HEALTHY VALLEY MUST BE SAFE

AGITATION FOR A SECURE ROAD ALONG FRUIT VALLEY IS GROWING, AND THIS IS THE ONLY TOPIC DISCUSSED BY THE RESIDENTS THERE.

Vancouver, Wash., Oct. 23.—The Valley road, with its six crossings that are all denoted as death traps, must be changed. This is the prevailing opinion of those unfortunate enough to be compelled to use the road regularly, and the agitation, instead of growing less, is constantly increasing. There is no other topic considered wherever residents of the valley gather, and slowly the majority of the people are uniting for a change, any change that will lessen the danger being acceptable to the majority.

Other stories of narrow escapes keep coming in. One farmer said that he got away with only his life in the mist of an early morning, recently, his wagon being grazed by an engine and several bags of prunes spilled on the track. Another teamster reports that a logging train rushed down on him, as it was backing into Vancouver, and that the end of his wagon was caught by the train and he was dumped into the ditch. In the latter case the driver had listened intently for the train and had heard the whistle of the engine far down the track, but the engine was backing up the train and was 20 cars away; consequently there was little safety afforded by the whistle, which was a delusion rather than a guide.

One of the chief troubles to be met is that coming from the opposition of residents along the road. These often oppose a change for selfish reasons, and some of them that live near town and have only one or two crossings to worry over refuse to let the road take its course through their property without enormous compensation.

"It don't make a bit of difference," said one disgruntled Valley man, "to a lot of those people whether we all get killed or not. They would rather see their best friend under the engine wheels than to accept a fair price for their little foot or two of ground."

Says Former Husband Cheats.
Ella Baker, now Ella Stanley, has begun suit in the superior court against George Baker. In her petition Ella Stanley states that on Oct. 19 of this year she was granted a divorce from her husband, J. H. Baker, and was also given by the court a judgment against him for \$1,000, this being her dower interest in property owned by Baker. She now charges that, with the intent to defraud her of this money, her former husband purchased a piece of land and that George Baker holds the title for this, though he really holds it for J. H. Baker in trust to defraud the plaintiff out of her judgment. She prays that the land be designated by the court as the property of Ella Stanley, and that J. H. Baker and that she be given her judgment and costs from the proceeds of its sale.

Luch Can Still Hunt.
In the superior court yesterday the case of the state against Luch for trespass was heard and the defendant found not guilty. Luch was arrested some days ago for hunting on preserves rented by Portland hunters and for refusing to betake himself away when ordered to do so. He will be held by the justice to the superior court.

Straps No More.
One of the things especially disliked by the army officers in the new uniform has been discontinued and the officers are living in the hope that other objectionable features may be later removed. Ever since the officers tried to wear the new uniform they have complained that this feature was a nuisance, and nothing else. The straps have been withdrawn from publicity by the war department and now the pale blue stripe and the gaudy chapeau, which the soldiers are to wear, are the burden of the winter's discontent.

Tim, a Canine Gentleman.
Tim is dead, and though he is but the corpse of an ugly bulldog his canine spirit must rejoice that he received an impressive burial and is sincerely mourned. Tim belonged to a private of the 15th infantry and he was the best of the best fighter in the garrison, and the best-natured dog besides. Children could maul him to their hearts' content; brutes could kick him when he got in their way; he made friends with every man who would offer a kind hand, and no amount of abuse from a human enemy could make him even growl. But Tim loved to fight, and though he never started trouble, he had chewed up most of the available Vancouver canines, who in a foolish moment had jumped on him, to discover he could fight. His prowess had enraged some hound's master and Tim was fed yesterday on powdered glass. His master found him curled near his bunk, lying dead in a pool of his own blood, and, though his master had served in two wars, he quietly went off alone in the woods and wept over his best friend's fate. The funeral service was held last night by a few men who knew the worth of Tim's loyalty, and though he was but a scoundrel, the army funeral service was read by a husky corporal, who, though six feet and a half, choked up in delivering a few words of tribute. Over one company's quarters a cloud of grief settled today, and the only ray of hope is that some time the man may be found who, under the guise of friendship, fed the fatal dose to trusting Tim.

