

CHIEF IN A CLASH

"There'll Be Something Doing if You Get Rid of Me," Says F. L. Olson

WORDS BUT NO BLOWS

Hunt Accuses the Police Court Clerk of "Knocking" and Faces a Counter Charge—Squabble Over Payment of Gamblers' Fines.

"When you do get rid of me there'll be something doing," was one of the closing sentences in a heated interview, witnessed by four interested spectators, yesterday afternoon in the office of the clerk of the police court, between Fred L. Olson, the clerk, and Chief of Police Hunt. The clerk made the remark both clerk and chief were much excited, beat their fists on the table and shook their forefingers in each other's faces. Before the chief left he evidently wanted to capitulate, for he told the clerk he had pleasant relations between the two offices.

The trouble arose over the gambling question. Since the present system of fining the gamblers went into effect, Chinese fan tan and twenty-one games have been doing \$50 each a month. Chief Olson says that gamblers, both white and Chinese, have paid \$20 a month. Chief Hunt says that draw poker games were charged \$20 and stud poker \$50.

Wing On, who conducts a stud poker game at 87 Second street, sent his attorney to the clerk's office yesterday to pay \$20 for the coming month. The receipt was exhibited showing that Wing had paid \$20 for the same privilege last month, dating from October 15.

Chief Olson sent down to learn from Chief Hunt if the Chinaman had been served with a warrant. The chief seized the October receipt and rushed upstairs to see Olson. The latter was away at the bank, so Hunt returned in a few minutes when the clerk came back.

Chief Opens the Ball. "There is no warrant out for this man," said the chief, warmly. "What right have you to take his money?"

"It was I who insisted that you must have my records, especially as regards money, kept absolutely right. Now if this man, Wing On, pays \$50 more, you can issue him a receipt. I'll get out a warrant. He paid only \$20 last month for stud poker, when it should have been \$50. That's what he'll have to pay hereafter."

"Chief, you have never before told me there was a difference between the different poker games. They were all assessed alike at \$20 a month."

"I did," Chief Hunt retorted. "I did not and I don't have to. You're a clerk, a clerk."

"This money paid by Wing On, for which you gave this receipt never appeared on the police court transcript," Hunt said.

"Taking this as an insinuation that he had pocketed it, Olson jumped to his feet boiling with rage. Shaking his fist vehemently in Hunt's face, he roared:

"I'll bet you \$100 to 5 cents that the records show this money was forfeited by Judge Hogue. The transcript will prove it."

"You are the clerk here, not the judge," retorted the chief. You are to take what bail money comes in on warrants. I must keep in touch with what is doing. All money matters must be kept straight as far as my office is concerned. Anyhow, you've been niggling around for several months trying to knock me."

"There'll Be Something Doing." "Yes, and you told a certain party that you intended to get rid of me," replied Mr. Olson, heatedly.

"It's a lie, a lie," shouted the chief. "The party that said so is a liar and I'll tell him so if you bring him to me. It's untrue, I tell you."

"When you get rid of me there'll be something doing," said the clerk.

Finally Wing On's attorney was told to bring his client in, and when this was done the Chinaman was informed that he would have to pay \$50 a month to conduct a stud poker game. Wing protested, saying that other Chinese paid but \$20, but Chief Hunt said that that was untrue and Wing wasn't to believe what his neighbors told him. Wing said he was willing to contribute \$50 if all were treated alike.

Prior to leaving Clerk Olson's office Chief Hunt tried to capitulate by telling Olson not to get angry.

"You know," said Hunt, "I've tried to make things pleasant between our offices. You ought not to get mad," and the chief smiled his blandest.

Money Collected; No Complaints. "Nearly \$100,000 has been collected from the gamblers without complaints having been sworn to," said Mr. Olson, after the controversy. "The practice might still be continuing unless I had told the chief I would accept no more bail money until the gambler was arrested on a formal complaint and everything was done as the law requires. I can't see why the chief should make such objection to my taking in this particular \$20 last month. It was only one of many and was before I insisted on complaints and warrants being issued. The records show that the money went to the city."

"As regards the sum, I distinctly recall asking the chief about a poker game and he told me the bill was \$20. That has been the uniform sum for poker since the present system went into vogue."

By his own mistake, Chief Hunt thought he had caught the clerk in a trap. The receipt carried by Wing On showed that he was arrested October 10, and left his bail for appearance in court two days later. In looking over the court transcript for October 10, the day

SAM PARKS SENTENCED TO SING SING PRISON

(Journal Special Service.) New York, Nov. 6.—Sam Parks today was sentenced to two years and a half in state prison in the Tiffany extortion case. Counsel Battle for the prisoner asked for a new trial on a legal question, but Judge Newberger refused. Battle then asked leniency on the part of the court, when the judge replied that he had given the matter considerable thought, but concluded the sentence the lightest possible under all circumstances. Parks received his sentence calmly and was led back to his cell. He will probably be taken to Sing Sing this afternoon. There is considerable doubt as to whether he will survive his sentence.

(Journal Special Service.) Chicago, Nov. 6.—Miss Babb Clark Hoyt, the pretty niece of B. D. Hoyt, one of the wealthiest ranchers in Montana, ran away and met John Wing Lee, a Chinaman, educated at Stanford university. The Celestial is the son of a Chinese cook. The couple were married

by the justice of the peace last night. Wing Lee was formerly private secretary for Hoyt when the two became acquainted. The strange attachment was noticed by Mr. Hoyt who discharged the Chinaman. They managed, however, to keep up communication, with the result given.

he supposed the ball was forfeited, Chief Hunt failed to find Wing's name, which was on the records October 12.

