SAYS LANDLORD WAS TO BLAME FOR LOSS

A rather unusual suit is under consideration by Justice of the Peace William Reid, the evidence having been submitted to him Wednesday. C. A. FIX STANDARD FOR NORTHWEST GRAINS The grain standard committee of the chamber of commerce has fixed the following standards for Washington, Oregon and Idaho grains for the coming year: Walla Walla wheat, 59 pounds; red wheat, 52c; bluestem wheat 52c; brewing barley, 47c; feed barley, 43c; Eastern Washington oats, 37c; Willamette valley oats, 35c. The committee's standards will be sent to Liverpool and London corn exchanges and form the standard for all grain shipped from the Pacific Northwest. The committee is composed of W. K. Burns, chairman; W. S. Sibson, Peter Kerr, A. Berg, T. W. Smith, Ben Albers and R. Kennedy. Alex. McAyeal is the official grain inspector for the chamber of commerce and drew the samples.
