

ACCUSED BY A GIRL OF 13

CHARLES PIERCE BOUND OVER TO THE GRAND JURY—JUDGE AND ATTORNEY ENGAGE IN A TILT DURING THE EXAMINATION OF PEARL FOSS.

After a preliminary examination in the police court today, Charles Pierce, formerly employed by the Portland General Electric company and a call man in the fire department, was bound over to the grand jury under \$1,500 bail.

The complaining witness against Pierce, who is well known and bears an excellent reputation, is Pearl Foss, the 13-year-old daughter of his sister. Pierce has boarded at his sister's house at Seventh and Everett streets, for several years.

The examination was behind closed doors so as to screen the girl from the curious crowd which thronged the courtroom. A feature of the examination was a tilt between Judge Hogue and Attorney A. Walter Wolfe, representing Pierce. In the clerk's office the girl was being questioned by Judge Hogue, Deputy District Attorney Adams and Special Officer Hawley. They were grouped around the child so that Pierce could not hear her testimony. Attorney Wolfe objected, stating that his client had a right to hear what was being said.

"Bring him around on the other side," suggested the court.

But the attorney insisted that would not help matters, and then the judge told him to carry the answer back to Pierce. To this also Mr. Wolfe raised strenuous objection, insisting that the girl talk so that she could be heard. But Judge Hogue said he was conducting the court, and matters were not remedied.

When Officer Hawley asked the witness a question, Mr. Wolfe again raised an objection that the girl was being coached. But Judge Hogue replied that Hawley could ask what he wanted, and that when it was time to call a halt he would do so. But Hawley asked no more questions and the girl spoke loud enough.

Pearl Foss said she could produce other witnesses when necessary. On this showing Pierce was held. Friends of Pierce say the child is trying to shield others by blaming her uncle.

AGED COUPLE FOUND DEAD IN THEIR BED

RADICALS DETERMINE FOR STRIKE

New York, Oct. 30.—The Parks element has won in the International Bridge and Ironworkers union and a general strike will be called tomorrow until local No. 2 is recognized, or the union has had enough. There are 10,000 ironworkers directly affected and possibly 100,000 men will be idle, should the general strike prove a success. All the large Eastern cities will be affected.

PROF. MOMMSEN IS NEARING HIS END

Eminent German Jurist and Historian Seized With a Stroke of Apoplexy Today—Emperor Asks for Bulletins.

Berlin, Oct. 30.—Prof. Theodor Mommsen, the eminent German jurist and historian, had an apoplectic stroke today and is dying. He was called the most eminent German of the time and is known throughout the world. He was born in 1817 and has had a stormy career owing to his political affiliations. He wrote the best known history of Rome and of the earliest inhabitants of Italy in two works, which are standard. He holds high honors of decorations by many rulers. On his seventieth birthday he had the unprecedented honor of a congratulatory address signed by 60 dons of Oxford. He was recently knocked down by a carriage, which is supposed to have caused the beginning of his breakdown. The Kaiser has ordered bulletins on Mommsen's condition be sent him at regular intervals, as it is regarded as a national calamity. He is unconscious.

FENNING LIKELY TO BE RELEASED

It is probable that James Fenning, who was brought back by Sheriff Storey to answer the charge of being implicated in the O. R. N. holdup near Troutdale on September 23, will be released by the officers who have charge of the case.

Fenning was arrested by the Everett police because he was believed to resemble the mysterious fourth man, supposed by some to be involved in the robbery. The sheriff alleges that there were only three men involved in the robbery; that Fenning had nothing to do with the offense, and that they would have secured the third man had not Sheriff Storey interfered.

CALLS PARKHURST A MISERABLE CREATURE

New York, Oct. 30.—John Alexander Dowle, to himself known as Elijah II, used his energy in yesterday's meetings in denouncing the medical profession. His subject was "Medicine and Surgery: Are They Sciences?" but his discourse did not follow the subject closely and he frequently branched off to slash at the clergy, reporters, medical students and secret societies.

He in passing handed Rev. Parkhurst a small token as follows:

"He tells over his sermons and his hearers toll while listening to him. I have made up my mind he is not worth a penny powder and shot. He never had to hire the police to keep his audience out like I have."

"NOW IS THE TIME TO BUY CATTLE"

STOCKMEN BELIEVE THE MARKET HAS REACHED ITS LOW-WATER MARK, AND THAT BETTER TIMES ARE AHEAD—SAY CATTLE CAN'T POSSIBLY GO ANY LOWER.

Kansas City Commission Man Gives Reasons for Believing that This Is a Good Time to Stock a Ranch—Why Prices Have Fallen During the Last Summer—The Market Up a Little—Livestock Gossip.

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 30.—It looks at last as if better days are coming for the cattlemen. There is a sound in the air that livestock men are beginning to hear. It is the approach of better prices and the end of the panicky condition of the market. Just what is causing this optimistic feeling is hard to explain, possibly it is because the cattlemen believe that the market can't go any lower. Prices took a jump up in all the markets last week and the indications are for still better gains.

