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CONVENTION FOR PORTLAND IN 1935

Rev. J. F. Ghormley Says American Christian Missionary Society Will Meet in Northwest During Lewis and Clark Fair.

"It is a certainty that the annual convention of the American Christian Missionary Society is coming to the Pacific coast in 1935, and I think likely Portland will be the place of meeting," said Rev. J. F. Ghormley, pastor of the First Christian church of this city, who has just returned from Detroit. Rev. Mr. Ghormley was in attendance at the American Christian missionary convention that was in session from October 14 to 21 and he used his efforts toward securing the Lewis and Clark fair and Oregon.

"The convention will be held at St. Louis next year," he said, "and it is there that we will work for Portland."

CHIEF HAS NEW SMALLPOX HOUSE

The smallpox detention room, ordered last week by Chief of Police Hunt, has been completed and is now set up against the side of the city jail on Oak street. While the building is no ornament in which to detain smallpox suspects until they are turned over to the health authorities, it is a good thing that it is eight feet in size and can be taken apart and stored when not in use. It will be provided with a cot, chair, table and stove for the accommodation of sick persons. After each occupancy it will be fumigated. Heretofore the police have had to detain suspects in the jail, subjecting the prisoners and officers to infection.

NO HOPE OF PEACE.

Scallion scouted Heinze's condition that the rate of wages should not be reduced for three years, and that the Amalgamated should agree to keep its mines running for the next year. Scallion declared that the Miners' union did not need Mr. Heinze's protection, and that the Amalgamated would not consider any reduction in wages.

The miners have been angered by Heinze's statement that his manager, John MacGinniss left town because he feared personal violence. Statements were adopted by the union censuring Mr. Heinze for this statement.

Only Relief Is in Courts.

In the absence of new and unexpected developments the only relief for the situation now lies in an early decision by the supreme court of the appeal from Judge Clancy's decision. By this decision the temporary injunction restraining the Boston & Montana from paying its dividends to the Amalgamated was made permanent. As this injunction has been in force for the past two years, Judge Clancy's decision really worked no change in existing conditions, and the action of the Amalgamated in shutting down its properties is denounced by Heinze and his friends as utterly unjust and an attempt to coerce the courts into a dissolution of the injunction.

ment was not going to acknowledge that this scrip was valid. This sent down the market value of the scrip until it sold for \$1 to \$1.50 an acre. Then the secretary ruled that it was good, and the speculators who had had inside information as to what the secretary was going to do jumped up the price of the scrip to \$5 an acre, realizing from \$3.50 to \$4 an acre profit from the mere sale of the scrip. If they wished to sell, and if not, could lay it on timber lands elsewhere. One company, the Manistee of Michigan, had 200,000 acres of this scrip was given them for lands from which every foot of merchantable timber had been cut. They went to Oregon and laid it on the best lands they could locate.

These are the real abuses, the real abuses, and the administration has, in my opinion, been throwing dust in the eyes of the people by creating the impression that the only frauds are those committed by individual entrymen. While there have been frauds by the individuals, their petty frauds have been as mole hills beside the gigantic speculations of big corporations under cover of unjust laws that have been placed on the books with the consent, and even the urging, of the interior department.

"Do not understand me as excusing smaller frauds. But, at the same time, understand me as meaning to say plainly that the larger frauds, such as I have here cited, constitute the abuses against which the department of justice should now be proceeding. They are catching minnows and permitting large fish to go free."

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CHIEF HUNT MUST EXPLAIN

HIS OWN REPORT INDICATES THAT HE HAS VIOLATED THE LAW REQUIRING THAT THE FUGITIVE FUND OF \$500 SHALL NOT BE DIMINISHED.

Council Will Consider His Apparent Failure to Observe the Section Requiring Him to Collect and Return to the Fund any Sums Used Out of It—It Was \$400 Last February Now It Is Only \$96.

In filing a statement regarding the fugitive fund, to disarm criticism and offer an explanation of certain alleged irregularities, Chief of Police Hunt indicates that he has violated the ordinance creating the fund.

The fund was originally instituted as a reserve in emergency cases, but the ordinance specifically says that it is not to diminish. When a certain portion is used in conveying criminals to some other place or returning them to this city the sum incurred in expenses must be immediately collected and returned to the fund. This has not been done. February 4 there was a balance to the credit of the fund of \$408.65, and now there is a balance of only \$96.65. The difference was paid out and not returned to the account.