Clerk Olson found it necessary to explain to the chief that the ball is not forfeited until the next day after the arrests. Wing was brought in on Saturday, so his case did not come up until two days later.

This morning Officer R. W. Phillips, who serves the gambling warrants for Chief Hunt, swore to a complaint charging Wing On with conducting a poker game. This is the first time Chief Hunt has not personally sworn to gambling complaints, but for some reason he had Phillips take action in Wing's case.

The warrant does not differentiate between stud or draw poker, but simply alleges that the Chinaman "gambled with cards in a game called poker."

"Idaho is too much of a desert," continued Mr. Rodgers, "and I don't believe we care to settle in that state. THINKS IT MURDER.

was called in and found a fracture of the skull at the base of the brain. He filed out the death certificate at the request of the coroner.

Toy Ham was a cook 34 years of age. He had worked in Seattle and Portland for many years. He was a steady fellow and his friends say he was quiet and never quarreled. His Chinese acquaintances expressed the greatest surprise when told that Toy died of a fractured skull.

According to his countrymen Toy Ham was taking care of himself as best he could in his unfurnished room. They say they do not know what his illness was but he seemed delirious. Saturday their attention was attracted by a great noise in his room. Toy was threatening around like a madman and thereupon his neighbors summoned Dr. Lane.

Patient Refused to Talk. "They told me no one had seen him for four or five days," stated Dr. Lane, "and they said he had not eaten for a week. But he did not appear greatly emaciated. He would not talk to me nor answer the queries of his Chinese friends. The patient's mind seemed to be bright and clear but his friends said he could not hear well. He showed a great aversion to being examined. I could not make as thorough an examination as I might have had he permitted me. I found his chest and body uninjured, but I thought him about to have typhoid fever and possibly on the verge of delirium. There was no contusion or injury on his head, but he seemed very strong and I did not think him critically ill. I gave him some medicine and told his friends to send him to the hospital as nothing could be done for him in the ventilated room."

Sunday night Toy Ham was admitted to Good Samaritan hospital at 8 o'clock. Dr. Barrett found that he had a fracture of the skull and when he died at midnight the physician believed that this was the cause. Coroner Finley viewed the body and asked Dr. Barrett to sign the certificate. At first the doctor refused, saying that he did not know enough about the case. Finally he did fill it out at the coroner's request and a fractured skull was given as the cause.

Friends Profess Ignorance. When admitted to the hospital friends of the dying man at the store of the Quong Chong Tong company, 185 Second street, guaranteed his expenses. At the store they all stated that he had received no injury to their knowledge, and none believed that he had been murdered.

It is possible that Toy Ham was injured by enemies after Dr. Lane examined him. Had the patient been suffering with a fractured skull Dr. Lane would unquestionably have noticed it. It is possible that the patient in his ravings bumped his head against some hard object but it seems more probable that some one struck him with a heavy instrument. Dr. Barrett and the coroner believe he was murdered but the guilty parties will never be caught.

The reason of the assault is a mystery. Possibly it was a Highlander feud several of which stirred Chinatown last winter.

"I suppose it was some row and the man was hurt," said Coroner Finley. "The police and I have worked hard on other Chinese cases and could not get any information. Therefore, I have decided it is no use to investigate these Chinese puzzles unless there are white witnesses. We can suspect but after the county spends \$25 or \$30 for an inquest you are no farther ahead. This man may have hurt himself but the doctor and I can't find out anything about the case. I do not feel warranted under the circumstances in saddling the expense of an investigation upon the county."

Carrying the secret of his death locked in his bosom Toy Ham was carried to his last resting place Tuesday morning.

BRYAN BENEFITED BY FIRST DECISION

(Journal Special Service.) New Haven, Nov. 6.—Judge Cleveland in the probate court this morning rendered a decision in the matter of admitting to probate the will of the late Philo Bennett, in which \$50,000 was given to William Jennings Bryan and family. His opinion summarized is as follows:

"As to the question whether the will was properly executed, there was no claim that the testator lacked testamentary capacity. I find that he had. I also find there was no undue influence exercised by Bryan."

"The claim was made that a so-called sealed letter should not be incorporated into the will to become a part thereof. After reviewing the conditions and attendant writing of such letters this court finds the sealed letter is not incorporated." Judge Cleveland expresses no opinion as to whether it may be incorporated later.

Bryan arrives this afternoon from Nebraska when the court will give a further hearing and a decision in full.

Stops City Work. The heavy rains have created havoc in the line of municipal improvement. It has stopped all street work entirely, has clogged the manholes to the sewers and the entire force in City Engineer Elliott's department is straining every nerve to keep up with the pressure.

Mr. Elliott is simply flooded with complaints from every quarter of the city. The elements have caused untold damage to the contractors who had sewer or other improvements requiring any ditch work. The rain not only drove the workmen out, but washed the dirt in again and in many places the work will have to be done over completely. It is simply out of the question to work in the rain and the men and contractors can only hope for the best.

Fired by a Live Wire. The employees of the F. T. Merrill company this morning had an experience with the business end of a live wire, that for a time threatened to burn down the building. The roof is of tin, and a live wire in some inexplicable manner dropped onto it, burning through the tin instantly and igniting the woodwork beneath. Fire extinguishers were hurried to the spot, and the conflagration drowned. But, in another, and yet another place the fire broke out, until the general electric company sent a crew of men to correct the difficulty.

Crossed Wires Cause Fire. Collector Dunne's office at the custom house yesterday afternoon was the scene of a slight blaze occasioned by the crossing of electric and telephone wires down town. The wires in the office were burned out and the room itself caught fire. Dunne extinguished the blaze with a wet cloth.