Whatever is causing the feeling that the prices of beef have reached the low-water mark, it is a fact that cattlemen who have their ears to the ground are buying cattle now, while the market is low. George E. Cole, president of the Cattle and Horse Raisers' Association of the Kansas City Livestock Commission company here, one of the most conservative livestock men in the Kansas City exchange, in speaking for the commission men here, said yesterday:

"Good Time to Buy Cattle."

"Now is the time to start in the cattle business. Prices are cheap and a man can stock his ranch for one-half what it would have cost him two or three years ago. There is little money now in cattle. They are too cheap, but there is something certain. They can't go any lower, because if they do the stockmen will have to give them away. There should be money in buying young cattle. Spring calves are now selling at from \$4 to \$7.50 a head. Two years ago they sold for \$15. If a person has the range and the roughness he can't help making money. He can hold them three years and prices are certain to go up in that time. He will make money then because he bought so cheap. The man who started in the cattle business three years ago and invested \$5,000 has today lost by a falling market almost \$2,500. On a rising market he would have gained that much on an advance in price. Buy cattle when the market is down. That means making money."

Asked regarding the reasons for the falling market, Mr. Cole said:

"Causes for Bad Prices."

"This summer has been a demoralized market for several reasons. For two or three years the prices have been falling on all grades of stuff. Then when the market was already bad came the flood in the Middle West. It laid out all the Kansas City packing plants for months and brought the demand here to a standstill. Cattle that had been coming to Kansas City, to the great feeding and stocker market in the world, began to go to other markets, Omaha and Chicago, principally. These markets were overloaded and the result was the prices shot down. The small markets are kept regulated by the large ones. The tight money market in the East had its effect. Cattlemen grew panicky and unloaded unless they could afford to wait. The demand now is great enough and the supply is not up to the normal."

To Choose a Head in Portland.

The Independent Packing company has elected all officers except a president. At the Denver meeting last week it was decided that no president should be elected until the National Livestock association meets this winter in Portland. Or. W. E. Small of Texas, J. P. Murphy of Montana and Colonel W. E. Hughes of Denver, are candidates for the honor. L. F. Wilson of Texas is permanent vice-president, F. W. Flato of Missouri, treasurer, and Charles F. Martin of Denver, secretary.

The directors ratified and signed what is known as the "trust agreement," by which 81 per cent of the stock is held by stockmen interested in this concern. This action precludes outsiders from gaining control of the enterprise.

"While we were in session," said Charles F. Martin, "the directors received unolicited subscriptions to stock amounting to more than \$100,000. The first thing to be done is to finance the institution. As the most expedient method of accomplishing that end the directors decided to refer stock subscriptions to the representatives of the various states on the board. The matter of raising the large sum will be left to the discretion of each director in his respective state."

A Decrease in Cattle.

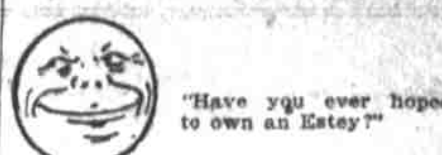
Cattle receipts for last week aggregated 73,000, a decrease of 7,000 as compared with receipts the preceding week and 4,000 less than in the corresponding week last year. Chicago received 78,000, a gain of 8,500 over the week before and of 8,000 over a year ago. The five markets combined received about 237,000, practically the same as in the week before, but a loss of 11,000 as compared with the same week last year.

The bulk of the arrivals were Western, on the stocker and feeder order. The great crowd of visitors to the American Royal show, many of whom purchased their cattle the last of the week, proved a strong factor in the trade. The market was somewhat weaker Monday and Tuesday, but closed up 20 cents higher for the week. Even the medium to fair offerings sold 10 to 15 cents above the first two days in the week. Prime to choice heavy feeders are scarce. Some of the stockers exhibited for prizes in the show sold up to \$5.25. Choice stock cattle are scarce and higher. Common grades are steady and the accumulation is slowly decreasing. Stock cows and heifers sold more readily during the week and prices have not changed materially.

Prices for good to choice dressed beef steers advanced 10 to 20 cents. Medium to fair offerings are 10 cents higher. Choice grades have been extremely scarce and the top price paid was \$5.50, except for a load of choice cattle, which sold at the close at \$5.85, the highest price paid this year. Western grass-fed steers, suitable for kill, sold more readily at the close of the week at firm prices, while extreme common steers in some cases were 10 to 15 cents lower during the week. Choice heifers, cows and butcher steers advanced 10 to 15 cents. Medium grades of Western cows are to 10 cents higher. Common carcasses were unchanged. Veal calves were steady and in good demand.

A Good Run of Sheep.