Fury Case Continued.
The case against Joseph and Terence Furey, charged with highway robbery, was yesterday continued until Oct. 30, the delay being necessary because the prosecuting witness, G. W. White, is in his home in Nevada. The Fureys buy the old padlock game secured \$40 from Mr. White on Aug. 30. They were later arrested and identified by White as the guilty men. The two were housed in the superior court and Joseph was released on \$800 bail. It is believed that Mr. White received his money and that for this reason he did not appear to testify against the brothers, but he will be summoned to appear on Oct. 30.

Chinese Loss Investigated.
Sheriff Blaeser is today investigating the reported loss of \$600 that a Chinese market gardener says mysteriously disappeared. Today the sheriff believes that there was no robbery as first reported, but that another Chinaman simply stepped in while his neighbor was absent and extracted the money from beneath the pillow where it was kept. The sheriff was thoroughly investigating this case today and hopes to discover the thief and the plunder before he has a chance to dispose of it.

GIANT METEOR FALLS NEAR OREGON CITY

Oregon City, Oct. 23.—A giant meteor has been unearthed on the West Side about two miles from this city. It is estimated that the meteor will weigh eight or 10 tons. Its composition resembles some sort of metal. The meteor was dug up by a miner who noticed a point of it sticking out of the ground. Its fall had almost completely buried it in the earth. How long since it made its descent from the heavens there is no way of ascertaining, but its appearance indicates that it fell years ago. The heavenly visitor will be placed on exhibition.

Insane Man at Large.
This morning the sheriff received a telephone message from New Era stating that a crazy man was at large in this vicinity and asking him to come or send someone to take him to the man at once. The man's name was not given. Monday a man loomed about the depot all day. His actions being such as to excite suspicion. He was seen by a Journal reporter and questioned, but could give no intelligent account of himself save that he was going to New Era and had missed his train. The man was very decrepit and his actions indicated lunacy. It is probable that he is the man the sheriff was notified of this morning. Deputy Barker left for New Era to bring the man in but has not yet returned.

Report From Ogil Creek.
George Ogil returned this morning from the Fairclough Bros. mine on Ogil creek. Tom Fairclough and he have been working in the mine all summer and this is his first visit to civilization for more than three months. Work has been temporarily suspended on the Fairclough mine, but it will probably be resumed and continue all winter. Ogil reports prospects still holding out well and believes the country around Ogil Creek is rich in minerals. Work has been a man of more than usual intelligence. He was a member of the legislature from Clackamas county several years ago, elected on the Fusion ticket and made an excellent record as a legislator. He believed that the Clackamas county organized yesterday was but the beginning of a series of stock companies that will be organized in a short time. He says the mountains are still full of prospectors, in fact that there are more men engaged in prospecting in the mountains than there were a year ago. During the season, Tom Fairclough, who has been working with Ogil, came out several days ago.

Four Years Married and Tired.
Nancy E. Tibbels filed suit in the circuit court yesterday for a legal separation from her husband, Norris M. Tibbels, on the grounds of desertion. The parties were married in Riverside, Cal., in 1899.

RECTOR FOR 25 YEARS.

Baltimore, Md., Oct. 23.—The celebration to be held during the next few days to mark the completion of the 25th year of Rev. Dr. William M. Dams' rectorate of Memorial Protestant Episcopal church promises to be the most notable affair of the kind ever held in Baltimore. The celebration begins tonight with an anniversary sermon by Right Rev. George W. Peterkin, bishop of Virginia. Other prominent clergymen who will take a leading part in the celebration are Bishop A. M. Randolph of Southern Virginia and Bishop Dudley of Kentucky.

The Rev. Dr. William M. Dams is one of the best-known Episcopal clergymen in this part of the country and is famed as a pulpit orator. He is a native of Virginia and fought in the Confederate army under General Lee until the latter's surrender at Appomattox. He received his theological training at the Virginia Theological seminary and was ordained in 1869. Previous to coming to Memorial church he was rector of Christ's church, Alexandria, where George Washington was once a pew-holder and member of the vestry.

NEWSPAPER MEN GATHER AT SALEM

State Association Holding Annual Convention This Year Promises to Be a Banner One for the Organization.

