

CHIEF JO DRAWS LINE AT PHOTOS

HEAD OF THE KICKITAT TRIBE
DECLINES TO FACE THE CAMERA
ON TO PERMIT HIS KLOOTCHMAN
TO BE PHOTOGRAPHED—HE'S
HERE TO BASTER.

Chief Jo of the Kickitat tribe of Indians, accompanied by his wife, was found this morning sitting on the floor of the Indian basket room of the Portland hotel. Chief Jo apparently did not fear that discontent would be aroused in the heart of his wife when she compared the elegant environment of the Portland with the round tepee in which he supports her at Lyle, on the Columbia river, at the mouth of the Kickitat canyon.

"Me and him," pointing to his klotchman, "live all the same Indian. No white man's house. No like him white man's house."

The klotchman smiled agreement with this sentiment, thus proving that there is no danger of her gaining foolish notions and precipitating a divorce proceeding against her lord and master. They presented an attractive picture as they sat there, surrounded by countless baskets and blankets on the floor and walls, and with their own blankets thrown about their shoulders with the careless grace of the aborigine, that an attempt was made to induce them to sit for a photograph. The result was the arousal of all the vehemence of Chief Jo's nature and the stirring of his powers of eloquent denunciation against white people who would cruelly flash open the camera obscura and take a photo of an Indian.

Photographer His Terror.

"No!" roared he, excitement growing every moment. "No! Me no ketchum picture. Klotchman no ketchum picture. No like picture. Indian die—go crazy—all things bad. All him men—Klotchman, Spokane, Yakima—all no ketchum picture!"

"But, chief," was protested, "Peo, chief of the Umatillas, had many pictures taken, and he did not die."

"Humph!" scornfully replied the chief of all the Kickitats. "Peo he have picture, and Peo he crazy."

"Now, Jo," urged the would-be photographer, "Peo went crazy from too much drink. The pictures did not do it."

Jo arose to the full height of his magnificent form, wrapped his blanket more closely around him, beckoned to his klotchman and stalked away from the room.

"I come to Portland long ago," said he; "come where first bridge built across the river here. I remember General Howland—his soldier and his wife, the white man. I know all the big chiefs. I big chief myself. But I no ketchum picture."

And forth he walked, followed by his patient wife.

Lives on Allotments.

Jo has 160 acres at Lyle, and one of his two sons has the same quantity of land. It was allotted by the government. Jo came down to Portland to sell some baskets and to buy some harness and plows.

"Harnes—maybe forty dollar, maybe fifty," said he. "Lyle, Goldendale, Dalles, maybe here thirty. Me save heap money come Portland. I plant 300 fruit trees, have fine orchard, go to mountains summer, let white man who have no fruit pick it. No sell fruit. Maybe some time they have trees and take no fruit from me."

The chief related this story with considerable emphasis, apparently priding himself on the horticultural economy of his institution he conducts at Lyle.

CITY OF ANGELS FROWNS ON FIGHTS

Salt Lake Very Close.

Salt Lake, Nov. 3.—Indications point to the heaviest vote in the history of municipal elections. Women voters are out in force and a heavy scratching is in progress. Thirty additional deputies were sworn in upon representations by the Democratic chairman alleging fraud. Both sides are confident and betting is even on Mayor Morris, a Mormon Democrat, and Knox, the Gentile Republican.

Boston's Vote Heavy.

Boston, Nov. 3.—Fair weather and a heavy vote is the record here. The Socialists expect to poll 50,000 votes in the state.

Vote in Ohio.

Cleveland, Nov. 3.—Throughout the state report is that the vote is heavy.

Democrats Gain in Iowa.

Des Moines, Iowa, Nov. 3.—Cloudy weather throughout the state and prospects of rain. Reports show that the farmer vote is machine in slacks. The Democrats predict a marked gain.

Shooting at Troy.

From Nebraska.

BETTING ON ELECTIONS.

Some Wagers Posted Here on Results in New York and San Francisco.

The following betting notice was posted this morning in front of a cigar store on Sixth street near Washington:

"Five hundred dollars, or any part, that McClellan beats Low in New York election."

A verbal posting of \$100 by S. A. D. Puter that Lane would carry San Francisco were evidence that the elections in those two cities have excited interest in Portland.

Of the \$500 offered on McClellan, \$400 has been covered.

The \$100 offered on Lane carrying San Francisco, by Mr. Puter, was in the face of 5-to-1 odds against him posted on the boards in San Francisco.

Considerable betting has been indulged in here in the city, with opinion evinced by the bettors that the fight in New York is about an even thing, with legitimate odds laid against Lane for the San Francisco majority. A well-known sporting man said, in discussing the two political events:

"We have tips that the election in New York will turn on the extent to which the fight became partisan. If it be put squarely to the voters that it is a test of Democratic and Republican strength, the city will be carried by McClellan, but if it remains a non-partisan fight Low will win."

"Now, as to San Francisco, in a three-cornered fight, Lane, Crocker and Schmitz in the field, it all depends upon all of them remaining in the fight to the end. I figure that Crocker and Schmitz draw largely from the same elements in a straight-out political fight. But if either Schmitz or Crocker discovered last night that he was not going to win, probably the weaker one gave instructions to his lieutenants to throw strength to the other, which would defeat Lane."

"In the event such an arrangement was made, the election was decided this morning when the district captains went out to carry out the orders of their machines."

MARIE JOHNSON SENTENCED.

New York, Nov. 3.—Marie Layton, alias Johnson, the embezzler from the playing card company here, was yesterday sentenced to not less than one nor more than five years.

MEMBERS OF THE VANCOUVER W. C. T. U. SECRETLY JOIN HANDS AND MARCH ON SUNDAY OPEN HOUSES—REPORTED TO HAVE GAINED CONVINCING EVIDENCE.

Vancouver, Wash., Nov. 3.—When the women of Vancouver decided that the men of the W. C. T. U. had quit their interest in the local opening question they evidently made a huge mistake, and one that temperance people say will prove as costly as did the prosecution last summer, when numerous liquor men paid a \$40 fine each, for being open on Sunday.

Last Sunday evening a number of the women went quietly around the town, and before they had finished their tour they had secured information against seven or eight of the leading saloonkeepers. This crusade was entirely secret and but little has been known of it, except by those most closely concerned. The prohibition leaders were not even aware of the women's intentions, and the utmost secrecy was observed, a secrecy which is said to have resulted in a successful crusade.

Nothing definite has as yet been given out by the members of the W. C. T. U., and it is understood that their case is not yet completed, and that further evidence will be sought, and that which has been secured will be formed into complaints and prosecution again started. This will open up the question once more, and what the result will be this time is uncertain. Apparently a compromise is out of the question and a strictly closed town may again result.

sort of a police department. The fire department would have to be abandoned altogether and there could be no more street improvements, for the city engineer's department would have to be closed. Think of the consequences, on the eve of the Lewis and Clark fair. Outside of taxes, the city's revenues for next year will be a little over \$200,000. Something must be allowed for the maintenance of the auditor's and the treasurer's departments, which must continue in order to pay such bills as the city has money for. Interest on the bonded indebtedness would be \$135,000, and there would be barely enough left for keeping up some kind of a fire department.

City Can't Borrow.

"The city cannot borrow a dollar, under the new charter, and officers of the city would not become personally responsible for its debts. The situation of the city is therefore much worse than that of the county, for the county can borrow money and continue to do business. Portland has about one-third of the wealth of the state and a large proportion of the population. The crisis which confronts it cannot be ignored by the Portland women and the city engineer's department would have to be closed. Think of the consequences, on the eve of the Lewis and Clark fair.