As soon as the report was filed with Auditor Devlin this condition of facts was discovered. A copy of the original ordinance was also made and this, together with the chief's report, will be considered by the next council session. What can be done in the matter is merely conjecture.

The section of the ordinance, which it is asserted, is violated, reads: "Sec. 4. That whenever said fund, or any portion thereof, shall be used by the chief of police, as provided in this ordinance, for the arrest, detention and return of any person accused of crime, who shall have fled from the city of Portland, to escape punishment, the said chief of police shall file an account of such expenses with the proper authorities of the state or county government for the purpose of securing a repayment of such moneys of said fund as shall have been expended and when said account shall have been paid to him, the said chief of police, by said county or state authorities authorized to allow and pay the account and expenses incurred in the arrest, detention and return of said fugitive from justice, the said money so received by the chief of police from the authorities aforesaid, shall be returned into the said fugitive fund, so that said fund may at all times be kept intact to the amount of the appropriation provided for in this ordinance."

Chief of Police Hunt stated that when an officer returns from a chase after a criminal he made out his bill and it was paid from the city fugitive fund. In turn this amount was replaced from the county treasury.

league, in discussing the subject of schools, said: "The movement to abandon the dark and musty basements of the schools for playgrounds out of doors, no matter how restricted, is something that should appeal to every parent. Our children are the men and women of a coming day and their minds and body should be trained accordingly. These outings in the basement, while the best that can be done under the existing conditions, are far from satisfactory and should be abandoned. If people will dress their children according to the state of the weather, so they can go outdoors for their short recesses at any time during the year, they will be more than repaid in the beneficial results which must follow. The boys and girls are healthier and learn faster, for strong, active minds go with strong active bodies, and it is necessary to give the boys and girls plenty of ground to romp in every day that we can secure both these results. Let us do away with the basement recesses and let the children out in the invigorating air where they can yell their lungs tired, if they so desire. Basements breed disease."

Since the agitation of this subject first commenced the school authorities have been indefatigable in trying to remedy the existing conditions in schools where playgrounds are not available. In a number of schools where the quarters are restricted the pupils are permitted to run around in the hallways before falling into line to march back to their studies.

DROPS SUIT AGAINST PASTOR J. H. GIBSON

W. E. Spicer, who charged Rev. J. H. Gibson of the United Presbyterian church with defamation of character and commenced an action in the circuit court to recover \$1,000, has withdrawn the suit. Mr. Spicer was a member of the church of which Rev. Gibson was pastor, but the latter declared Spicer to be guilty of stealing wheat and attempted to expel him from the congregation. It is alleged.

Explanations have been made, it is understood, satisfactory to both, and it is suggested that the men are on the same footing as before the breach occurred. Friends brought about the reconciliation.

Both Mr. Spicer and Rev. Gibson refuse to discuss the matter further than to assert that the case has been dismissed.

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ANOTHER STEAMER FOR COOS BAY RUN

Will Assist the Alliance in Relieving the Congested Freight Situation at This End of Line—Due to Arrive Thursday.

Owing to the delays which the steamer Alliance has experienced during the past few weeks the California & Oregon Coast Steamship company has decided to put on another vessel to relieve the congested freight situation at this end of the line.

F. Baumgartner, the local agent of the line, received a telegram from San Francisco this morning stating that the steam schooner Navarro will sail from this city tonight for Portland by way of Coos Bay, and that she would be kept on the run so long as the business justified it. She is expected to arrive here Thursday evening, and an effort will be made to have her ready to sail for Coos Bay not later than Saturday night. At present the dock is crowded with enough freight to fill two steamers.

The capacity of the Navarro amounts to 232 gross tons. She is 126 feet in length, has a beam of 32 feet and the depth of her hold is 10.4 feet. The vessel was built at San Francisco in 1887.

STORM WARNING STATIONS IMPROVED

Forecast Official Beals reports that the weather station at Anacortes, on Juan de Fuca strait, will be equipped next month with a steel storm-warning tower. It will be 50 feet in height and will be surmounted by a 25-foot flagstaff. From the staff flags will be displayed when storms are expected. To the tower proper will be attached two high-power electric lanterns, which will be brought into service at night to note the approach of expected storm, by its means giving both day and night notice to mariners.