(Journal Special Service.)
Salem, Or., Oct. 23.—The State Press Association of Oregon met in the 18th annual convention in this city last evening with President Conklin in the chair. A number of applications for membership were favorably acted upon, when the work of the convention was taken up. President Conklin appointed S. L. Moorehead, W. J. Clarke and G. M. Cornwall as a committee on resolutions.

Secretary Tozier read his annual report, showing papers in Oregon as follows: There are in this state 19 dailies, 180 weeklies, 7 semi-weeklies, 18 monthlies, 1 semi-monthly, 1 quarterly, 12 total of 226 publications, classified as 120 Republican, 35 independent, 23 Democratic, 5 fraternal, 4 agricultural, 3 miscellaneous, 1 prohibition, 1 teachers, 2 trade, 1 timber, 1 Norwegian, 1 Japanese, 1 Scandinavian, 1 Spiritualist, 1 hops, 3 religious, 5 school, 1 woman's club, 1 commercial, 1 labor union, 1 livestock, 1 poultry, 3 mining, 1 drug, 1 exposition, 1 Oregon history, 1 physician, 1 German, 1 law journal.

Receipts for the year were \$50; disbursements, \$28.75. The report of the treasurer, Miss Frances E. Gottshall, showed a balance of \$127.25.

J. H. Cradellbaugh read an original poem, in welcome of the visiting newspaper men, the humorous references to the incidents of newspaper work creating much merriment.

Newspaper History.
George H. Himes, the historian of the association, read an historical account of a number of papers started in the territorial days of Oregon, commencing with the Salem Statesman, the fifth to start in Oregon territory, and winding up with the ninth, the Journal of Commerce.

Secretary Tozier read greetings from the Idaho Press association and from the president of the National Editorial association. A letter was read from the press commissioner of the St. Louis Exposition, asking the association to meet in St. Louis next May. A telegram was also read from the Hood River Fruit growers, asking the association to meet in Hood River during the Fair in 1905.

Col. E. Hofer concluded the evening's program by a short address on the "Ethics of Journalism," advocating honesty on the part of newspaper men, honesty with the public and advising the use of common sense.

Mrs. Abigail Scott-Dunnivant, the pioneer newspaper woman of Oregon, was reported to be in the city and it was stated that yesterday was her 68th birthday, and the association, by a rising vote, adopted a resolution to send greetings to her.

Elected Officers Today.

On Charge of Forgery.
Harry Allen, the ex-convict who was yesterday given a preliminary hearing in Stanton on the charge of forgery, was bound over to the circuit court in the sum of \$1,000. Being unable to give bail he was committed to jail. Allen will be held in the county jail until the January term of the court unless he decides to plead guilty, when he will be given an opportunity to plead guilty at once.

S. M. Childers Dead.
S. M. Childers, farmer at the Chemawa Indian training school, died in this city yesterday, after an illness of only a few weeks, of pneumonia, following an attack of heart disease, aged 52 years, one month and 17 days. Deceased was a native of Franklin, Ill., and for many years was in the employ of the Indian bureau as farmer at Indian schools. He was for a time at the Chemawa school in Oklahoma, and in 1894 came to Salem, where he occupied a prominent position in the life of the school and was highly respected. Superintendent T. W. Potter considered him one of the best officers.

The dead man was a member of the Chautauque club and was a past grand in the O. O. F., holding his membership in the lodge at Franklin, Ill. He was also a member of Salem Rebekah lodge No. 1, I. O. O. F., of which lodge his daughter is the noble grand, and he held a policy in the Order of Lions. He was a widow and grown daughter, and a mother, the latter residing in Illinois. The funeral services will be held here Sunday, when the remains will be shipped to his home in Illinois for interment. The family will accompany the body.

RAINS ONCE EVERY 36 HOURS IN HAWAII

Forecast Official Beals is in receipt of the weather report at Honolulu for the year 1902. The total amount of rainfall during the 12 months amounted to 46.79 inches. There were 233 rainy days, counting each day on which .01 of an inch of rain fell. On that average it rains once in every day and a half. In one locality on the islands a rainfall of 275.36 inches is reported. The lowest temperature was 52 degrees, and the maximum 86 degrees. The heaviest rainfall occurred during the month of March, when there were 11.67 inches of precipitation. The least rainfall was in January, when there were but .30 of an inch. The force of the wind averaged 15 miles an hour, the windiest month being in August. The least wind was in June.