Sheep receipts for last week aggregated 42,500, against 31,475 the week before and 44,500 a year ago. Chicago had 157,500, against 142,000 and 120,000 a year ago. Receipts at the five Western markets aggregated 291,050, against 291,500 and 275,600 in the same week last year. The market was 15 to 25 cents lower on fat grades than the week before, with feeding ewes and lambs

steady and feeding wethers 10 cents lower. The decline began Tuesday with receipts around 10,000, and by Thursday the fat offerings were 15 to 25 cents lower. Lambs the first of the week sold at \$5.25, and the last part of the week were selling at \$5.50, \$5.50 to \$4.90; choice wethers, including yearlings, \$3.60 to \$3.90, against \$3.75 to \$4.10 last week. Ewes have been of poor quality and brought \$2.90 to \$3.15, against \$3.15 to \$3.35 last week. The best feeding lambs brought around \$4, with the supply limited. Wethers were plentiful, and were quoted \$3 to \$3.35.

GENERAL STRIKE TO AID LOSING MINERS

Strike in the Coal Mines of Western States Authorized by President Mitchell, That Cripple Creek Strikers May Be Aided.

Trinidad, Colo., Oct. 30.—President William Howells of the United Mine workers of this district, has been notified by President Mitchell of the national organization that the executive board of the latter body has authorized a general strike in the coal mines of Colorado, Utah, New Mexico and Southern Wyoming. In his letter President Mitchell states that all efforts to secure a hearing from the mine operators have failed, and that the strike is authorized as the only way out of the difficulty. The general strike will begin on November 9, unless the operators accede to a conference before that time.

The Cripple Creek miners demand an eight-hour day and a semi-monthly pay day. Since July they have been on a strike to gain this and in order to aid their cause the general strike will be called.

IN RAGE KILLS HIS SISTER THEN DIES

Allentown, Pa., Oct. 30.—Thomas Bechtel committed suicide in his cell last night by cutting his throat. He was under arrest for the alleged murder of his sister, Mahel H. Bechtel, some days ago. The blow is said to have been struck by the enraged brother when he learned the girl had been out all night in questionable company, and was not presumably struck with murderous intent.

EMPLOYERS ARE IN EARNEST SESSION

(Journal Special Service.)
Chicago, Oct. 30.—The Employers' association agreed on its by-laws and constitution this morning. Officers will be elected this afternoon. The most likely candidates for president are J. O. Craig of Denver and Parry of Indianapolis. A threatened split was averted this morning, when it was decided that alliances be best in small towns with employers and employed, but no union workmen is to be eligible to membership.

The presidency carries no salary, but the secretaryship will pay probably \$10,000 per year. The secretary job will probably go to the Chicago Employers' association, as it is the strongest candidate.

The following are the by-laws:
First—To assist by all lawful and practical means the constituted authorities of the state and of the nation in maintaining and defending the supremacy of the law and the rights of the citizen.

Second—To assist all the people of America in resisting encroachments on their constitutional rights.

Third—To promote and encourage harmonious relations between employers and employees on a basis of equal justice to both.

Fourth—To assist local, state and national associations of manufacturers and employers in their efforts to maintain and establish peace, and to create and direct a public sentiment in opposition to all forms of violence and intimidation.

Fifth—To foster and encourage, by legitimate means, enterprise and freedom in the management of industry.

Sixth—To establish a bureau of organization for the formation of associations favorable to the objects of this association and federating them with the association.

Seventh—To establish a bureau of education and to distribute literature and foster the objects of the association.

Eighth—To create and maintain a fund for such purposes in harmony with and to promote the objects of this association.

MURCHISON HUNTS FOR HIS CHILD

J. J. Murchison, the La Grande rancher, whose wife and daughter left some time ago in the company of a Portland negro, is back in the city seeking his wife and child. He believes that her mother is an unfit person to rear her. But he does not intend to take his wife back to his home.

Mr. Murchison went to Vancouver yesterday to run a clue regarding the whereabouts of Mrs. Murchison and the child.

He requested the police to locate the negro and his wife. Both were found by the police but were not detained and when Murchison came he could not find the runaways. He says that he asked Patrolman "Grip" Roberts, and brother to Special Policeman John Roberts, to assist him, and the policeman said that for \$10, which he would have to pay to a third party, he could find out where the mother and child were. Murchison was not able to spare the money and did not find his little girl.

In his own behalf Patrolman Roberts says that he talked with Murchison about the case. Knowing that people in the north end expect money for giving information he intimated that for \$5 or \$10 for a third party he could locate the pair, through a third person, who he says was Julius Severa, a north end saloonkeeper. Later he found Mrs. Murchison in the Red Front saloon but did not arrest her. He reported the matter to Chief Hunt but as he had no orders to take her to the station he dropped the matter.

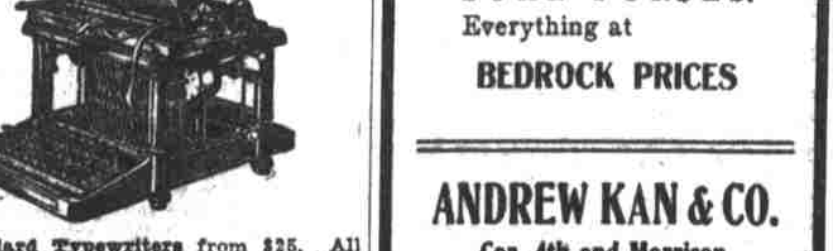
