregating \$571,000, which shows a considerable increase over that in force a year ago. At that date there were 280 members with \$492,000 insurance. Since its formation in Oregon, the Endowment Rank has paid to beneficiaries of deceased members more than \$75,000. The total paid by the rank throughout the supreme domain is \$19,650,000.

Helped Heppner.

Where Convention Will Meet.

Tomorrow will mark the eleventh annual session of the grand temple of Rathbone Sisters, the first annual meeting of the Uniformed Rank brigade and the third "stunt" of the D. O. K. K.

First prize, \$50 and flag, for best drilled company; second prize, best drilled company, \$75. To the company bringing the greatest percentage of its membership, \$75; to the company coming the greatest distance, \$50. To best commanding officer, gold medal.

At the close of the drills the grand lodge will be in session until 9 o'clock, at which time the Uniformed Rank hall will open at the armory. Prizes won at the afternoon drill will be announced during the evening.

The Knights and Rathbone Sisters will finish their business Wednesday and at 8 o'clock in the evening will take place the coronation of Abd-ul-Atif Temple No. 117, D. O. K. Some 40 candidates will be initiated and at midnight the lodgemen will sit down at the banquet tables.

shipbuilders being able to supply the kind of boat needed and I see no reason why we should want a steel boat, if we can't have it constructed at home. The steel one would practically last always, but in 10 years from now perhaps the vessel and apparatus will be obsolete and we will need a new fire fighter on the water."

The plans and specifications for the new wooden boat will give an extra foot in the beam measurement over the steel one and the displacement will be about 40 tons more. "With the same power engines," said an engineer at work on the plans, "the wooden boat is bound to be much slower than the steel one would have been." The engineer estimated its speed at about 2 miles an hour, and some one mentioned the instrument that generally accompanies a washboard.

BARK CLIFFORD IS BREAKING TO PIECES

San Francisco, Oct. 12.—The stranded bark Clifford will be left to bleach on the sands of the ocean beach south of the Cliff house, where she went ashore in a dense fog two weeks ago. 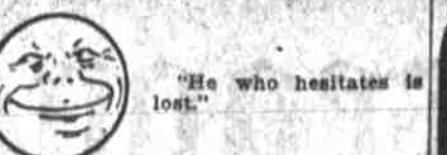
The scene of the horror is only two miles from where Miss Blahop was outraged and killed a month ago, and when her assailant was burned at the stake.

DISASTROUS FIRE AT WALLA WALLA

Walla Walla, Wash., Oct. 12.—Fire completely destroyed the Whitehouse-Crimmins lumber mill and yards early yesterday morning. The loss is about \$55,000, with one-quarter insurance. The Whitehouse-Crimmins company operated one of the largest lumber establishments in southeastern Washington, supplying nearly all the country tributary to Walla Walla.

The fire was incendiary in origin, coal oil seemingly the material used by the miscreant. Without warning a sheet of flame flashed higher than an ordinary two-story building and inside of one-half hour the entire factory was ablaze. The fire department was wholly unable to cope with the flames and for a time it looked as though many blocks of homes surrounding the mill would go. Only two small streams were turned on the flames, having about as much effect as a garden hose. At 6 o'clock in the morning the fire was under control, but late this afternoon the lumber piles are still burning.

SHOT HIMSELF, BUT SWALLOWED BULLET

San Francisco, Oct. 12.—Pain caused by an ulcerated tooth drove Max Brockwe to resolve to end his existence last night. Pointing a .38-caliber revolver at his head, he fired in the back room of his grocery store on Franklin street. The bullet struck the troublesome tooth, and with a gulp Max swallowed the bullet, with no damage done save the shock. At the hospital he says he will try it again, with the sight of his revolver better adjusted.

STEEL TRUST IS SICK.

DRUNKEN INDIANS KILL SEVEN CRUELLY

Spokane, Wash., Oct. 12.—A dispatch from Browning Mont., states that seven persons were killed and two seriously hurt during a drunken fight on the Blackfoot reservation. The dead are said to be: Wakes-Up-Last, wife and three children, Susan Big Road, Mrs. Little Plume.

The trouble grew out of a quarrel that Wakes-Up-Last had early Saturday evening. In an altercation he slightly wounded his assailant and later in the night a party of drunken friends of the injured man went to Wakes-Up-Last's house, shot him in the bed, killed his wife as she was fleeing from the house with her baby, shot this child at the same time they did the mother, and then cut the throat of Mrs. Little Plume and and shot Susan Big Road. Four suspected Indians have been arrested.
